

Eichmann Rejected Moves To Intercede In Behalf of Jews

Jerusalem—UPI—Adolf Eichmann rejected the attempts of foreign governments to intercede in behalf of German Jews, the prosecution charged today.

Documents were introduced in his trial purporting to show that Eichmann set himself up as a watchdog over the Nazi Foreign Ministry and forbade it to grant requests received through official channels.

It was clear from the documentary evidence that the German Foreign Office deferred to Eichmann on all matters involving Jews, although he was only a lieutenant colonel in the Gestapo.

Cattle Field Day Slated at College

Highlights of the program will be a review of current research by Dr. J. C. Miller, high concentrate feeds by Dr. D. C. Koger, and use of minor elements by Dr. J. E. Oldfield.

Sweden asked the German Foreign Office to prevent the deportation of Alfred I. Philipson from Bonn. Eichmann rejected the request. The Argentine Embassy in Berlin requested that Meyer Israel Meyerhoff be allowed to go to Argentina and take out citizenship ship. Eichmann said no.

The former Nazi officer even attempted to persuade the Thailand diplomatic mission in Berlin to release one of its Jewish employees, Israel Hirschberg.

Other documents showed the accused mass murderer forced the Jews to buy their own railway tickets to death and degradation.

Over-All Station Master

Documents admitted in evidence at his trial pictured the former Nazi officer as a sort of over-all station master who confiscated 25 per cent of the cash of each deported Jew and used it to pay the traveling expenses. There seemed to have been no such thing as a round-trip ticket.

The former Gestapo officer is accused of the mass murder of six million Jews under the Hitler regime. The prosecution contends he was a leader in the Nazi extermination program for Jews. He claims he merely carried out orders from above and never issued the actual directives for killing Jews.

Boivin To Sign Several Measures

Salem—UPI—Acting Gov. Harry Boivin was to sign several bills at The Dalles today including two that are special bills of Sen. Ben Musa, The Dalles, and his wife, Rep. Katherine Musa.

The Musas will look on while Boivin places his signature on a bill creating a State Tax court and a bill providing \$4 million in bonds for Highway 197 in Wasco county.

Several other bills also were to be signed at the ceremony. Signature of bills outside the capitol city has been rare.

Boivin and his wife left here for The Dalles Tuesday night and will return later today.

Boivin is acting governor while Gov. Mark Hatfield is attending the Western Governor's conference at Salt Lake City, but will sign the bills in his capacity as Senate president, an action which must be performed before going to the governor's desk.

Political Libel Trial Continues in Hillsboro Court

Hillsboro, Ore.—UPI—The political libel trial of Mrs. Audrey Henry, Portland, was in its third day today following a Tuesday session which saw Circuit Judge J. S. Bohannon make rulings against both the state and prosecution.

Mrs. Henry is on trial on charges of helping distribute false statements against Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D-Milwaukee), candidate last year for secretary of state.

Judge Bohannon ruled against use of House Un-American Activities Committee publications sought by Defense Attorney Larry Landgraver while cross examining witnesses.

The judge also told Francis Linklater, Washington county district attorney, that he could not introduce at this time cer-

tain records of the International Woodworkers of America. Linklater indicated in the judges' chambers the records would show Sweetland made an anti-Communist speech in Klamath Falls at an IWA convention in 1939.

Much of the hearing Tuesday was held in the judges' chambers out of the ears of the jurors as decisions were sought on admissibility of evidence.

Ex-Gov. Charles Sprague, Salem publisher, was called to the stand briefly but Mrs. Henry's attorney objected successfully that it was out of order to put him on the stand to testify as to the character of Monroe Sweetland.

Linklater said he hoped to show falsity of the statements contained in the material by putting on witnesses backing Sweetland's character.

Many Fail To List Interest on Bonds

Washington—UPI—Out of more than four million persons who cashed in U.S. saving bonds in one year, 86 per cent "failed to report any interest whatsoever" on their federal income tax returns according to Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon.

Dillon said about 500,000 reported accrued interest in full and 128,000 persons reported some of their earned interest. He said the Treasury paid \$246 million in interest on bonds during the year and only 29 per cent of it was reported on tax returns.

'MAXIMUM LEADER'

Miami—UPI—Radio Havana's customary description of Premier Fidel Castro these days is "maximum leader of the glorious socialist revolution." Castro's name was mentioned twice in a single 100-word report, and both times the descriptive phrase was used.

Senator's Widow Election Winner

Johnson City, Tenn.—UPI—Mrs. Louise Goff Reece, 62, widow of the late Rep. B. Carroll Reece (R-Tenn.) easily won a special election Tuesday to serve out the unexpired portion of her husband's term in Congress.

Mrs. Reece, a grandmother who spent election day cleaning the attic of her home here, vowed to continue the conservative Republican policies of her late husband, Reece, 68, died March 19 after a 41-year political career.

She rolled up a two-to-one margin over Democrat W. W. Faw in the traditionally Republican First Congressional district. The district has not sent a Democrat to Congress since 1878.

Boeing Farms Out Work on Dyna-Soar

Seattle—UPI—Boeing Airplane Co. Tuesday announced the awarding of a multi-million dollar subcontract to the Thiokol Chemical Corp.'s Elkton, Md., division to design and develop an acceleration rocket for the Dyna-Soar manned space glider.

Boeing said the rocket will give an additional boost to the glider after the second stage of the vehicle's Titan booster has burned out, and also will serve as an escape rocket to hurl the glider and its pilot free of the booster if an emergency occurs during launch.

Dyna-Soar is an Air Force program to send a piloted glider into space and back to earth through a controlled re-entry into the atmosphere.

Peace Volunteers To Start Training

New York—UPI—Peace Corps volunteers will begin training next month for a mission to Colombia.

CARE, Inc., which holds the first contract given to a private agency under President Kennedy's Peace Corps program, said Tuesday 161 volunteers will take an intensive two-month training program at New Jersey's Rutgers University starting June 26. Of the 161, only 64 will be chosen for the two year mission, and will receive another month of training when they arrive in Colombia.

The volunteers will study Spanish, agriculture and small construction work.

Japan hopes to increase soybean consumption by 40 per cent in the next 10 years to increase the population's protein intake. United States soybeans may have a share in this, for they have been satisfactory for miso and tofu, traditional foods that account for half Japan's soybean consumption.

ONLY CABBY JAILED

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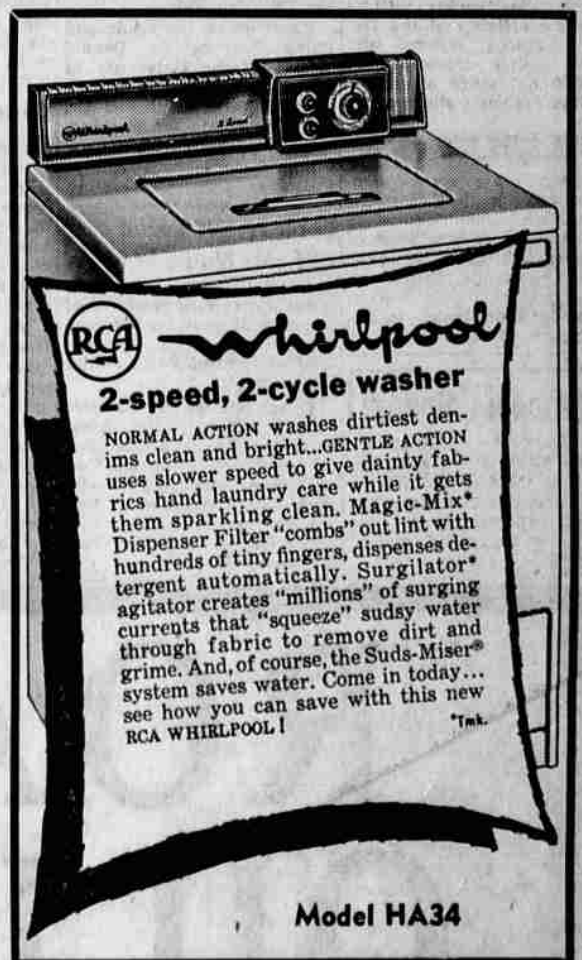
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
