

Greater Voice To Farmers Indicated

Salem—Federal authorization for agricultural self-help programs would give a greater voice to northwest farmers, Assistant U. S. Secretary of Agriculture James T. Ralph said Tuesday.

Ralph said such authorization, now pending before Congress, has a 50-50 chance of passage.

If approved, he told Oregon Director of Agriculture James F. Short, it would provide northwest farmers with a voice "consistent with their share of the market."

Ralph predicted if the legislation goes through, turkey and pea growers would take advantage of it right away, and apple growers would undertake the self-help program during the first year. Ralph said he believed wheat growers would delay a year before starting the program.

Hollywood Pays Final Respects To Gary Cooper

Hollywood — UPI — Two red poppies — tokens from his wife and daughter — rested on Gary Cooper's casket as the motion picture world mourned its most beloved star.

Mrs. Veronica Cooper and Marla each placed a poppy on the mahogany casket laden with white gardenias at the conclusion of services Tuesday for the actor who died last Saturday of cancer at the age of 60.

Mrs. Alice Bracia Cooper, 87, his mother, tearfully kissed the casket before it was lowered into the stone grove of Our Lady of Lourdes at Inglewood's Holy Cross cemetery.

About 500 of movieland's greatest figures crowded the Church of the Good Shepherd in Beverly Hills for a private Solemn Requiem High Mass and the eulogy.

Cooper's myriad friends among the greats of Hollywood sat sadly and silently during the services. Among the celebrities at the mass were Frank Sinatra, Desi Arnaz, John Wayne, Mel Ferrer, Audrey Hepburn, George Burns and Gracie Allen, Rock Hudson, Edward G. Robinson, Burt Lancaster, Bob Hope and Fred Astaire.

Dean Martin knelt in prayer during the entire ceremony with his head in his hands.

Georgia-Pacific Stockholder Suit Being Studied

Portland — UPI — U. S. District Judge Gus J. Solomon has taken under advisement the first of two legal points on a stockholder's suit against Georgia-Pacific Corp.

Judge Solomon said he would withhold opinions until the remainder of the case is heard July 19.

Robert S. Gaynor, New York City, brought the suit against G-P officers, directors and three associated firms. Gaynor contends that G-P executive vice president John S. Brandis realized excessive profits to the firms' detriment because of conflict of interest.

The major argument Tuesday was whether the firm's board of directors had authority to negotiate a stock purchase option and stock transfer arrangement with Brandis without specific approval of terms of the transaction by the stockholders.

The July 19 trial will be to hear contentions by the plaintiff that Brandis realized excessive profits by sale of G-P timber to Plywood Products Corp., while president of the plywood firm.

Judge Solomon held that Gaynor, who purchased 70 shares of G-P stock after early 1955 and was the original plaintiff, should be substituted by another stockholder. The new plaintiff is Janet Stone, also of New York City, who owns 200 shares of G-P stock.

Gold Beach Airport In Federal Plans

Washington — UPI — Sen. Maurice Neuberger (D-Ore.) said today she has been advised the Federal Aviation Agency is including the Gold Beach, Ore., airport in its current fiscal year federal aid to airport program.

She said the proposed allocation of \$92,127 would permit acquisition of a site of about 65 acres, preparation of the site and construction of a runway 3,200 by 75 feet, taxiways, apron and other facilities.

Medford Youth Pleads Guilty In Nevada Court

Carson City, Nev. — UPI — Harold Lee Harmon, 18, Medford, Ore., entered a plea of guilty Tuesday to a charge of armed robbery and will be sentenced Thursday.

Harmon told Dist. Judge Richard Waters Jr., that his western Nevada offenses were part of an extended crime spree.

He was arrested near Tahoe City, Calif., last week after robbing a Carson City service station of about \$100 and then kidnapping the attendant Jerry Kunze, 17.

Police said Harmon also admitted to four armed robberies in the Reno-Sparks area and admitted to kidnapping a Reno couple from their home.

He told officers he passed a series of bad checks in Medford two weeks ago. He said he bought a revolver and came to Reno with \$1,600 but was rolled by a girl he met there.

Although Dist. Atty. John Tom Ross said after the youth's arrest he planned to press kidnap charges as well as robbery but none have been filed so far.

Harmon refused counsel

even after Judge Waters reminded him five years was the minimum sentence for armed robbery.

Mrs. U. H. — He looks so out of place in school, he should transfer.

Kenneth H. — I don't find my height a hindrance, except at dances.

Mrs. U. H. — I attended a Parents' Assembly at Ken's high school last week and my heart ached for him. He's only 15 and in the fourth term, but, believe it or not, he's 6 feet, five inches already and still growing. Wherever he was, standing in line or seated among his classmates, he stood out like a misfit.

With two more years to go, I think it would be better for his morale to transfer to an evening high school and be among adults than to go along literally "looking down on people." He can work during the day. In college, he can return among young people. By then he won't be so conspicuous.

Kenneth H. — My mother must be putting herself in my place because she was the tallest in her own high school class, too. But maybe it's different for a boy, because I'm perfectly content about my size.

Outside of school dances, I participate in all activities. I play outfield on our sophomore baseball team, but I'm on our varsity basketball team which is headed for a tournament championship. I play forward, notch.

I want to stay in this school. My marks are good, I study hard and I hope to go to college. Getting there and staying there are my only worries now, not my height. That's my mother's worry and I wish she'd lay off.

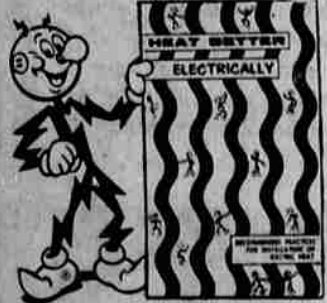
