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Family Council

Copyright, General Features Corp. Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a Judge, a psychiatrist, a women's editor, and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Joseph U.—She made me think she was a believer. Now she admits she's an agnostic.

Carla U.—People change. Now that I'm away from my parents I can think for myself.

Joseph U.—I don't expect Carla to observe every detail of every rule of our religious rituals, the way her parents do. But I certainly didn't expect her to go through such an about-face that she's practically an atheist now.

She certainly had me fooled. We met at the home of friends and she was introduced to me as "a very pious young lady." The couple who introduced us to each other knew that my religion meant a lot to me and that I was seeking a mate who felt the same way about our faith, someone who'd remain true to its traditions and commandments.

We were married three years ago. At first she obeyed the laws to the letter. But in the last year she's "dragged her feet" and admits she keeps up religious practices only to humor me. Now she stays away from services, and is gradually skipping over more and more of the regulation.

Clara U.—While under my parents' roof I was under a spell. I did things like an automaton, never questioning why, never imagining that there was any other way to live and believe.

Lately, however, I've felt like someone coming out of an amnesia spell and asking, "Where am I?" I realize that one doesn't drop dead for disbelieving, that the world doesn't end for me when I skip a prayer or do what I want on the Sabbath. It's a new and wonderful feeling to be able to think through big matters like life and death and my place in the world, instead of repeating what I'm told like a dummy.

But because I love Joe and I don't want to jar him too much, I try to adhere to the outward forms. I feel responsible for living like the sort of girl he (and I) thought he was marrying. Although I've changed inwardly, I don't want to embarrass him. But I keep hoping he'll change a little, too.

The Council: Carla had better not bank on Joe's changing much. His piety seems to be part of his very fiber, not subject to debate, review or examination. It would have been better for their marriage, had Carla's change in belief occurred before she married Joe. Now that she lacks sincerity and conviction about their faith, we are presented with a masked "intermarriage."

As usual in such cases, we plead for a united front on religion before a child appears on the scene.

QUESTION: Will a hearing aid hurt my remaining hearing?

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Joe's. He can't claim fraud. Carla did believe when she married him. She changed. She claims she loves him and will not fault her defection before him, his family or friends. Joe is fortunate. Sometimes an unloving mate pounces upon this area for aiming her barbs, for "getting back" at a man where it can hurt him most. Setting him up as a "religious" man, a bitter wife becomes anti-religious because she is anti-him. Joe's patience, respect, sympathy and broad-mindedness will help keep Carla loving him. This keeps her "free-think" excursions purely intellectual rather than emotional, and makes the road back welcoming and easy.

Warmed by Joe's tolerance, Carla will pursue her quest for truth inconspicuously, while following the forms of observance for his sake. True, the gestures may not mean much. But they'll mean something—namely, that she'll stand at Joe's side promoting

his enjoyment of rituals and customs. Her enjoyment of them may come from the knowledge that he is comfortable and at peace spiritually. Let's hope Carla's doubts lead to an improved faith. As Carla struggles to reform her own, Joe's understanding can ease her way.

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
