

Beavers Open PCL Season Vs. Spokane

Portland - (UPI) - The Portland Beavers, composed of a few holdovers and a lot of ambitious youngsters, open their 1962 PCL baseball season against Spokane today in a day-night doubleheader.

Portland, which has a tie-up with Kansas City of the American league, has a pitching staff rated stronger than last year, perhaps not so much fielding slickness in the infield and not as much power as it would like.

The infield shapes up, at least to start, as Tony Bartirome at first, Ray Slider at second, Ron Debus at third and Herb Newman at short.

Bartirome was signed as a free agent and is a slick fielder and a near .300 hitter, though not possessing power. Slider was last year's shortstop for Hawaii. Debus has been a pro for six years and has hit over .300 four times.

The starting outfield includes Bill Kern, John Wojcik and Jay Hankins, with Kern expected to be the team's power hitter. Dave Melton, a veteran, is returning as utility outfielder.

Gordon McKenzie, a fine glove man with a good arm, and Dave Ricketts, a solid hitter, head the catching staff with Manager Les Peden backing them up.

The pitching staff has returned Glen McMin and veteran Gerry Staley for relief duty and a fine crop of promising hurlers including Dale Willis, Larry Danforth, Ted Thiem, Gordon Jones, Bob Colligan, Bill Fisher, Bob Giggle and Bill Kirk.

Jones was to open this afternoon and Willis tonight.

Spokane Will Host Edmonton

United Press International - Spokane, leading Edmonton 1-0 in the final Western Hockey League playoff, hosts the desperate Flyers in the second playoff contest tonight.

Spokane won the opener Sunday, 3-1 in a bruising battle.

League president Al Leader said in Spokane Monday, however, that he did not think there was too much roughness by the two teams.

Both teams were considered the bad boys of the loop during regular season play. Spokane led in penalties and Edmonton was second with both clubs frequent targets of criticism from other teams and coaches.

"I don't think there is any unnecessary roughness by Spokane and Edmonton," he told the Inland Empire Sports Writers.

Leader also said this year was the league's greatest in both money and attendance. He gave no figures, but said Seattle, Portland and Spokane all set attendance records as did Los Angeles and San Francisco, who joined the league again this year after several years absence.

In answer to a question, Leader said there is little likelihood of any playoff between the WHL winner and the American Hockey League winner.

Mays Gets Fourth Homer As Giants Pound LA 19-8

That million-dollar figure started the wheels turning in Willie Mays' head and the first thing you know he felt he had to pay off like a slot machine.

He did Monday night with a booming three-run homer that set the tempo for a 19-8 shelling inflicted by the San Francisco Giants on the Los Angeles Dodgers. Those box-car figures represented the Giants' highest run total against the Dodgers since they trampled them, 20-6, on July 5, 1953.

Prior to Monday night's game, Mays learned for the first time through newspaper stories that Giant owner Horace Stoneham had turned down a million-dollar offer for him from the St. Louis Cardinals six years ago and a subsequent \$650,000 bid from the New York Mets last summer.

"Mays Worth It"
"We certainly thought Mays was worth it," said Mets' President George Weiss.

But Stoneham says there isn't enough money to buy Willie's contract.

Mays' homer was his fourth of the season, making him the major league leader. It came off southpaw Willard Hunter, fourth of five Dodger pitchers, in the sixth inning. Felipe Alou and Jim Davenport also homered in the Giants' 12-hit attack while Tommy Davis connected for the Dodgers.

Billy O'Dell went the route for the Giants and gained his second victory although

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Controversy, Anxiety Noted In New Orleans Integration

Editor's note: Here is the first of two dispatches by UPI's national reporter who went to New Orleans to investigate the growing controversy there over integration of the city's schools.

Recent developments have brought new forces into play in New Orleans. The first dispatch describes these events and shows how they have heightened public anxiety.

New Orleans - (UPI) - In your hotel room is a tourist guide book which says: "New Orleans, traditionally the city that care forgot, is a lady of many moods."

Care has not forgotten New Orleans, but has come to town for a long visit and brought along two of her sisters whose names are controversy and anxiety.

Legal actions against racial integration of the public schools are nothing new here. Lawyers for the state and city have been fighting against integration ever since the Supreme Court decision of 1954. But on March 28 there was a new development that had nothing to do with the public schools.

Integration Ordered
Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel of the diocese of New Orleans (ten counties and part

of another one) ordered that all Catholic school in the diocese should be fully integrated in September. His order did not include the words "Negro" or "integration." It simply abolished the system of separate parochial schools for whites and Negroes and provided that any Catholic child could attend any school he chose.

There are 527,490 Catholics in the diocese, a little less than half of the entire population. All of them knew immediately they were in a dilemma. Their consciences had become battle grounds on which two long standing loyalties warred against each other. As southerners they were taught that the white race is supreme and must not mingle. As Catholics they knew the church holds that the color of a man's skin is irrelevant. Be he white, black, tan or yellow, it is the salvation of his soul that matters.

Most Kept Quiet
Most Catholics kept quiet. Among the Catholics who did not were:

- Mrs. Delphine P. Roberts who picketed Notre Dame Seminary carrying this sign: "Integration, the tool of Satan, is designed to destroy not only the white race and our country but Christianity and all civilization."

- Rodney Buras, member of the state legislature, who endorsed a financial boycott against the Catholic church. "They are forcing something down our throats that we can't digest," he said.

- Leander Perez of the New Orleans White Citizens' Council who was quoted: "Cut off their water. Quit giving them money to feed their fat bellies. If that is an undignified way to talk about bishops, let me remind you that this is not a dignified fight."

And, finally, Mrs. D. J. Gaillot, president of an organization known as "Save Our Nation, Inc." She is the center of the storm. Mrs. Gaillot is a slender, intense brunette, 42 years old and a sev-

enth generation Catholic. She has read the Catholic (Douay) Bible through her adult life, memorized much of it and annotated the passages which she believes refer to racial integration.

Her conclusion is that, regardless of the teachings of her church, God ordained that racial integration was a sin and so revealed himself in holy writ.

Cites Bible
"Where?" I asked as we sat in her living room with a Bible between us.

She read from the Book of Genesis: "And when Sara had seen the son of Agar the Egyptian playing with Isaac, her son, she said to Abraham Cast out this bondswoman and her son: For the son for a bondswoman shall not be heir with my son, Isaac. Abraham took this grievously for his son. And God said unto him: Let it not seem grievous to thee for the boy and for the bondswoman: In all that Sara hath said to thee hearken to her voice."

"Mrs. Gaillot, your interpretation seems to be that Agar the Egyptian and her son were members of the black race?"

"Yes," she replied. "All non-whites are members of the black race. Egyptians, Asiatics and all of them."

She cited a dozen more Biblical passages including one from the Book of Numbers: "And that the tribes be not mingled with one another but remain so."

Next, Mrs. Gaillot decides to fight back.

Medford Police Receive Reports of 114 Offenses

The Medford police department received reports of 114 major offenses during March, according to Chief of Police Charles P. Champlin.

The figure represents an increase of nine cases over March, 1961, and an increase of 12 over March, 1960, the report showed.

Of the cases reported, some 39 were closed for a percentage of 34.2, a decrease of about 4 per cent over the same month last year.

Burglaries showed the most marked increases. Twenty-seven were reported last month compared to 21 for the same month last year, and 18 for March, 1960.

Of the burglaries reported, however, 19 were cleared for a percentage of 37. The percentage cleared during the same month last year was 14.3, and during March, 1960, it was 5.6.

Drunk arrests showed steady increases during the last three years. Some 41 arrests were made for drunkenness in March this year, while 38 were made for the same month last year, and 34 were logged in March, 1960.
