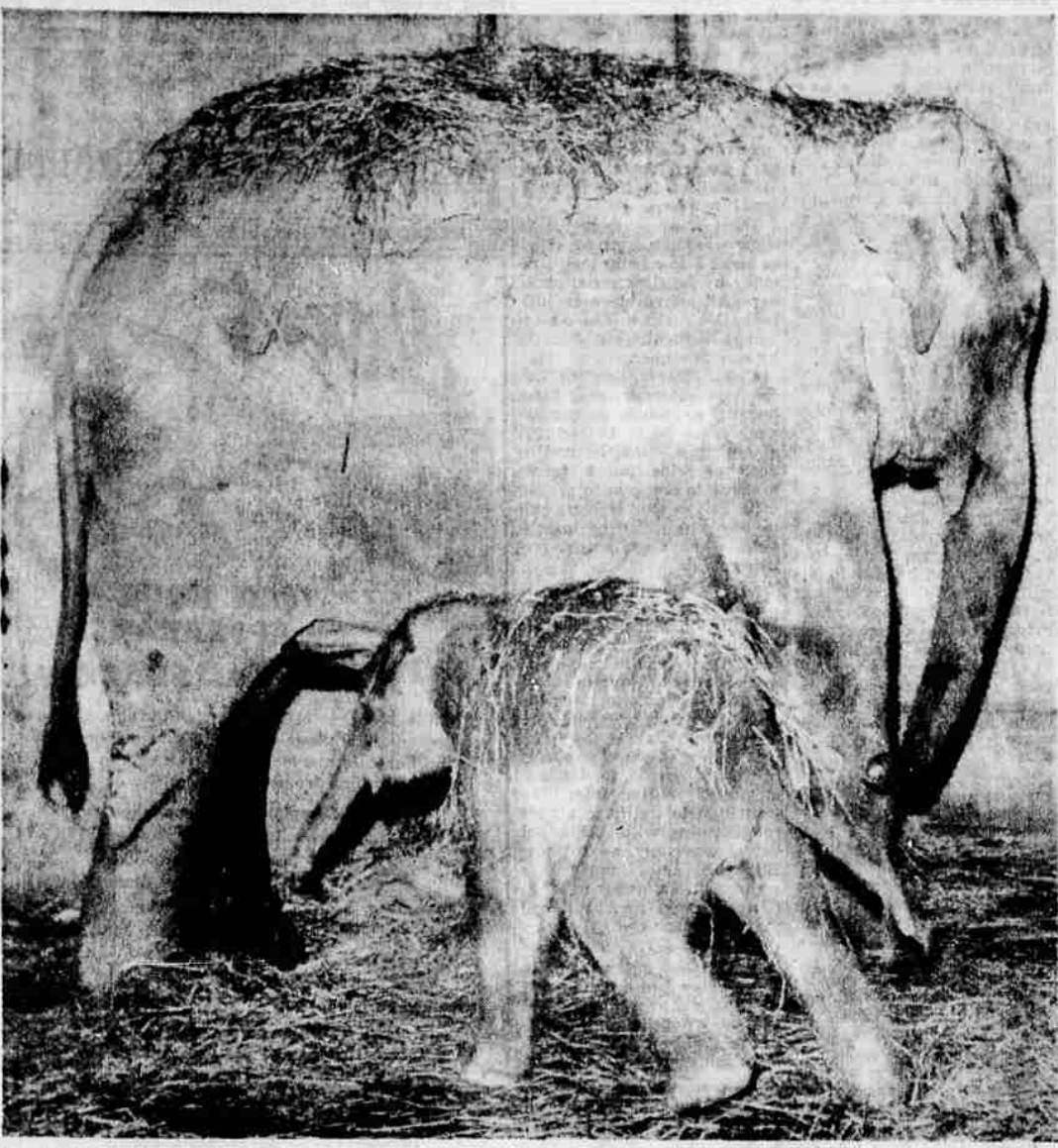

Belle Gives Birth to 175-Pound Son; Zoo Director Hospitalized

Portland — (UPI) — A newly-born 34-inch baby elephant wobbled around its mother, Belle, in Portland Zoo this morning, while the zoo director, Jack Marks, collapsed from the strain.

It was the first such birth in this country in 43 years. Belle, a 10-year-old Siamese elephant, gave birth to the wee, grey baby at 5:58 this morning in the holding room of the elephant house.

Three other female elephants were present, and one of them, Pet, tried to attack the baby.

Zoo director Jack Marks and other attendants grabbed

hooks to steer the three to separate quarters. Then Marks, who has paced the floor with Belle for many days and nights during the past two months, collapsed from the strain.

Belle and the baby were doing fine. The baby, estimated at 175 pounds, tottered to its feet within ten minutes and started nursing within a half hour.

Belle nuzzled it affectionately as it weaved through the straw and hid between her legs, wiggling its 18 inch trunk. Belle gave all signs of

Oregon's Beaches Proposed as Parks

Salem, Ore. — (UPI) — A proposal to set aside Oregon's beaches for recreational purposes only was made to a subcommittee of the Oregon Constitutional Revision commission here Saturday.

The suggestion came from Willis A. West, Democratic candidate for Congress from the first district and a nephew of the late Gov. Oswald West.

Gov. West took over Oregon's beaches as state property before World War I.

The younger West, a Multnomah county assistant district attorney, proposed to the commission's finance and local government subcommittee that the new constitution dedicate the beaches solely for park purposes.

He said under current law the state land board has permitted sale of sand and other materials from the beaches to the detriment of their recreation value.

He said his proposal also would prevent the use of the beaches for industrial purposes.

Kennedy Reviewing Nuclear Aid Policy

Washington — (UPI) — French President Charles de Gaulle has persuaded the Kennedy administration to review this country's long standing policy against providing nuclear weapons aid, informed sources said Saturday.

The review has been going on for a number of weeks. Sources said it appeared almost certain that U.S. policy would remain the same.

As in past years when the subject has come up, the joint chiefs of staff have again urged that France be given nuclear information and materials for weapons development.

The state department, as in the past, has flatly opposed this, and sources said it appeared this view would again prevail.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk has frequently spoken out on the dangers of more countries on either side of the cold war gaining nuclear weapons.

Rockefeller Not to Seek Governorship

Little Rock, Ark. — (UPI) — Winthrop Rockefeller, younger brother of New York's Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, told the people of Arkansas Saturday he will not try this year to become the first Republican governor since Reconstruction days.

In a 10-minute talk over seven television stations, the 48-year-old gentleman farmer said he had decided after much soul-searching not to become a candidate.

Pompidou Named French Premier As Debre Resigns

Paris — (UPI) — Premier Michel Debre and his government resigned Saturday and President Charles de Gaulle named banker Georges Pompidou to be France's new premier.

Pompidou, 50, one of De Gaulle's closest behind-the-scenes advisers during the past 18 years although he never has sat in Parliament and never held a cabinet post before, was received by De Gaulle at the Elysee Palace at 6 p.m. (12 noon EST).

Arrived Alone
A greying, heavy-set man in a dark suit, Pompidou arrived alone in a chauffeur-driven car. He was conducted at once to De Gaulle's second floor office.

Three hours earlier, Debre and his outgoing cabinet handed their resignations to De Gaulle at a 15-minute farewell session.

The resignations were accepted at once by De Gaulle, who thanked Debre and his ministers for their support during their record-breaking three years and three months in office.

Relaxed and Smiling
Debre, who had presided over a 50-minute farewell meeting of his ministers at his Hotel Matignon office this morning, arrived about 15 minutes ahead of time, looking relaxed and smiling.

He waved to newsmen and photographers as he walked up the Elysee Palace steps.

The other cabinet ministers followed in quick succession.

Vehicles Collide Near Shady Cove; Four Hospitalized

Four persons were injured during a collision involving two logging trucks, a car and a pickup truck Friday on Crater Lake highway at the Indian Creek rd. intersection near Shady Cove, state police said.

Injured were Henry Frederick Herlihy, 48, Eagle Point, driver of the pickup truck, with cuts and bruises; Malinda Jane Johnson, 27, Shady Cove, driver of the car, possible head injury; Norman Allen Johnson, also of Shady Cove, abrasions, kept for observation; and Becky Johnson, Shady Cove, facial cuts. Both were passengers in the Johnson car.

All are reported in fair condition or better by Rogue Valley hospital attendants. Herlihy apparently was not admitted to the hospital.

State police said the accident occurred about 5:20 p.m. Friday when the Johnson car stopped to make a left turn into Indian Creek rd. The Herlihy pickup truck stopped behind it. A logging truck and trailer driven by Floyd Clifford Evernden, 55, of route 2, box 784E, Central Point, came up behind the pickup and struck it in the rear knocking it forward into the rear of the passenger car.

The passenger car was shoved into the path of a logging truck operated by Vernon Forrest Copeland, 36, Trail. The force of this collision spun the car around again and it was hit by the two logging trucks and the pickup truck was knocked into a ditch.

Ticket Sales in Crater High School Stadium Fund Drive Pass 100 Mark

Ticket sales in the Crater High school stadium drive have passed the 100 mark during the first 12 days of the drive. Everett Faber, general chairman of the drive, reports enthusiastic support throughout the school district, which includes Central Point, Gold Hill and Sams Valley.

F. C. (Cliff) Ayres, chairman of the finance committee, reported at a meeting of drive workers Thursday that money received and pledged of material to date exceed 42 per cent of the \$30,000 goal. The stadium is estimated to cost that sum.

Announced Soon
Further money raising plans in addition to the sale of three-year tickets were discussed at the meeting and will be announced soon.

Moving of dirt for the base of the 2,000 seat grandstand is expected to start this week. About 10,000 yards of dirt are available at the site. Arrangements to obtain an additional 4,000 yards from a nearby source are being made.

The grandstand will be located on the east side of the football field at Crater. It will be a covered stand 180 feet long and 20 rows deep. Some 500 of the seats between the 40-yard lines will have backs and will constitute the main reserved section.

Target Date
Seat sales will continue through April and the first part of May. May 15 is the target date for completion of the fund raising so that work can start in time to have the stand ready when school opens in September.

Facilities which have been used for the past 10 years — at the old Central Point high school site which now is the junior high school field — provide seats for only about 300 in a covered stand and 400 in open bleachers.

Lack of adequate facilities during the past six years of competition in the athletic conference with Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls has resulted in a loss of several thousand dollars potential revenue, backers of the stadium drive state.

They believe that the enlarged seating capacity of the new stadium will during the next few years provide more than enough revenue to pay construction costs.

Drive backers also point out that the stadium site on the Crater high grounds already has a well turfed football field with a quarter mile track around it and that plenty of parking area is available.

Vow to Return to Prison Unless Others Ransomed

Majority Suffering From Malnutrition
Miami — (UPI) — Fidel Castro ransomed 80 sick and wounded invasion prisoners into freedom for \$2.5 million Saturday. Proud and hobbling, they were welcomed back by 28,000 of their cheering refugee countrymen.

Twenty-five were hospitalized for "reconstructive surgery and medical care," the others were returned to joyously fearful families.

All vowed to go back to Castro's jails unless ransom is raised for all 1,179 captives taken in the abortive Cuban invasion.

THREE NATIONS ACCEPT U.S. VIEW
Geneva — (UPI) — Three of the eight neutral nations at the Geneva Disarmament conference have accepted the American viewpoint that atmospheric nuclear tests are necessary if there is no police treaty banning them, informed sources said Saturday.

U.S. CONSULATE BOMBED
Caracas, Venezuela — (UPI) — The U.S. consulate at Puerto La Cruz was bombed Saturday, killing one local employee and injuring another person, the U.S. embassy announced.

OAS BROADCASTS FALSE REPORT
Algiers — (UPI) — A Secret Army Organization (OAS) radio transmitter Saturday night broadcast a false report that condemned OAS leader Gen. Edmond Jouhaud had escaped from his Paris prison, and hundreds of European youths flooded the streets of Oran in a joyful demonstration.

U.S. PROTESTS PREMATURE DISCLOSURE
Washington — (UPI) — The United States strongly protested to West Germany Saturday that premature disclosure of a new U.S. plan for settling the Berlin crisis was endangering forthcoming talks with Russia.
