Spicy Beef-Vegetable Casserole

Proportioned for Parties

Party-sized casserole recipes to please the multitudes are a joy to have on hand when good neighbors get together to share one another's culinary abilities. This meal-in-one Spicy Beef-Vegetable Casserole is proportioned for parties of 10 to 12. It is sure to be a hit with all comers.

- 2 tablespoons salad oil
- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 large onion, minced
- 1 No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes
- 2 8-ounce cans tomato sauce
- Salt and pepper
- 1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
- 1/4 teaspoon allspice
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- 1 pound elbow macaroni
- 2 cups fresh or 1 10-ounce packaged frozen peas, cooked
- 1 12-ounce can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 cup sliced ripe olives
- 1/2 pound Cheddar cheese, grated

Heat oil in Dutch oven or other heavy kettle; add beef and onion; saute, stirring frequently with a fork until meat is no longer red. Add tomatoes, tomato sauce and seasonings, cover and cook gently one-half hour, stirring occasionally.

While sauce simmers, cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender; drain. Combine meat sauce with macaroni; stir in peas, corn, olives and one cup of the cheese, mixing gently but thoroughly. Taste and add more salt and pepper, if needed. Turn into one large or two smaller well-greased baking dishes; sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, 45 minutes.

Sauced Beets

Hot cooked beets take on flavor excitement when sauced in a combination of one-half cup dairy sour cream, one-fourth cup mayonnaise, one-fourth teaspoon dry mustard, juice of one-half lemon, one-half teaspoon sugar, one green onion chopped. Simply combine and serve over six or more servings of hot cooked beets.

Almond Marmalade Bars

A Bit of Something Sweet

Almond Marmalade Bars will happily fill the demands for "just a bit of something sweet" for snackers of all ages. Their almond-flavored cookie foundation goes well with the citrus marmalade filling. Invitingly chewy, yet firm enough to go into lunch boxes they're especially good when served with a glass of icy-cold milk.

- 1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup almond extract
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup orange or grapefruit marmalade

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, cinnamon and cloves. Cream together shortening and almond extract. Cut or rub butter or margarine into flour mixture. Add beaten egg and milk and mix until well blended. Spread half of mixture into greased 7x11 (or comparable size) pan. Cover evenly with marmalade. Spread with remaining mixture. Bake in moderately hot, 400 degree, oven 25 to 30 minutes. When cool, cut into bars. Makes about 28 bars, 1 x 2 1/2 inches.

Spiced Figs

Spiced figs will add flavor sparkle to any main dish featuring meat or poultry. The recipe makes two quarts. They keep well, so plan some for now; more for later.

Drain syrup from four cans (17 ounce each) and put figs in saucepan. Add one-half cup brown sugar, three-fourths cup cider vinegar, one-fourth teaspoon salt, two two-inch sticks whole cinnamon, one teaspoon whole celery seed and two one-inch pieces of ginger root. The two teaspoons whole allspice and 1 1/2 teaspoons whole cloves in a bag and add. Bring to a boil, boil five minutes. Add figs. Simmer, do not boil, 10 minutes. Cool. Remove, spice bag. Cover tightly and chill 24 hours or until ready to serve.

Turkeys, stewing and roasting hens and broilers continue in abundance at bargain prices. Picnic shoulder hams and boneless butts are well-priced. Beef clod roast and other pot-roasting cuts are good buys. Best buys in lamb are neck slices, shoulder chops and roasts. Lamb pieces for stewing are often "specials."

Dairy Products. When it comes to taking out health insurance on those vital tax deductions, there'll be many happy returns on your good investment in dairy products: milk, buttermilk, cottage cheese, cheddar cheese, ice cream and ice milk.

Produce Department
Small amounts of that green folding stuff will go a long way in the purchasing of the health benefits of fresh fruits and vegetables. Your stock will go up in the eyes of small dependents when a plate of prepared fresh fruits and vegetables is ready for quick consumption after a busy day at school or play.

Best fruit buys include oranges, grapefruit, bananas, apples, rhubarb and avocados. Strawberry supplies are increasing. Pineapples and papayas are more highly priced, but then, their travelling expenses are higher and non-deductible.

Vegetable Buys. A variety of seasonal vegetables are ready to help fill in the standard menu form. Cabbage, carrots, lettuce, asparagus, onions, potatoes, tomatoes, celery, cucumbers, green peppers, broccoli and some artichokes.

Minister's Delay Saves Man's Life

Klamath Falls - UPI - A delayed appointment by a minister is credited with saving the life of Leo Franklin Davis, about 40, Monday night.

Rev. Laing Sibbet of Peace Memorial Church had an appointment with Davis, custodian of the local post office. Because of a previous commitment he arrived late Monday night. When he received no response he went to a bedroom window where he knew Davis slept and saw a dim light inside.

When Davis still failed to answer the door the minister called state police.

The suburban fire department gained entrance through a rear window to the smoke-filled room. A door was finally opened and State Policeman Curtis Culp crawled toward the bedroom ceiling toward Davis. Davis heard the call and rolled from the bed toward help. The mattress had been partly burned, an electric blanket destroyed and the headboard of the bed was on fire.

Davis told officers he had been smoking in bed and had fallen asleep. He was not hospitalized.

Seattle Council Passes Rent Law

Seattle - UPI - Cries of unfair evictions of apartment tenants have been met by the city council here when it passed a law licensing apartments and hotels providing tourist accommodations for visitors to the Seattle World's Fair.

The council approved a law proposed by Mayor Gordon S. Clinton designed to stem a mounting number of complaints from persons who claimed their rents had been increased as much as 100 percent or who had been evicted to provide space on a daily basis for fair visitors.

The law provides that only those apartments and hotels which were used for transient accommodations in a six-month period last year, or apartments with normal vacancies occurring during the fair, which opens its six-month run next Saturday, may be permitted to charge daily rates.

Georgia-Pacific Reports Record Sales

Portland - UPI - Georgia-Pacific Corp. has reported record sales, earnings and cash flow during the first quarter of this year.

The firm reported sales up 33.7 percent to \$64 million. It said net profit was \$4 million, and earnings per share were 58 cents, 6 cents ahead of last year.

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Gold Hill Council Denies Request to Install Hutches

Gold Hill - The Gold Hill city council has decided it will not allow rabbit hutches in the city.

The council unanimously took such action last week on a motion by Councilman Richard Straus. In so doing, it turned down an application to construct rabbit hutches at a Second ave. residence to raise and sell rabbits.

Councilmen agreed that keeping rabbits or chickens in the residential area should be discouraged if it falls under commercial usage and requires the owner to obtain a business license.

In other action, the council granted churches of the community permission to hold an Easter sunrise service on the hilltop at the reservoir.

Adopt Building Code
Adopted a city building code ordinance regulating construction, alteration, repair and moving of buildings.

Expressed appreciation to the Rev. and Mrs. Charles Pearson for having cleaned up a trash pile near the Assembly of God church which was not the obligation of the church.

Gettysburg Address Volume Given SOC

Ashland - The volume, "Man's Most Valuable Works - The Gettysburg Address," has been presented to the Southern Oregon college library by its author, Guy S. Allison, according to Miss Myrtle Funkhouser, librarian.

In the work, the author traces the history and final deposition of each copy of the famed address, finding that three of them had ultimately become involved in commercial transactions amounting to \$805,000, or at the rate of \$2,225 per word for each of the 272 words comprising the document.

Allison, a retired businessman, has visited more historical sites than any living American. He has written a syndicated column, "Bypaths of History" since 1938, and has had more than 5,600 stories and articles on Lincoln and other historical subjects published during the last 20 years.

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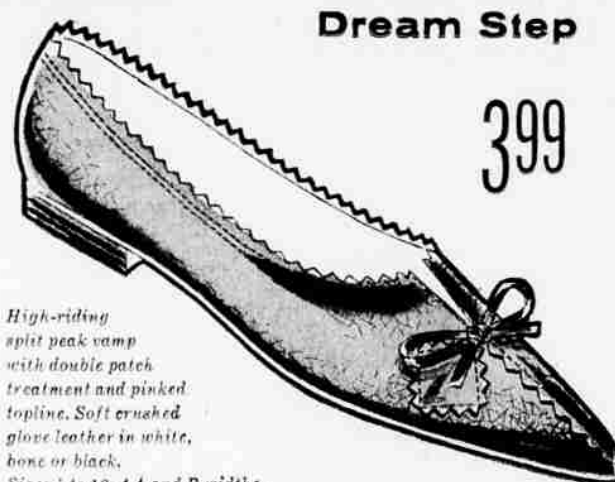
