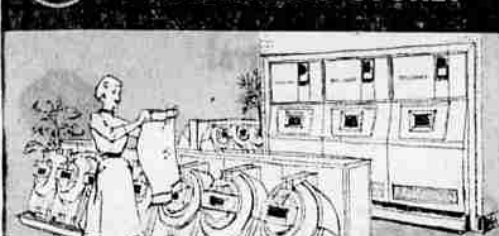
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Local Students IN University Madrigal Group

The group repeated the concert in Portland on April 10.



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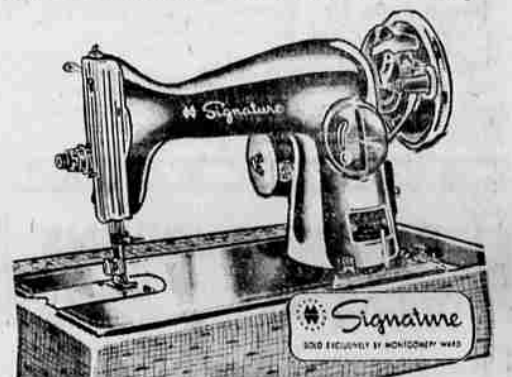
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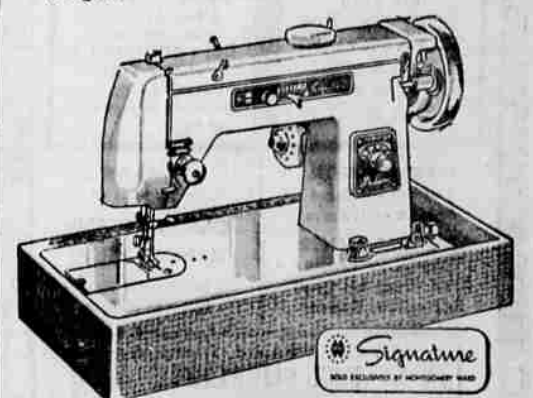
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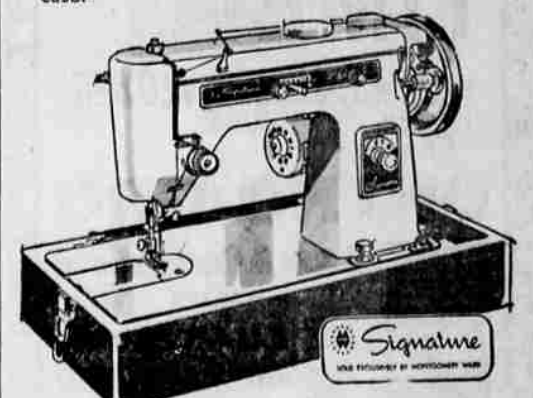
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
