

Court Order Ends New York Teacher Strike

Pickets Withdraw; Schools Reopen Without Incident

New York—(UPI)—Nearly 20,000 striking public school teachers returned to their classrooms today after a one-day walkout that was ended by a state Supreme Court injunction.

A spokesman for the Board of Education reported that all schools opened this morning without incident. Picket lines which were withdrawn Wednesday night under threat of arrest, were not reestablished.

Union leaders reluctantly complied with an injunction which forbade continuation of the strike in any form. The writ was obtained by the Board of Education under the

state Condon-Wadlin law which outlaws strikes by public employees.

Outbreaks By Students
The decision ended a bitter one-day walkout that led to outbreaks by students in under-supervised classrooms across the city.

The United Federation of Teachers which called the strike when its demands for a \$53 million pay package were rejected, agreed early today

to obey the injunction obtained by the Board of Education. The strike, which affected nearly all of the city's 840 public schools, came to an end after a stormy, seven-hour meeting of the union's executive board.

Entailed Penalties, Fines
UFT President Charles Cohen said the union agreed to the court order because it entailed penalties of jail

sentences and severe fines for the rank and file teachers.

The injunction that ended the walkout was granted by State Supreme Court Justice William C. Hecht who said that teachers, as professionals dealing in a vital public service, are barred from striking on the same grounds as are doctors, nurses, policemen and firemen.

More than half of the city's 39,681 teachers joined in the walkout and the resulting

lack of supervision led to riots in several classrooms which were transformed into scenes resembling those from the film "Blackboard Jungle."

Teachers Helpless
The worst trouble was at Seward Park High school on the lower East side, where 1,000 of the school's 3,500 pupils went on a rampage.

The 40 teachers who were inside the school stood helplessly while students ran screaming through the corridors, throwing books, eggs, and cartons of water at one another.

Similar disturbances were reported at a number of other schools and extra police were called in to crush the brawls.

Negotiations which failed to resolve the dispute were carried on in an atmosphere of mounting resentment, aggravated by a political hassle between Democratic Mayor Robert F. Wagner and Repub-

lican Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller over state financial aid to education.

Senate Confirms White's Nomination
Washington—(UPI)—The Senate unanimously confirmed by voice vote Wednesday the nomination of Deputy Atty. Gen. Byron R. White as an associate justice of the Supreme Court.

Duncan Says Flagrant Abuse of Public Interest Shown by Steel Firms Will Not Be Tolerated

Springfield—(UPI)—The hike in steel prices by major steel firms is a "flagrant abuse of the public interest that cannot and will not be tolerated," House Speaker Robert B. Duncan (D-Medford), declared here Wednesday night.

Addressing a local of the United Steelworkers of America, Duncan said steel companies "have in effect told everyone in the United States that they have no concern or responsibility for the interest of the public."

"They have not only broken faith with the United Steelworkers, who exercised admirable restraint in recent negotiations to prevent another inflationary cycle, but have broken faith with each of us," he said.

Duncan, seeking the Democratic nomination for the fourth district seat in Congress, said the steel firms have "added a burden of millions of dollars to our national debt to say nothing of the

loss of purchasing power that will hit the average citizen hard."

Duncan said he has no doubt that "corrective action in some form will be taken,

probably through use of the anti-trust laws. Manifest abuses have always resulted in public counteraction, and there is no reason not to expect the same reaction in this situation."

Stocks Show Sharp Reaction To JFK's Steel Price Blast

New York—(UPI)—Stocks broke sharply in heavy early trading today, reacting to President Kennedy's slambang attack on the steel industry's price increase.

Not one group escaped the pressure and not a single stock on the board managed a point gain while at least 60 fell a point or more.

Losses in steels generally ran from 1 to 2 points and slightly smaller declines dotted the blue chip list.

22 INJURED IN ATHENS DEMONSTRATION
Athens—(UPI)—Twenty-two students and policemen were injured Wednesday in a clash which developed when police stopped the students from staging a protest march on the ministry of education here. Authorities said 11 students and 11 policemen were hospitalized.

PORTUGUESE SHIP TO PICK UP PRISONERS
Lourenco Marques, Mozambique—(UPI)—The Portuguese ship Patria was scheduled to sail for Pakistan today to pick up Portuguese prisoners captured during the Indian invasion of Goa.

RED CHINA ISSUES 196th 'SERIOUS' WARNING
Tokyo—(UPI)—Communist China Wednesday issued its 196th "serious" warning against alleged violations of its waters by two American warships and of its air space by a U.S. military plane. The official Communist New China news agency made the charges in a broadcast monitored here.

VIET CONG GUERRILLAS REPULSED
Tokyo—(UPI)—About 100 Communist Viet Cong guerrillas were repulsed Wednesday when they attacked a South Vietnamese army outpost at the village of Cai Be in southern Kien Phong province, according to a Viet Nam press agency dispatch received here today.

U.S. LOANS MONEY TO STATE OF KERALA
Trivandrum, India—(UPI)—U.S. Ambassador to India John Kenneth Galbraith has announced a \$50 million loan to the state of Kerala, which once had a Communist government. Galbraith said \$20 million of the loan will be in American currency and earmarked to develop Kerala's hydro-electric power.

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
