

COLLABORATION OF KALINE, COLAVITO RESULTS IN 9-1 TRIUMPH FOR TIGERS

Are Al Kaline and Rocky Colavito more than a match for Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris?

The answer so far this season is a roaring yes and therein lies much of the story why the Detroit Tigers are out in front in the American league with a five-game lead over the New York Yankees.

There are other reasons—like pitcher Phil Regan, for example—but the team that beats the Yankees is going to have to have plenty of muscle. That's what Kaline and Colavito can give the Tigers in pennant-style this year.

Kaline and Colavito collaborated Wednesday night to make it look easy as the Tigers completed the demolition of the Baltimore Orioles' highly regarded pitching staff with a 9-1 rout up a five-game AL lead. Kaline drove in three runs with a double and triple and Colavito knocked in two runs with two singles and a double for the Tigers who outscored the Orioles, 29 to 10, in the three-game sweep.

Out-Hitting Maris

This 1-2 punch is reflected in up-to-date averages which show Kaline out-hitting Mantle, .315 to .307 and Colavito out-hitting Maris, .273 to .217. It comes out to a composite .299 mark for the Detroit stars and .284 for the New York ace with the 35 points that separate their combined averages significantly close to the 48 points separating the teams in the standings.

The Yankees were surprised for the second straight game Wednesday when the Washington Senators topped them, 8-7, while the Cleveland Indians beat the Boston Red Sox, 1-0, in the other AL game. The San Francisco Giants shaded the Chicago Cubs, 4-3, the Pittsburgh Pirates edged out the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-3, the Cincinnati Reds beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 2-1, and the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Milwaukee Braves, 2-1, in 11 innings in the National league.

Regan, who had an 0-4 record for Detroit last season, pitched a six-hitter for his fourth straight win of 1961 as the Tigers handed the Orioles their fifth straight defeat. Brooks Robinson's fourth-inning homer produced the only run off Regan who has blossomed into a capable starter after being tabbed during spring training for relief duty.

Sweep Sweep
The surprising Senators swept their two-game series with the Yankees and increased their winning streak to five

games with a 10-hit attack that included homers by Billy Klaus and Pete Daley. Pete Burnsides won his first game for Washington and Art Dittmar lost his second for New York.

Bobby Locke and Barry Latman combined in a six-hitter for the Indians who scored the game's only run off Bill Monbouquette when Vic Power slid home safely during a double play in the fifth inning. Monbouquette, struck out 17 batters in his previous start, suffered his fourth loss.

Ed Bailey drove in three runs with a homer and single to lead the Giants to their fifth consecutive victory although the winning run actually scored when relief pitcher Don Eiston yielded a bases-filled walk in the ninth. Stu Miller picked up his second win for the Giants who maintained their three-game NL lead.

Smokey Burgess' three-

runs batted in and Elroy Face's close-out relief in the eighth and ninth paved the way for Vinegar Bend Mizell to win his third game for the Pirates. Stan Musial had three hits for the Cardinals but they weren't enough to prevent Ernie Broglio from suffering his fourth loss of the season.

Reds Still Hot
The Reds scored their 12th victory in 14 games behind the five-hit pitching of Bob Purkey who also started Cincinnati's two-run third-inning rally with a walk. A double by Don Blasingame, a sacrifice fly and a double by Frank Robinson completed the rally against John Buzhardt. Tony Gonzalez homered for the Phillies' run.

Stan Williams walked 12 batters and struck out 11 in going the full 11-inning, four-hour and 15-minute distance for the Dodgers' victory. Relief pitcher Seth Morehead walked Bob Lillis with the bases filled in the 11th to force in the decisive run. Spahn, who yielded a leadoff triple to Frank Howard in the 11th suffered the loss.

Spahn Bid Fails at LA

Los Angeles—UPI—The Los Angeles Dodgers early today ended their longest game of the season when they walked in a run in the bottom of the 11th inning to defeat the Milwaukee Braves, 2-1.

The contest lasted four hours and 15 minutes before Stan Williams achieved victory over Warren Spahn, who has never been able to win a game in the Coliseum since the Dodgers moved to Los Angeles.

Pinch-hitter Bob Lillis drew the walk that forced in the winning run with one out and the bases loaded. But Frank Howard was the hero of the contest with his triple that set up the winning tally.

Howard hit his three-bagger off Spahn and Braves Manager Charlie Dressen sent in Moe Drabowski to load the bases with intentional walks and then called on Seth Morehead in a vain effort to keep the winning run on the bases.
But Lillis worked the count to 3-2 and after fouling off four balls drew the walk that ended the game.

Koppe Goes To Beavers

It cut the Beavers' roster to the Pacific Coast league player limit of 21.

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Red Raiders Host Tennis Tournament

Ashland—Defending champion Southern Oregon tries to make it two straight Oregon Collegiate Conference tennis championships in a row when it hosts the annual Conference matches here Friday and Saturday.

Action in the two-day classic gets underway Friday morning and concludes the following afternoon. Only three teams, Portland State, Oregon College, and the host Red Raiders are entered. The other two OCC member schools, Oregon Tech and Eastern Oregon, do not field tennis teams.

Southern Oregon heads into the week end matches sporting a 7-5 win-loss season record. Last week the Raiders won two of three matches on a northern swing which saw them defeat Oregon College 6-1 and Portland State 4-3 before losing to Willamette University, 4-3.

Against the OCE Wolves the lone Raider defeat was dealt to No. 5 man Rollin Hegler. In the Portland State matches No. 1 man John Root, Hegler and the No. 1 doubles team of Root and Ron Singler went down to defeat. The No. 2 doubles combination of Lorance Eickworth and Ken Miller won their match to give

the Raiders their seventh triumph of the season.

Willamette, a power in the Northwest conference, scored their one-point win by winning three singles matches and the No. 1 doubles encounter. Root, Miller and Hegler absorbed singles losses for SOC as did the doubles combo of Root and Singler.
