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## Americans Said More Conscious Of News Events

Seattle — (UPI) — Only a well-informed American public can stand up under the tensions, pressures, and demands of the atomic age, Frank H. Bartholomew, chairman of the board of United Press International, said today.

Bartholomew said Americans are more conscious of news, and more interested in it, than at any other time in history. He spoke at a lunch of the Washington State Association of Broadcasters.

"I believe today that news is the greatest bargain that goes into radio programming or into the production of a daily newspaper," he said.

"We are happy in our part of this accomplishment and will continue to do our best to try to hold the line."

Time was when relatively few Americans cared about what happened beyond their own town or city. They were comfortably insulated behind oceans and armies. Those days are gone. The world, not the city hall, is America's backyard of interest. One country's problem is another country's problem.

"A crisis in Viet Nam or West Berlin or Geneva can affect as many lives in Seattle as a city government action. Each world crisis is translated into such basic personal interests as 'survival,' 'possible military service,' or 'increased taxes.' What can be more local, in terms of your listeners, than death, personal discomfort, or taxes?"

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## Dirksen Scores Easy Victory in Illinois Primary

Chicago — (UPI) — Returns from Illinois' first-of-the-year primary gave Senate Minority Leader Everett M. Dirksen an unexpected bonus and his Democratic opponent, Rep. Sidney R. Yates, a surprise setback today.

Dirksen, a wise and wily veteran of Illinois political wars, and Yates, the hand-

picked protégé of Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley, both coasted to senatorial nominations as expected in Tuesday's first major primary of 1962.

But a man who campaigns in an Uncle Sam suit whose middle name is legally "America First" dimmed Yates' showing.

Surprise Vote Getter  
Lat (America First) Daley, a Chicago jobber who habitually runs and loses in Illinois elections, took more than 20 per cent of the Democratic primary vote away from Yates. Most of his unlooked-for total was collected in Chicago, where Yates has been a congressman for seven years and where the power of Mayor Daley is supposed to be unquestioned.

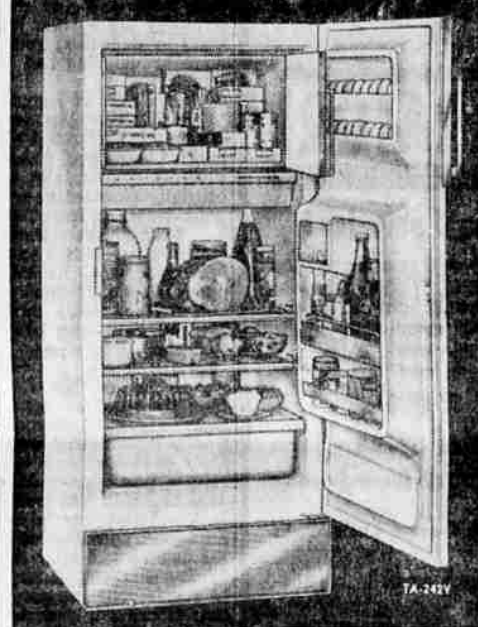
