Jeanne Jewett Resigns Public Welfare Post

Portland—(UPI)—Jeanne Jewett, Oregon public welfare administrator for the past 4½ years, announced her resignation today. She declined comment on whether the pending move of State Welfare Commission headquarters from Portland to Salem influenced the decision.

The resignation is effective June 30. Gov. Mark Hatfield, who ordered the commission move and who was involved in a dispute with commission members earlier in the year, said: "She served Oregon ably as its foremost social worker. We wish her well."

Miss Jewett took over the top welfare job in December of 1956. Before that she served four years as assistant administrator.

Rep. Grace Peck (D-Portland), chairman of the House Health and Welfare committee at the recent legislature, termed the resignation "a tragic thing for the people of Oregon."

She said Miss Jewett "... has been standing up and taking it on the chin and she waited until the legislative session was over before her resignation was submitted."

Rep. Peck said "I hope the next commission isn't a puppet commission." She added, "I hope he (the governor) has a chance to cool down a bit."

Miss Jewett's letter of resignation to commission members said that generally speaking "a low proportion of the Oregon population has received aid and such per capita aid has been relatively adequate in comparison with that provided by other states."

She added, "This in itself is not enough. The burden some cost of public welfare will not be reduced by small measures. We have not yet as a state, or even as a nation, faced up to conditions which cause dependency, and found ways of dealing effectively with them."

Miss Jewett began welfare work in 1933 as a case worker for Multnomah county.

Receiver Files Suit for \$10,000

Leland Knox, Medford accountant and court appointed receiver for the Medford Escrow company, has filed a complaint against the Globe Indemnity company for \$10,000 plus \$5,000 attorney's fees.

The Globe company was the insurer of employees of Medford Escrow company against any loss or misappropriation of funds.

According to the complaint, the escrow firm had two employees, Rachel Peterson Carter and O. H. Bengtson, insured for \$5,000 each.

As receiver for the escrow firm, Knox said that according to records of the Medford Escrow company it should have assets in excess of \$69,000. He said that people who have entrusted money with the firm have filed claims against the company totalling more than \$39,000.

Knox charges in the complaint that he has sent completed records to the Globe Indemnity company notifying them that Mrs. Peterson and Bengtson "acting in concert and together misappropriated and embezzled and took for their own use, large sums and amounts of money belonging to and entrusted to or deposited with the Medford Escrow company in trust by various persons."

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Korea President Resigns; Offers Apology To People

Cabinet Officers Support Revolt

Seoul, Korea—(UPI)—South Korea President Posun Yun, whose government was overthrown by military revolt, announced his resignation today with an apology for failing to improve conditions for the people of his country.

The resignation of President Yun, who had given his formal approval to the new military junta, came 24 hours after Premier John M. Chang and his cabinet quit their offices and threw support to the country's new leaders.

Comes as Surprise

Yun's action came as a surprise. Thursday, he had called on all Koreans to join in supporting the junta. Aides said he was apparently upset by the junta leader's statement that the revolutionary committee was the "supreme power organization" in the country.

Yun made the announcement of his resignation in a mimeographed statement distributed to newspapers from his office this morning.

Not Interference

Shortly before the resignation of President Yun, who was the last constitutional figurehead of the old government, still retaining office, Lt. Gen. Chang Do Yung, chairman of the revolutionary committee which has assumed power, said he did not consider U.S. opposition to the coup as interference in the internal affairs of South Korea. Chang made his statement to foreign newsmen at his ROK army headquarters.

The general made it clear that the military regime is strongly pro-American and anti-Communist.

Council Supports Southern Pacific

Three Medford city councilmen did a complete about face last night and threw their support to the Southern Pacific railroad in its efforts to gain control of the Western Pacific.

Their support was enough to give Southern Pacific a council resolution favoring it in its contest with the Santa Fe railroad to acquire control of the Western Pacific. The vote was 5 to 3.

Two weeks ago at its last meeting, the council had defeated a motion to give its support to the Santa Fe by a 4 to 3 vote. At that time no one spoke in favor of Southern Pacific and the four who voted against the Santa Fe resolution were in favor of tabling both requests since the matter, they said, was none of the council's business.

Voting in favor of Southern Pacific at the last meeting were Councilmen R. L. Van Sickle, Stanley Stark and Bill Singler. Last night all three voted in favor of Southern Pacific. They were joined by Councilman Jimmy Dunlevy and Fred Robinson.

Councilman Al Bradford, Donald Hanson and Robert Bacus still maintained that the matter was none of the council's concern and voted against the motion.

Two representatives from the Southern Pacific railroad, William D. Longmore, district agent, and George Joyce, trainmaster, spoke on behalf of the railroad last night. Longmore said the council should support SP because "anything that affects the Southern Pacific railroad can't help but affect Medford."

Permits Not Required At Lake at Present

Campfire permits are not required at Howard Prairie lake at the present time, the southwest district office of the state department of forestry reported this morning.

Bureau of land management land surrounding the lake is in the protection area of the state forestry department.

Restrictions concerning campfires are contemplated later in the season and will be announced at that time, the district office said.

The 60-Minute Impact

What Time It Will Be Still Subject of Much Discussion

What time it will be, and when, and where, after June 1 in southern Oregon (as in other sections of the state) continued to be the subject of discussion today.

There have been these developments resulting from the Retail Merchants Committee of the Medford Chamber of Commerce Wednesday announcing it would encourage "Southern Oregon Daylight Time."

1. The Medford city council last night decided to change its office hours from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., to 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. to conform as nearly as possible with those who set their clocks ahead an hour.

2. The Grants Pass Courier had this headline: "City Officially Won't Monkey With Clocks, But Residents Will."

3. An Illinois Valley businessman expressed this opinion: "We should stay on standard time, and then advertise in the Medford and Grants Pass newspapers to shop in Illinois Valley where the stores stay open late!"

4. The majority of merchants in Ashland voted yesterday to set their clock ahead one hour to conform with Medford to the north and Yreka to the south.

5. In many cases, the present state of time confusion has been blamed on the state legislature. Protest after protest had been voiced by indignant citizens to the Mail Tribune. And it was reported that an organized letter-writing campaign is under way to urge Gov. Mark Hatfield to call a special session of the legislature to end the "time mess."

6. Jackson County Judge Earl Miller said the county would remain on standard time, and there was no indication that courthouse office hours would be changed. Miller said he believed the legislature should convene for about 15 minutes to straighten out the situation.

Would Be Illegal

Medford City Attorney Joel Reeder expressed the opinion at last night's council meeting that it would be illegal for the city to set its clocks ahead one hour. Daylight saving time is legal in only five counties in northern Oregon.

The Grants Pass city council, in the same situation, voted to change its office hours to conform to the time of merchants and residents who set their clock ahead one hour.

The Grants Pass retail merchants discussed the time change at two meetings. Most of those involved in the discussions were reluctant to be a party to a decision to make any change, but agreed that a chaotic condition had been

created economically because of the southern Oregon "island" of standard time. Cave Junction Mayor Carroll Banks and Illinois Valley Chamber of Commerce President Myron Terpening agreed in voicing disapproval of Illinois Valley switching to some form of daylight time.

City Hours Will Change To Conform With New Time

The city of Medford joined the state-wide time hassle last night when the city council, by a 7 to 1 vote, changed the city hall working hours to conform with "Southern Oregon Daylight Time."

There will be no change of city hall clocks. But, city employees will start work at 7 a.m. and quit at 4 p.m. The change will become effective on June 1 and will run to Sept. 24 — the same period during which SODT will be effective.

Even though the working hours have been changed, it will still be 7 a.m. at the city hall when it is 8 a.m. in downtown department stores. And while city hall and downtown stores will open at the same time, the county courthouse and state offices will open an hour later.

Implications Not Discussed

But the implications of the city's action, if any, were not discussed last night. Only a last-minute reversal by Councilman R. L. Van Sickle kept the council's decision from being unanimous. He was the lone dissenter. Earlier in the meeting he had said he would go along on the matter.

The only objections to the council's action came from the audience where council critic William Doernbach, 143 Mace ave., declared: "I don't like to see this city's elective body pressured by a small group of businessmen to go along with them..."

Points to Election

Doernbach pointed out that the voters of Jackson county turned down the state-wide daylight saving time proposal on the November ballot by a margin of approximately 18,700 to 12,500.

Both Councilmen Robert Bacus and Donald Hanson reassured Doernbach that they were not going along with the downtown retail merchants, but were only doing it for city employees to give them an extra hour of daylight.

There was an embarrassing moment when City Manager Robert A. Duff suggested that the city hall summer work schedule extend from next Monday (May 29) to Sept. 24. It was quickly pointed out that the retail merchants were not going to change their clocks until June 1, and Duff hurriedly amended his suggestion to make summer hours effective in the city hall on that day also.

City Attorney Joel Reeder had earlier declared it was his opinion that it would be illegal for the city to change the clocks, but that the city manager could change the working hours.

Duff said: "Our first consideration is the convenience of the public." He said a receptionist would be on duty at the city hall from 4 to 5 p.m., to answer questions and explain the situation to citizens who may come to the city hall after the 4 p.m. closing hour.

Traffic To Slow Down On Baldock Freeway

Salem—(UPI)—Autos will have to slow down on a 10 mile stretch of the Salem-Portland freeway starting the middle of next week when the final stage of paving begins.

The job involves putting one and one-half inches of asphaltic concrete on the freeway from the Willamette river to Woodburn.

Staggered Shifts For State Crews Being Considered

Advancing Clocks Legally Impossible

Salem—(UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield marked time today on whether he will really two-time the capital city by permitting state employees to work on staggered shifts.

The governor told a Salem Chamber of Commerce delegation it appeared legally impossible to advance state working schedules one hour in order to keep pace with the Portland area which has daylight saving time.

Must Heed Legal Time

He said the law clearly leaves the balance of the state on standard time, and state offices must heed the legal time in providing many public services.

The governor said, however, he would "have to have the lawyers look over" the possibility of keeping offices open the final hour of the workday "with a skeleton crew."

The six-member delegation presented the Salem case at a brisk meeting in the governor's office at 8:30 a.m., standard time.

Business Said Hurt

Willard C. Marshall, president of the chamber, said the city's "business and industry are facing a very costly and frankly inefficient situation" as a result of many businesses in the rest of the state, as well as Portland, moving clocks ahead.

He asked the governor "not to change the clocks, we know that can't be done," but to advance work schedules.

He said a survey showed some 90 per cent of the people in the area favored fast time now.

Wearing Two Watches

Hatfield replied because of his frequent travels to Portland, "I'm caught in the same problem of wearing two watches."

But, he said, "there is one legal time... standard... any other is informal and unofficial."

As for putting state employees on staggered shifts, he added there is "also a problem of morale."

Second PT-N Hearing In Salem May 23

Salem—(UPI)—The second half of a hearing on the formation of Pacific Telephone Northwest as a corporation separate from Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. of California will be held here May 26.

For the first time in many a meeting, sharp disagreement was evident at a regular session of the Medford city council last night when the council tentatively declined to authorize the city manager to negotiate for a large piece of property.

The property — 52 acres of it — is located in south Medford north of Barnett rd. and extends along both sides of Bear creek. City officials tentatively propose to add the property to 31 acres of city-owned land in the area and make it into a large central city park.

Although five of the eight city councilmen favored a motion that would authorize the city manager to negotiate for the land, the proposal failed because it lacked a three-quarters majority which is necessary to pass proposals coming before the council for the first time.

Enough To Pass It

If the matter is brought before the council at its next meeting, and there is every reason to believe that it will be, the same 5 to 3 vote would be enough to pass it.

While anything more than token disagreement is unusual at a public council meeting, last night found the council

LEADERS SLATE VIENNA MEETING JUNE 3 AND 4

Washington—(UPI)—President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev will meet in Vienna June 3 and 4 for a general exchange of major U.S.-Russian differences, the White House announced today.

The White House said the conference will provide "a timely and convenient opportunity for the first personal contact" between the President and premier.

Following the Vienna meeting, Kennedy will travel to London for a brief session with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

It was emphasized that the Kennedy-Khrushchev conference will be confined to "the major issues which affect the relationships" between the United States and Russia.

Will Not Negotiate

The White House statement said the "big two" will not negotiate nor try to reach agreements on cold war problems involving other countries.

The President will have his first meeting with Khrushchev immediately after his previously announced talks with French President Charles de Gaulle in Paris, May 31-June 2.

Kennedy and Khrushchev will have their first together against a backdrop of crisis that have developed since the President entered the White House. Serious developments pitting the Free World against communism have flared in the Congo, Cuba, Laos and South Viet Nam.

Nuclear test ban talks at Geneva have bogged down in a stalemate. Kennedy is reported intent on convincing the Soviet premier of the seriousness with which he regards a genuine test ban agreement as the keystone of general disarmament.

The Kennedy-Khrushchev conference and the President's plans to meet with Macmillan were announced simultaneously in Washington, Moscow and London. It was announced in London that Kennedy will dine with Queen Elizabeth when he visits the British capital.

Kennedy Took Initiative

It was learned here that it was Kennedy who proposed and Khrushchev who agreed on Vienna as the site. The President also went on from the Soviet leader that the meeting should be an informal one with no effort to negotiate.

Kennedy probably will be accompanied to Vienna by a small group consisting of Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Assistant Secretary of State for Europe, Foy Kohler, his Soviet adviser, Charles E. Bohlen, White House aide George Bundy and at most one or two others.

Officials reported that the United States won the consent of the major European allies before agreeing to the conference. They shun calling it a summit conference in the sense of involving elaborate negotiating sessions.

almost evenly divided over whether to go fast or slow on the park property proposal.

Councilman R. L. Van Sickle, who stated: "I can't be hurried into this thing," said he doubts that the city needs the park property, and indicated he would favor using the money to develop undeveloped park property already owned by the city. He cited Jackson park as an example.

Councilman Stanley Stark declared he agreed with Van Sickle that the city is "rushing into it." He said he opposed the matter at this time because the city has no park plan for park development, and therefore "we have no assurance that this would be of value in the future."

Price Is Scaring

Councilman Fred Robinson agreed with Van Sickle and Stark saying the price "scared me."

To purchase the property the city would use approximately \$160,000 that was received from the state for freeway right-of-way across Hawthorne park. The money has been earmarked for park purposes.

On the other side of the ledger, Councilman Donald Hanson said the land is "ideal."

Four Juveniles Admit Vandalism In Rose Garden

Eagle Point—Four juvenile boys have admitted destroying four rose plants and damaging a tulip tree in a garden owned by Jake Olsen, 58 Main st., Eagle Point, according to Oran Chastain, Eagle Point marshal.

Olsen reported that three climbing roses were cut near the ground, one climber rose pulled from the ground and a tulip tree sawed through the trunk Tuesday night. He had spent more than 10 years perfecting the roses as a hobby.

The tulip tree was scheduled to bloom for the first time this year.

Three of the youths are from Eagle Point. The fourth lives in Prospect but attends school in Eagle Point.

Chastain said the boys admitted the vandalism shortly before noon today. He was still questioning them early this afternoon. When asked if the boys had given any reason for their action, he said, "Not a reasonable one."

Public sentiment has been aroused over the incident, he said. "Whoever did this is really sick," one resident said.

An Eagle Point Grange spokesman said, "Whoever was responsible for this destruction should be required to read everyone of the 7,000 letters of appreciation the Grange received as a result of the Grange tree planting program."

Mother and Friend Waive Extradition

Oakland, Calif.—(UPI)—A young mother and her teenage girl friend waived an extradition hearing in Municipal Court today and will leave Saturday morning to Oregon in connection with the deaths of two small children.

Mrs. Gertrude Mae Jackson, 25, and the friend, Jeanne Joan Freeman, 19, were arrested here on an Oregon warrant in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Jackson's children, Larry, 6, and Martha, 4. The nude bodies of the youngsters were found in a 350-foot gorge in central Oregon.
