

Political Indoctrination of Communist China Army Being Intensified

Tokyo — (UPI) — Communist China is intensifying the political indoctrination of its armed forces.

Authoritative reports received here from behind the Bamboo Curtain indicated the stepped-up indoctrination program has been accompanied by public reminders of Communist Party directives ordering preferential treatment for soldiers and their dependents.

The government also has urged the organization of more civilian groups to pay "comfort visits" to the military units and the army has admonished the soldiers to "support the government and love people."

It might be possible to interpret this as a sign of unrest or discontent among the military forces, coming at a time when the nation's civilian and military leaders undoubtedly are engaged in secret, serious debate of many basic policies. But there was no evidence more concrete than these reports to support such an interpretation.

Programs Launched

A report published in the official Peiping People's Daily earlier this year, but only recently received here, said that "live ideological education" programs were being launched "in a big way" throughout the army.

"The whole army is immersed in an atmosphere of bustling activity and bursting energy," the paper said.

The People's Daily report was on the "flexible and penetrating manner" of the army's "political work."

The intensified "education" or indoctrination program is being carried out along new policy lines laid down by Defense Minister Marshal Lin Biao late last year. There was no elaboration of this new policy except to say that it provided for "giving the first priority to the human factor, politics, ideological work and 'live' thinking in political work."

Materials, Methods Adopted

"The various armed forces units this year further adopted various 'live' teaching materials and 'live' methods to give lectures on current trends, policies and traditions," the paper said. "This enabled the officers and men to judge current trends from the mass viewpoint and the revolutionary viewpoint and forge bravely ahead."

"Education for the new fighters involved the study of Communist Party Chairman Mao's (Tse-Tung's) remarks relevant to the building of our army and the army-building guideline," it said. "After studying Chairman Mao's articles... many armed forces units have come to understand better the aggressive nature of imperialism."

A lengthy report in another paper, only for domestic consumption, said the party's policy of preferential treatment for soldiers and their dependents and demobilized, disabled and retired army men and their dependents "is still clouded by some shortcomings and problems."

The report in the Canton Nan-Fang Jih Pao said, "we must carry out in an over-all manner the system of preferential treatment..."

Comfort Groups Formed

A New China News Agency dispatch, which was not included in the agency's overseas service but which was received here, said:

"Comfort groups have recently been formed by people of various circles in many areas throughout the country for the purpose of paying comfort visits to PLA (People's Liberation Army) units and the People's Armed Police, who have been working hard to safeguard the motherland and have taken an active part in the socialist construction of the motherland."

A separate People's Daily article said the general political department of the armed forces "has recently issued a notice," requesting all units to "support the government and love the peoples activities universally..."

Confusion Period On Daylight Time Starts April 29

Washington — (UPI) — Get your clocks ready and start checking with your neighbors because pretty soon a lot of people are going to start playing the annual "Daylight Saving game" and you'll have to know the rules.

The twice-a-year confusion over when we will try to gain an hour of sunlight and give it back starts all over again for much of the nation at 2 a.m., April 29. But for many states time won't change.

The federal government doesn't have a thing to do with what kind of time we keep, except to set forth the geographic lines for the four standard time zones—Eastern, Central, Mountain and Pacific. No Law Since 1919

There hasn't been a federal law specifying "Daylight Saving" time since Oct. 26, 1919. National Daylight Saving Time existed only in 1918 and 1919. It died when Congress repealed the law over President Woodrow Wilson's veto.

Of course, the whole nation lived a hour ahead during World War II, but that was "war time" and it lasted all year, from Feb. 9, 1942, until Congress restored standard time effective Sept. 30, 1945. Between the two world wars and since then, the matter has been left up to the states and localities to observe or not observe "Daylight Saving" time.

PP&L To Finish Line This Summer

Portland — (UPI) — Pacific Power and Light Co. President D. R. McClung said Tuesday the company's new 230,000 volt transmission line into California will be completed this summer.

McClung told a stockholders meeting the intertie will allow coordination of plants on half a dozen rivers that can produce more than one million kilowatts of power. The 23 members of the PP&L board of directors were reelected, headed by chairman Paul B. McKee of Portland.

WANT NAZI GENERAL

Vienna — (UPI) — Belgium has asked Austria to extradite former Nazi S.S. Gen. Jan Robert Verbelen, who was tried in absentia and sentenced to death in 1947 on charges he killed about 100 Belgians during World War II, according to informed sources here. Verbelen fled to Austria in 1945 and under an assumed name received Austrian citizenship in 1959. He was arrested last Thursday.

Both Sides Rapped By Fact-Finders

San Francisco — (UPI) — The West Coast maritime strike reflects "the chaotic and archaic approach to collective bargaining" in the shipping industry, according to a government report.

The government Tuesday released a fact-finders' report on why the month-old strike happened and why it will be tough to solve.

Both sides were chastised in the report. It asserted employers and unions were hamstrung by "their own shibboleths"—industry's reference to "whipsaw tactics" and the unions' demand for "necessary catch-up."

The fact-finders were headed by Harvard professor and government mediator James J. Healy. President Kennedy got their report before invoking the Taft-Hartley act's 80-day cooling off period last week.

U.S. Chamber Urges Foreign Aid Cut

Washington — (UPI) — The U.S. Chamber of Commerce today urged a \$1.1 billion cut in President Kennedy's \$4.9 billion foreign aid request and more encouragement for private enterprise to invest in underdeveloped countries.

John O. Teeter of New York, spokesman for the chamber, said in testimony prepared for the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the administration's aid requests for the coming year are "unrealistically high and could safely be reduced."
