

13 Schools To Have Spikers in A-2 Test

A total of 13 schools will be represented Saturday when the District 6 A-2 track and field meet is conducted at Southern Oregon college's Fuller field in Ashland.

Taking part will be the first three places in each of two sub-district meets—the Rogue league and the Umpqua Valley league.

Five of the six field events are to start at 1 p.m. and the first running event, the high hurdles, is slated for 1:45 p.m. The sub-district meets served as preliminaries and each of the event at the full district affair will be a final with at least the top two places earning state meet spots.

All state schools of the Umpqua circuit will be represented. They are Douglas, Glendale, Clatskanie, Sutherlin, and Clatskanie. The Rogue league schools are Lakeview, as loop winners, and the Rogue delegation. Other schools are Rogue River, Eagle Point, Phoenix, Henley and Illinois Valley.

Yesterday each team got only three hits. Two of them for Butte Falls were two-run singles by Dan Remsen. The Loggers had the advantage of 10 bases on balls. Four of the walks were in the sixth inning and BF used them with one of Remsen's big hits in making five runs. Bill Cooper tripled for the Chiefs.

Butte Falls hurler Neal Ellis struck out 11 batters. He walked four.
