Your Money's Worth

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THE TEN MOST FAVORED STOCKS

Standard Oil of New Jersey, American Telephone, Du Pont, Texaco, Union Carbide, U.S. Steel, International Business Machines, Standard Oil of California, Gulf Oil, General Motors.

Outside of the obvious fact that these are among the largest corporations in the U.S. with names known the world over, what do these 10 companies have in common?

This: the stocks of each of the 10 show up on every major list of "Favorite 50" stocks of investors - ranging from the leading institutions of the country to the smallest investor.

Each of the 10 appears on the list of the 50 stocks most favored by over 1,600 of the nation's top institutional investors - such as pension funds, endowment funds, trust funds, mutual funds.

Each of the 10 appears on the list of the 50 stocks most favored by small investors buying stocks via the monthly investment plan and investing as little as \$40 every three months.

And today, in the "Exchange Magazine," each of the 10 appears again on the first list ever published breaking down the holdings of the 26 closed-end investment companies listed on the New York Stock Exchange. (A closed-end investment company uses funds at its disposal to buy the securities of other companies; closed-end investment companies differ from mutual funds in that they have a fixed number of shares outstanding while the total outstanding of mutual or open-end funds constantly fluctuates as these funds buy and sell their own shares.)

These are solid favorites indeed - of the pros as well as of those presumed to be amateurs. Why?

Consider Standard Oil of New Jersey, first on the list of institutional investors, sixth on the list of the closed-end investment companies, eighth on the list of small investors.

In Jersey Standard's case, the dominant reason for its popularity is the annual income it offers investors. At the year-end, it was returning buyers an annual yield of 4.9 per cent and it has paid at least one cash dividend a year since 1899.

Consider American Telephone, fourth on the list of institutional investors, 12th on the list of the closed-end investment companies, third on the list of small investors.

Here, the reasons for enduring popularity are safety and continuity of income. Telephone has paid dividends every year since 1881 - and in all but the first two of the 81 years, the payments have been made quarterly without a miss.

Recently, too, telephone has taken on the characteristics of a growth and glamour stock.

Consider IBM, 11th on the list of institutional investors, third on the list of the closed-end investment companies, second on the list of small investors.

As a growth stock, IBM has been almost in a class by itself in recent years. Between 1950 and 1961, its sales skyrocketed 568.3 per cent and its profits soared 356.7 per cent. For income, it is a ridiculous holding. At the year-end, it was yielding an annual return of less than 1/2 of 1 per cent.

Safety, income, growth - any of these or a combination of them may be the force behind the popularity of the 10, and that leads into the significant fact that the professionals are frequently buying and selling the identical favorites. In the last three months of 1961, for instance, the Exchange Magazine disclosed that two investment companies bought 1,311 shares of IBM while one sold 500 shares, two bought 30,300 shares of Jersey Standard while one sold 2,000 shares.

One company might have been cashing in on a capital gain while another might have been anticipating a potential gain, one might have been selling because of disappointment over the stock's price action while another might have been buying the same stock for income. Timing of action and the objective of investment - these are key factors.

There's no missing the central point, though. As of spring, 1962, the 10 named in this report are the elite among the stocks of the United States.

On the Air

Starting Monday the familiar face of Douglas Edwards will be missing from the CBS daily 6:15 p.m. newscast. In his place will be the equally familiar face of Walter Cronkite.

According to the brief press announcement from Richard S. Salant, president of CBS News, "Douglas Edwards will assume a greatly increased schedule of informational programming, including important network assignments such as CBS Reports and other news and public affairs specials."

This does not tell the whole story, however. The Edwards-Cronkite switch is but one development in the battle between CBS brass and newsmen that first began when Edward R. Murrow quit the network after publicly criticizing CBS President Frank Stanton.

Howard K. Smith followed in November, 1961, when CBS bosses felt his outspoken broadcasts were infringing on the network ban on editorializing. Sig Mickel-

Smith working under former Presidential press secretary James C. Hagerty. But it is to combat the attraction of NBC's Huntley-Brinkley-Simmes twin act that Doug Edwards is making room for Cronkite, whose viewer appeal has rocked with his coverage of the Mercury flight.

Reduction in Spring Vegetable Crop Forecast

Washington - (UPI) - The Agriculture Department has forecast a 19 per cent reduction in spring vegetables from last year's output.

This estimate was based on production forecasts of crops making up three-fourths of the usual spring vegetable total, excluding melons.

The department said substantially lower production is indicated for spring cabbage, celery, cucumbers, eggplant, lettuce, green peas, and green peppers. Expanded production is indicated for beets, carrots, and sweet corn.

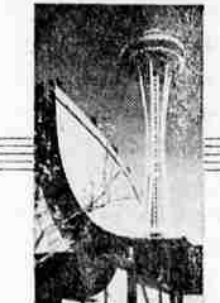
Growth Retarded

Below normal March temperatures in winter and spring production areas retarded growth and lowered supplies during the month. In California, temperatures were below normal for the entire month and shipments were reduced. Development of vegetable crops also was behind normal in Arizona and New Mexico. Cool weather retarded Texas vegetable growth early in March. Most Texas areas were in need of rain by the end of the month. High winds and freezing temperatures caused some damage in Florida.

\$7,500 already given the Navy for the appraisal. The board is concluding final details of the space age project so that Boeing Co., Seattle, can occupy the site for testing.

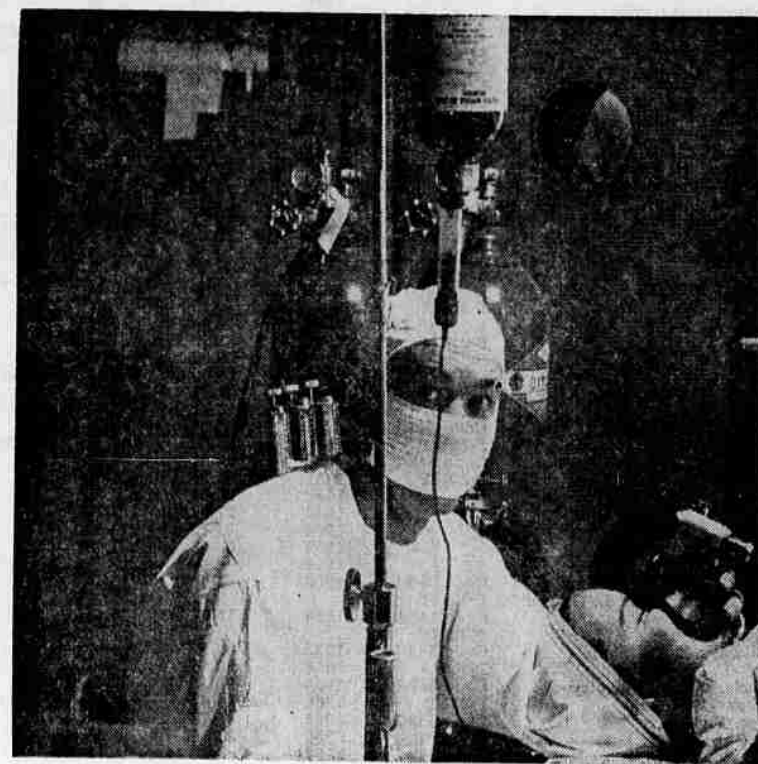
