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Valley Fuel Moves To New Location

Valley Fuel company, operated by H. S. Deuel and Gain Robinson at 26 West Main st. for over 28 years, will move soon to new quarters at 11 West McAndrews rd.

The old building will be demolished soon to make room for new Crater Lake Motors quarters now under construction at North Fir and West Main sts.

Deuel and Robinson bought the company in 1931 from Harry Fredette. It was founded in 1908 by the late C. F. Reichstein. The present owners constructed the West Main st. building in 1933, when the nation's banks were closed, and they bartered fuel for building supplies.

The automatic ice vending machine which has stood at the site for 25 years will be moved across the street between the present Crater Lake Motor site and the railroad spur tracks.

The owners said the company will continue to operate the business under the same policies as in the past. They sell wood, coal and fuel oil.

Responsibility of Welfare Group Is To Give Assistance

The basic responsibility of the public welfare commission is to provide financial assistance to needy eligible persons. It also provides certain services to these persons and to many others not eligible for financial aid.

The laws governing public assistance are made by both the federal and state governments. The rules, policies and standards are made by the state public welfare commission and must conform to both state and federal laws.

In Jackson county the annual budget for public welfare is over \$1½ million. Approximately 50 per cent comes from the federal government and the balance is provided by the state and county government. The state provides 70 per cent of this balance and the county provides 30 per cent.

The cost of the program is high and the problems of the group needing financial aid are many.

The staff of the commission is committed to providing services to develop self support, self care, and to strengthen family life. These goals can be accomplished within caseworker's abilities and with the cooperation of the community.

The average citizen expects somewhat more from the welfare department than from the agriculture department, for example. If an individual qualifies for subsidies from a farm program, he accepts it and we object mildly in a general sort of way. However, if an individual qualifies for public assistance, as a taxpayer we believe he

Pioneer Publisher Dies in Klamath

Klamath Falls — E. J. Murray, 86, pioneer Oregon newspaper publisher, died in Klamath Falls Wednesday night. A native of Ireland, he moved to Klamath county via Portland in 1908, and in partnership with the late W. O. Smith founded the Klamath Republican.

Mr. Murray later purchased Smith's interest and the Republican merged with the Evening Herald, started by the Cronemiller family. Murray was sole owner and publisher for many years. He was described as an editor of the "old school," his editorial copy commenting on Klamath county's early turbulent era of civil strife and political upheaval.

In May, 1959, Murray was made a Knight of St. Gregory by Pope John XXIII, the third man to be so honored in the Pacific Northwest. The first was Dr. John McLoughlin, first territorial governor of Oregon.

Survivors include a nephew, Walter P. Hannon, 705 West Tenth st., Medford.
