

Du Pont Ordered To Get Rid of Stock in General Motors

Medford JCs Announce Annual Clean-Up Drive

"Spring up to the Clean up," is the slogan this year for the annual Medford Junior Chamber of Commerce make-Medford-beautiful campaign.

Although keeping Medford beautiful is a year-round project, local Jaycees have declared May 22 to June 24 as the 1961 project period. Most city officials, including personnel of the City Sanitary service, the Medford street department, and the police and fire departments are supporting the campaign.

A one-day pick up service will be conducted throughout the city Wednesday, May 24, by City Sanitary Service. Grass clippings, weeds, and other rubbish must be boxed, sacked, or in some way bundled and tied securely with twine or wire, according to Jaycee spokesmen.

Only the equivalent of two or three boxes, or two "gunny" sacks, with a total weight of less than 50 pounds of refuse is desired. Nothing over four feet long can be taken.

Senator Still in Critical Condition

Portland—UPI—State Senator Robert White (R-Salem) remained in critical condition at the University of Oregon Medical hospital here today.

White, 44, who was stricken with cancer and admitted to the hospital April 27, was placed on the critical list Saturday.

White served two terms as mayor of Salem. He is a former president of the League of Oregon Cities. A hospital spokesman said White was not permitted to have visitors.

'Cradle of Confederacy' Picked In Anti-Segregation Showdown

Editor's note: Racial violence in Montgomery, Ala., this week and apparently prompted selection of the "cradle of the Confederacy" as a "showdown" spot for the anti-segregation goals of Southern Negro leaders. The goals of the Kennedy administration, and white Southern resistance. The background and issues at stake are shown here in this dispatch compiled from interviews and personal observations by United Press International staff correspondents in Montgomery, Birmingham, and Nashville, Tenn.

Montgomery, Ala. — UPI — "We are prepared to die," the young ministerial student said in his hospital room.

"These beatings cannot deter us from our purpose. We are not martyrs or publicity seekers. We want only equality and justice, and we will get it."

The speaker was James

Zweig, 21, of Appleton, Wis. He lay in a Roman Catholic hospital in the Deep South city known as "the cradle of the Confederacy." The day before, a white mob had beaten him into insensibility on the sidewalk outside the Greyhound bus terminal.

Zweig is white. Zweig, a white man, is a student at Fisk university in Nashville, Tenn. Fisk is primarily a Negro institution.

Zweig came to Montgomery Saturday aboard a bus with a group of Negro students, also from Nashville. The group also included two white girls, Susan Wilber, 18, of Nashville, and Susan Herrman, 20, of Los Angeles.

When he stepped off the

bus, a white woman pointed at him and screamed: "Kill the Nigger-loving —"

Four bearded youths leaped on Zweig. Others started after his companions. William F. Barbee, 19, a Negro student at the American Baptist Theological Seminary in Nashville, was clubbed unconscious. A personal representative of President Kennedy was knocked unconscious when he tried to help the two white girls.

Mob Mauls Newsman Reporters and cameramen from newspapers, radio and television stations, news magazines and TV networks were mauled by the mob. It was over in a few minutes.

The Justice department in Washington rushed 400 U. S. marshals to Montgomery. Negroes called a meeting of their top leaders in Montgomery to plan widespread campaigns on segregation. There were rumblings from the Ku Klux Klan and other extremist groups.

Sunday night, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., leader of the integration movement in the South, addressed the Negro rally at a downtown church.

While King spoke, a mob of white youths overturned a car outside the church and set it afire. Then they tossed rocks and stones at the federal marshals. Local police converged on the scene and the battle was on.

Declares Martial Law Gov. John Patterson immediately issued a proclamation of "qualified" martial law and told state Adjutant Gen. Henry V. Graham to use the National Guardmen "to assist and supplement" state and local police.

Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy was talking with reporters in Washington, unaware the violence had again erupted despite the presence of federal police.

"Let us have a return to reason," Kennedy said. "Violence will serve only to make an already bad situation worse."

It appeared the extremists were disregarding the pleas of the attorney general.

Montgomery had come — almost by accident — the showdown spot.

Supreme Court Directs Judgment Within 60 Days

Washington —UPI— The Supreme Court ruled today that E. I. du Pont de Nemours & Co., must get rid of its 63 million shares of General Motors stock.

The 4-3 decision was a victory for the Justice Department, which has been insisting for years that only by a complete divestiture could Du Pont "cure" its illegal relationship to the giant General Motors Corp.

Justices Tom C. Clark, who was connected with the case when he was attorney general, and John M. Harlan, who represented Du Pont in private practice, did not participate in the decision.

Early Solution Urged

Justice William J. Brennan Jr. spoke for the majority. He returned the case to U. S. District Court in Chicago, where he suggested that this "already protracted litigation" be concluded as soon as possible.

Brennan directed the lower court to enter an order requiring du Pont to file within 60 days a proposed judgment providing for complete divestiture of its General Motors stock, to commence within 90 days and to be completed within 10 years.

The Justice Department must give its views on the du Pont proposals 30 days after it gets them.

"The district court shall give precedence to this cause on its calendar," Brennan said.

Last February when the case was argued before the Supreme Court, the stock was worth about \$2.7 billion on the New York Stock Exchange. It is about 23 per cent of GM's outstanding stock.

Violation of Law

In 1937, the Supreme Court found that du Pont's ownership of this bloc was a violation of the Clayton antitrust law. The statute bars stock acquisitions where the effect "may be substantially to lessen competition or to tend to create a monopoly."

But U. S. District Judge Walter J. La Buy of Chicago ruled that du Pont could keep the stock but not vote it. The voting rights were passed along to holders of du Pont stock in proportion to shares owned. Du Pont directors were barred from serving on the GM board.

Portland Church Damaged by Flames

Portland—UPI—A three-alarm fire caused \$40,000 damages to a church Sunday afternoon.

The blaze damaged the St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal church. No one was in the building at the time.

Firemen said the center wing of the church annex and about half the chapel were destroyed but the church proper was not damaged.

Two firemen suffered minor injuries.

The blaze, of undetermined origin, apparently started near the foot of a stairway in the annex basement.

WHITE COLLAR WORKERS

Mexborough, England —UPI— Street cleaners here will be able to wear their Sunday best to and from their jobs. The town council has provided them dressing rooms because "dustmen (street cleaners) are very important workers and there is no reason why they should not go to work looking like any other office worker or businessman."

Medford Youth Pleads Innocent in OSU Riots

Grant A. Quinney, 18, Medford, pleaded innocent Friday to charges of disorderly conduct after rioters damaged two campus buildings at Oregon State university early last week.

Quinney's trial was set for June 7 in Corvallis Municipal court. He was one of seven Oregon State students arrested Wednesday night.

The riots started as a water balloon fight along fraternity row, according to the dean of men, Dr. Dan Poling. He said about 300 students were involved. The riots lasted about an hour.

After the police arrived the throng reportedly toppled two guard houses at the campus entrance and kicked the glass windows out.

This increases to 22½ million dollars the total investment Portland is making in its terminal and cargo handling facilities.

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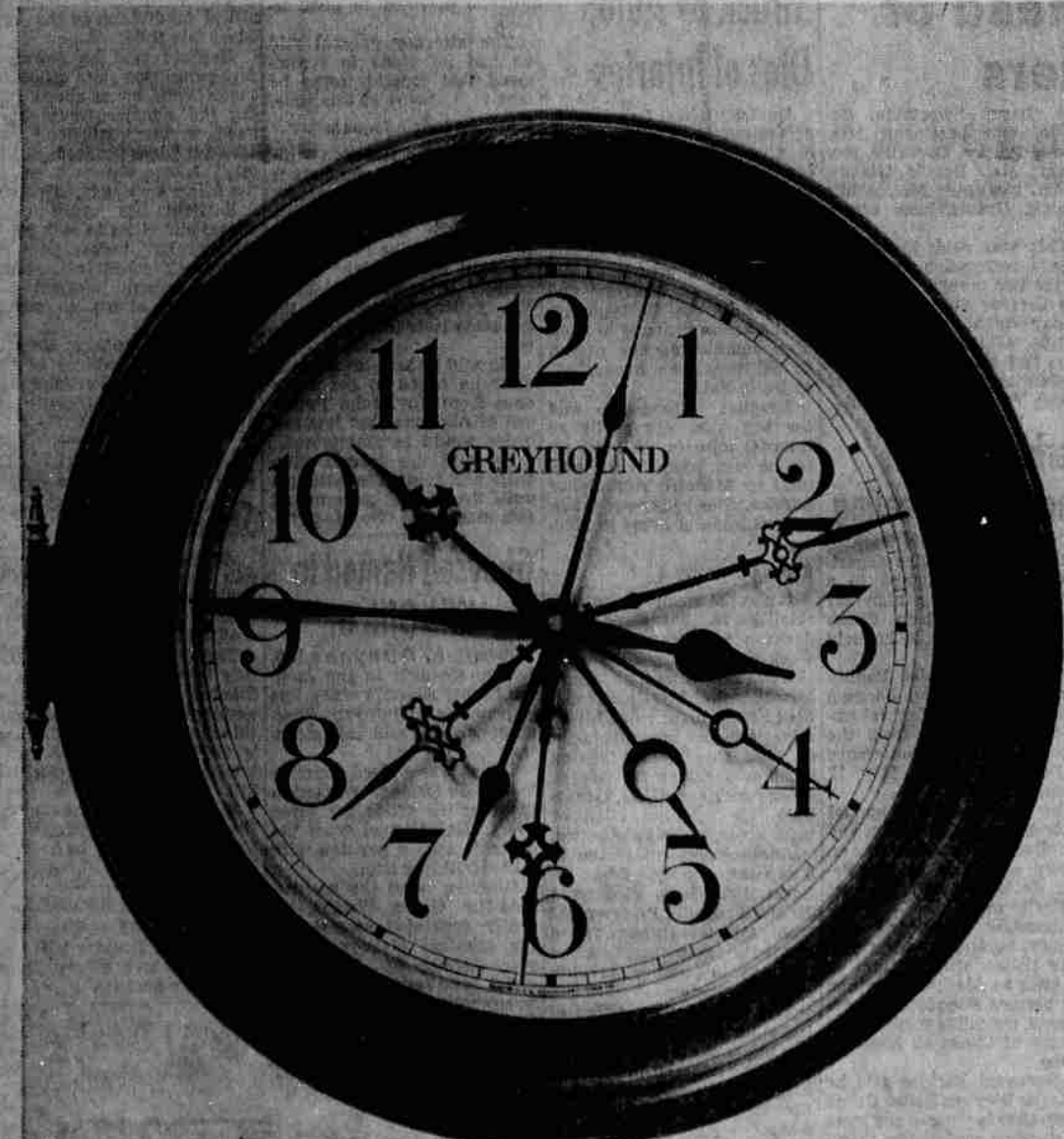
Portland, rallied by its
