The guest speaker will be Dr. Harold M. Livingston, a professor at Oregon State university, who is a Republican candidate for United States Senator. Dr. Livingston's topic will be, "The Modern American Jungle."

The candidate began his teaching career after receiving his master's degree at the University of Colorado. He taught in Illinois until World War II when he served for 42 months in the Army.

He received his doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Southern California and he has taught speech for the past 16 years at Oregon State university. He also has taught on the summer staff of the University of Oregon.

The professor also is a member of many professional societies, is past-president of the Oregon Speech association, received a Ford Foundation Fellowship in 1952, and is a member of the executive board of the Western Speech association. He has served on the Benton County Republican Central committee for several years but has not before run for public office.

In 1945 he was married to Miss Maryl Brisky, who is from a pioneer Washington family, and in 1946 they became Oregon residents. They have five children.
