Salem—Gov. Mark Hatfield castigated the 1961 legislature today for failing to take steps to end highway carnage, and declared "I shall not quit this fight" for traffic safety laws.

## Gore Attacks Joint Chiefs

Washington—Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) said today the Joint Chiefs of Staff should be removed and replaced with "new, wiser and able men" in view of the failure of the Cuban exile invasions.

Gore made the statement after leaving a closed door meeting of the Senate foreign relations subcommittee on Latin America at which Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chairman of the joint chiefs, was being questioned about the Pentagon's role in the ill-fated invasion attempt.

The Tennessee Democrat told newsmen: "I have reached the conclusion on my own that we definitely need a new chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and new members."

Gore said he had reached the judgment partly on the basis of what he heard during the questioning of Lemnitzer but indicated that other factors may have had a part in his opinion.

At the outset of the closed-door hearing, Subcommittee Chairman Wayne L. Morse (D-Ore.) said he was determined to pinpoint the role played by U.S. military authorities in the unsuccessful invasion.

## Kennedy Endorses Federal Judge Bill

Washington—President Kennedy today signed a bill giving him authority to appoint 73 new federal judges to help tackle the pile-up of legal cases which has snarled U.S. Circuit and District courts.

In addition to helping federal courts catch up with their work, the new law gives Kennedy a huge block of politically potent patronage to distribute.

Federal judgeships are particularly highly regarded because they are for lifetime tenure. The 10 new circuit judgeships pay \$25,000 a year each; the 63 district judgeships pay \$22,500.

"I shall not quit this fight... I ask, yes beg, your support," Hatfield told the group.

Without passage of sound laws, Hatfield said, law enforcement agencies are prevented from acting firmly, and "no feat of highway construction can make us safe from drunk and reckless drivers."

The other two, Bob Shane and Nick Reynolds, will continue as the Kingston Trio with a new partner, Werber said.

## Notable Results Not Expected; Europe Concerned

London—America's allies around the world expressed guarded approval today of the idea of a meeting between President Kennedy and Premier Nikita Khrushchev but warned against any expectation that it would produce notable results.

Russia and its satellites were expected also to welcome the idea on the theory that the Communist world had nothing to lose and might perhaps gain something from such a meeting.

U.S. allies in Europe were publicly optimistic about the Kennedy-Khrushchev talks, but expressed private concern over the possibility that they would be bypassed in "big two" dealings with world affairs.

French President Charles de Gaulle, who believes he is entitled to a decisive share in shaping Western policy, was believed to be cool to the idea of the meeting. Observers in Paris believed, however, that de Gaulle might be pacified by the fact that Kennedy will see him before meeting Khrushchev.

Allied officials in Geneva and at Atlantic Pact headquarters in Paris were apprehensive about the possibility that a Kennedy-Khrushchev meeting would lead to similar individual approaches to the Kremlin by other Western leaders, giving the Russians a chance to undermine Western unity.

Ashland Reacts Favorably To Daylight Time

Ted Rogers, an Illinois Valley service station operator, suggested advertising in Medford and Grants Pass newspapers that the Illinois Valley stores would stay open longer.

The retail trades committee and the board of directors of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce yesterday discussed the proposal, and expressed general favorable reaction to going on daylight time.

One Dissenting Vote

Chamber President Archie Fries, Jr., said there was one dissenting vote among those expressing their opinions at the meeting, which was attended by about 22 persons.

Fries said yesterday "What else can we do with Medford on one side and Yreka on the other, and both of them on daylight time?"

There was some indication that Ashland may attempt to go on daylight time. City Superintendent Elmer Biegel said yesterday it was done once before, and said a special council meeting would be called as soon as possible to make a decision.

Biegel indicated this morning that the Ashland council probably would discuss changing the hours of city employees. He noted that any change would not affect operation of the city government in any way.

In line with this, Lt. Gen. Carter B. Magruder, commander of U.S. and United Nations troops in Korea, and Marshall Green, senior officer at the U.S. Embassy in Seoul, made a futile attempt to sidetrack the revolt in a meeting with Korean President Posun Yung on the day the coup started.

The Korean president met with them for three hours after a small group of army generals and colonels seized the capital Tuesday.

At this stage the coup could have gone either way. Outside Seoul the bulk of army commanders still were neutral. They would not join the rebels. Nor would they launch bloody civil war by attacking them.

President Yung wanted to know which way the United States stood. Green and Magruder told him they were strongly opposed to settling Korea's problems by non-constitutional means, that this could set a pattern for coup after coup in the years ahead.

The President said the regime of Premier John M. Chang, one of his oldest political foes, was corrupt and needed throwing out, that the rebels had a good platform.

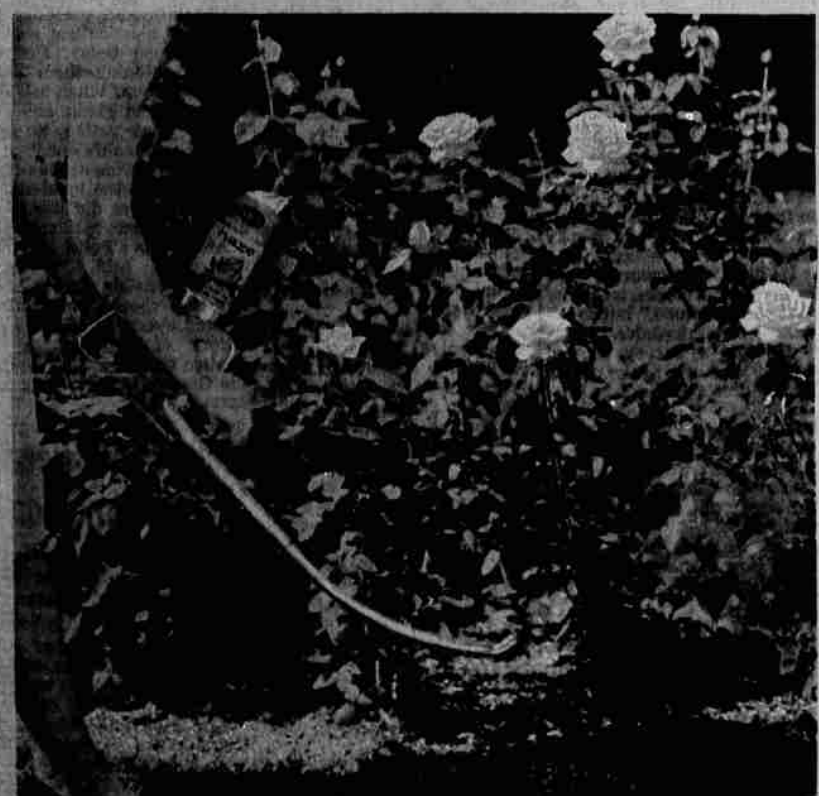

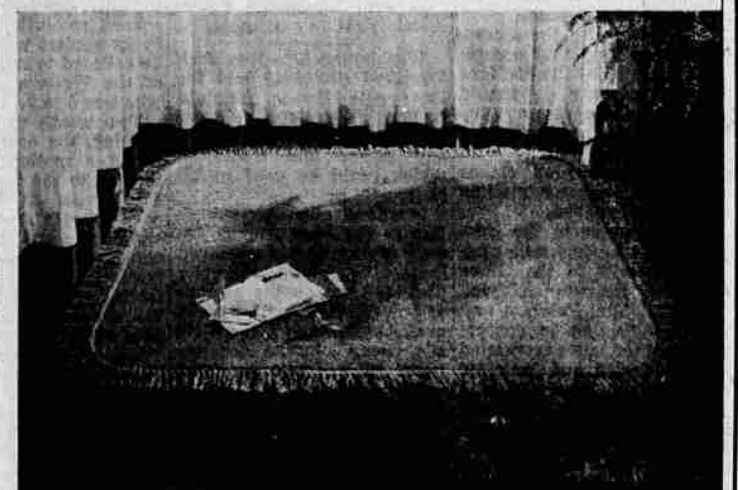
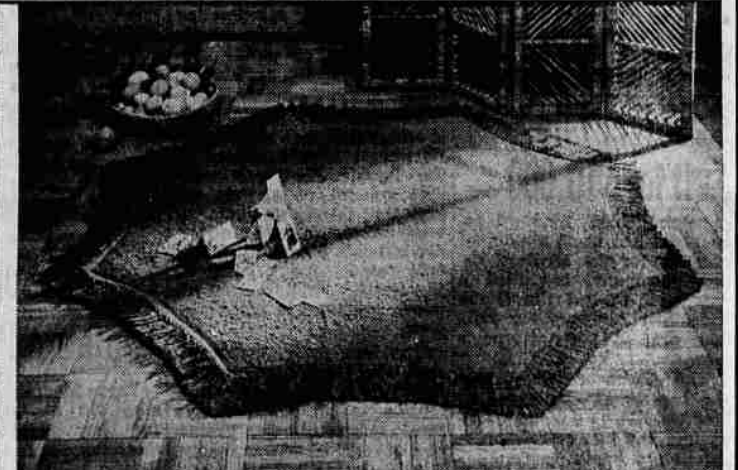
