West Coast Official Reviews Fair Cost

The cost of attending the Seattle World's Fair was reviewed Monday at the Medford Chamber of Commerce Roundtable at North's Chuck Wagon.

Showing slides of the fair was L. W. Rostad, Portland, district sales manager for West Coast Airlines.

He explained that a ride on the monorail will cost 75 cents for a round trip for an adult and the entrance fee to the fair is \$2.

Other charges inside the fair grounds will be \$1 for a ride to the top of the Space Needle-meals in the restaurant there vary from \$4 to \$10 and the art exhibit will cost 50 cents. Rostad explained that there will be a charge for rides in the fun area, and for articles and food purchased throughout the fair area.

He mentioned that a booklet on the fair will be prepared soon which will include a full schedule of all activities planned during the next six months.

Mental Hospital Per Patient Cost Is \$4.44 Per Day

The report showed that in medical hospitals an average of \$31.16 is spent per patient per day compared to the \$4.44 in mental hospital. Only 29 per cent of the public mental health hospitals are accredited, the report showed, and added that few state hospitals conduct research or have research staffs.

Often times, the speaker continued, the hospitals do more harm to the patient than help.

These indictments against the mental health hospitals are not against the hospital administrators, Dr. Flemming stressed. In many cases the administrators and staff have done and are doing outstanding jobs under extremely difficult situations.

Fire Marshal Warns Of Gas Containers

The use of plastic or glass containers for storage or transportation of gasoline is in violation of state law, Medford Fire Marshal Truman Nelson pointed out today.

He said a number of plastic containers have been sold in this area recently for use with boats or power mowers. But the law provides that containers of five or fewer gallons of gasoline must be of sound metal construction, Nelson stated.

He cautioned service stations against filling plastic or glass containers, and residents against their use for that purpose.
