TO BE CONDUCTOR
Portland - The way apparently was clear today for Jacques Singer to accept a position as conductor of the Portland Symphony Orchestra.

Dr. Stevenson noted that there has been an increasing retention rate for students. This, he said, is caused by a new guidance and counseling program in order to combat the "drop out" problem common to lower-division students in colleges.

He noted that the number of students new to the college has increased by more than 70 per cent, a condition which he ascribed in part to the fact that young people of today are becoming more aware of the need for higher education.

Various amendments have been proposed, but Hunt said that unless someone can prove to him the law can be greatly overhauled, he will press for total repeal.

Hunt said he has had complaints from ambulance drivers at Woodburn and Silverton and letters from Bend and other areas.

This is the law - accompanied by regulations by the State Board of Health - that many volunteer ambulance operators have hotly protested. Supporters say it is intended to upgrade the ambulance profession, but volunteer operators say such provisions as new fees and uniforms are putting them out of business.

Late registrations because of delayed transcripts, illness or other reasons may swell the record enrollment more, Dr. Stevenson noted.

Dr. Stevenson said there are a number of factors which contribute to the increased enrollment.

Among them are increased curriculum offerings, including a more flexible general studies degree which allows students to obtain a four-year degree; teacher education which reflects the training in these fields and the fact that conditions for teachers have improved; and the master's degree program, which is now on an all year basis instead of limited to the summer sessions.

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Sex Offender Program Discussed

Portland - Development of a pilot program for Oregon institutions to help sex offenders was discussed at a legislative subcommittee meeting here Wednesday.

It was one of several points which were tentatively outlined by the Legislative Interim Subcommittee on Sex Offenders for consideration as possible legislative recommendations.

Members said they considered a separate institution unnecessary but did special treatment for offenders was desirable.

The group also discussed new means of prosecution of sex offenders, mandatory registration of all persons convicted of sex crimes and a complete central reporting and identification system of sex offenders arrested.

Ambulance Repeal Measure Drafted
