

Stathos Says Workmen's Compensation Law Needs Legislative Attention

State Senate candidate Don Stathos told an audience Thursday night that revision of the Workmen's Compensation Law must be a major item of business at the next session of the state legislature.

"At present, 39 per cent of the domestic labor force in Oregon is not protected by this law," Stathos pointed out at a dinner meeting of the Talent Lions club.

He suggested three improvements to the 1913 law which he described as "providing medical care and weekly income to a wage earner in hazardous employment who is injured on the job, regardless of fault."

Benefits Extended
"The benefits of the Workmen's Compensation Law should be extended to virtually all Oregon workers and employers alike. In addition, a wage earner should be able to appeal his award without entering into time-consuming and costly legal expense," Stathos said. He advocated the appeal system used by 43 other states under which 99 per cent of all claims are satisfied without litigation.

'Fifth Disease' Continues in Area
The number of children reported in Jackson county with the recently discovered "fifth disease" continues high this week.

Dr. A. Evin Merkel, Jackson county public health physician, said 136 cases were reported last week.

This is an estimated number, he said. Many of the children have not been seen by physicians.

Other communicable diseases reported last week were one case of ringworm of scalp in Ashland, one case of scarlet fever in Central Point; five cases of pneumonia in Medford and one in Ashland; four cases of influenza in Ashland and six in Medford; six cases of measles in Ashland, five cases of chicken pox in Ashland and one case of German measles in Jacksonville.

datation, the Republican candidate suggested that a competitive system be used in place of the present state monopolistic system.

"Competition between the state plan and others will encourage accident prevention by inducing improved safety practices," he declared. "This will reduce Oregon's industrial death rate which was the fourth highest in the nation in 1959."

In addition to the human value, better safety practices also would minimize costs, he said. He cited the fact that an Oregon farmer must pay nearly twice the rate which is paid by a farmer in California.

"If the state legislature were to enact these changes," he added, "new businesses would look more favorably upon locating in Oregon."

School Stadium Committee may require bidders to file with School District 349C Jackson County, the qualifying statement required by ORS 279.014 to 279.018.

10. The decision of the committee will be final.

11. The successful bidder shall carry Workmen's Compensation Insurance protecting his employees, and shall be required to carry Public Liability Insurance covering himself, his employees, also School District 349C, its officers, agents, and employees, the Medford Senior High School Student Body, and the Medford Senior High School Stadium Committee and its members to the minimum amount of \$50,000 for injuries to one person and \$100,000 minimum for one accident.

He shall carry property damage insurance in a minimum amount of \$50,000 with a broad contractor's form of endorsement attached, protecting himself, his employees, School District 349C, its officers, agents, and employees, the Medford Senior High School Student Body, and the Medford Senior High School Stadium Committee and its members. All such insurance is being carried prior to the commencement of any work.
