Speakers On Program In Ashland

Ashland — A covered dish luncheon served at tables gay with spring blossoms preceded the April meeting of the Women's Civic club, Oregon Federation of Women's clubs.

Three guests shared the platform, speaking on the federation's theme of the month, "Education." First to address the group was Dr. Arthur Kreiman, member of the Jackson county home rule committee, who outlined the main purpose and the measures included in the issue to be voted upon at the May primary. He was introduced by the club president, Mrs. Ralph Foster.

Changing methods and new requirements in modern education as they affect this community were discussed by Stanley Jobe, Ashland school superintendent. In a recessed population, shifting residential areas and new demands have all combined to make imperative the added physical facilities, he declared.

In the light of scientific discoveries and expanding world problems the courses from elementary through secondary schools stress science and social studies. This line of education should be continuous beyond the years of school life through the utilization of all informational media, Mr. Jobe said.

The third speaker, Mrs. Ralph Chapin, Grants Pass, a member of the Rogue River club and state chairman of Indian Affairs, OFWC, told of the Indian school at Chemawa near Salem. She described the movement of Indian tribes on the east coast and in the south and of the establishment of reservations as Indians were moved from Georgia to Oklahoma.

Mrs. Foster presided over the business session at which plans were completed for attending the First district meeting April 10 at Rogue River, and joining with garden club members April 27 when a long-delayed conservation tour will be made.

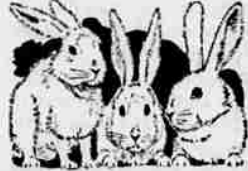
