Eagle Point Community To Honor Civic Leaders

Eagle Point - A banquet Saturday, April 21, at North's Chuck Wagon, Medford, will honor distinguished and senior citizens of this community. Those wishing to attend the banquet should make their reservations this evening with Ralph Humphrey, Hillcrest 6-3081.

Nominated for the distinguished citizen award are Rick Wolgamott and Edward Kimmel; nominated for the senior citizen award are W. E. Davies, C. C. Hoover and Harry Hanson.

Mr. Wolgamott has been a physical education teacher at the Eagle Point grade school since 1958; coached football, basketball and track. He is active in Parent-Teacher association work; is a merit badge counselor for Boy Scouts; led a 4-H Garden Club in 1960; and was president of the Fryer Irrigation district.

The candidate belongs to the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and helped reorganize the safety program for Eagle Point.

Planned Building Mr. Kimmel, a charter member of the Eagle Point Junior Chamber of Commerce, also has worked with the Boy Scouts for many years. He has been active in

the construction of the Scout Community building, was responsible for the architectural planning and has contributed many hours of work. He is co-chairman of the building committee.

Mr. Davies, long-time teacher and Grange worker, has held many Grange offices and was secretary of the Jackson County Milk Producers' league for five years. For the past two years he has been a member of the Jackson County home rule charter committee which drafted the charter to be voted on in the coming election.

Mr. Hoover has been active in Rotary, the Eagle Point Grange, the Southern Oregon Experiment Station committee, the Farm Bureau, the Cattleman's association, and the Jackson County Agricultural committee. He has pioneered in many areas and used an original approach for new results.

He is finishing an extensive program through the Eagle Point Grange of tree and bird seed donations to children in every school and church in Jackson county and most schools in Josephine county.

Logger Nominated Mr. Hanson was born and spent most of his life in Eagle Point. In school he participated in all major sports and received the citizenship award as a sophomore. He is a logger. The candidate has been especially active with Jaycees and Boy Scouts, and is past president and treasurer; he has been a state Jaycee director. He was foremost in the movement to build the Scout Community center, and is chairman of the building committee.

Gem Club Hears Talk: Trip Set

"Creative Jewelry" was the title of the program presented by Mrs. Helen Gebhard at a recent meeting of the Roxy Ann Gem and Mineral club. More than 100 members and friends attended.

Mrs. Gebhard, instructor in jewelry making for the Adult Education division of the Medford schools, used charts, pictures and jewelry which she had made to explain various ways of developing designs and showed how gem stones, both formal and tumbled, could be utilized in such forms.

Mrs. Gebhard emphasized the fact that the setting must be created to enhance the uniqueness of the stone. In doing so, the craftsman considers such factors as the shape or cut of the stone, whether it is transparent or opaque, and whether its intended use or its relative softness will require special protection.

While gold and silver are the metals usually thought of in connection with such jewelry, copper and brass may also be used to make beautiful settings. These metals come in two basic forms: sheets of various thicknesses and wire of various diameters. By cutting out pieces, bending, pounding, soldering together, pushing down or up, or decorating the surface, an endless variety of forms can be created, she said.

In concluding her presentation, the speaker stressed the importance of securing the stone firmly in the setting. With charts and actual jewelry, she explained how this could be done with such devices as bezels, prongs, pins, and bearings.

Rolf Pederson, vice-president of the club, announced the details of the next field trip. This will be a one-day outing to the Crowfoot road area on Saturday, April 21. Persons interested in participating in this event should meet at the Super Save Service station on Highway 62 in White City across from the Veterans Administration domiciliary at 8:15 a.m. on this date. The primary material to be collected is a green and white variety of quartz known as "Medfordite." This region is also noted for its zeolite minerals. Quite recently a rather scarce type of orbicular Jasper called Roguette was found in this area. Digging tools such as picks, shovels, and pry bars, will be especially useful on this trip.

During May, Boy Scouts all over the nation will have as their theme, "Rockhounds." The president, Elmer Binker, stated that members of the Roxy Ann Gem and Mineral club will be available to help Scout troops in any way during this period. Units desiring such services as guides for field trips, speakers for troop meetings or demonstrations of lapidary equipment, should call Mr. Binker, TA1Bot 6-4401.

Homemade Cookies Good For Easter

Everybody loves a party, especially the youngsters. It's spring, and Easter is nigh. So bake a batch of easy Easter cookies. Serve some with strawberry milk for a party. Pack the rest of the cookies in perky bunny bags for each little guest to take home.

There's a pretty pink and white theme to this simple party for small folk. Even the cookies are spring-like pink because they are made with quick strawberry-flavored mix, the handy powder that flavors milk a happy strawberry and tints it pink.

The cookies, in bunny, chick and egg shapes, are easy to decorate with a simple

semi-sweet chocolate frosting that works like a charm, even for beginners.

The bunny sacks are a mere matter of paper bags crinkled with bunny faces, and pink-crayoned ears stapled to the top of the sack. Fill the bags with cookies, tie a ribbon around the "neck" and bunny-sacks are ready for favors and to tote home cookies for each guest. Older children will want to help make the crayon and paper bag bunnies, as well as the cookies.

For the cookies use 1/3 cup quick strawberry-flavored mix, 2/3 cup sugar, 2/3 cup shortening, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 cups

sifted all-purpose flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt and semi-sweet chocolate morsels.

Cream together strawberry-flavored mix, sugar and shortening. Beat in egg and lemon juice. Sift in flour, baking powder and salt; mix until well blended. Roll out dough 1/8-inch thick on waxed paper. Cut out with bunny, chicken, scalloped and oval cutters. For oval cutter, use 2 1/2-inch round cutter and blend to make oval shape. Press semi-sweet chocolate morsels, flat side up, into bunny and chicken cookies to make eyes. Press 3 morsels, flat side down, into scalloped cookies

to make flower center. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet in moderate oven (350° F.) 8 to 10 minutes. When cool, decorate egg-shaped cookies with Chocolate Frosting* put through cake decorator or paper cone. Makes approximately 3 dozen cookies.

For the frosting use 1/2 6-ounce package (1/2 cup) semi-sweet chocolate morsels, 1 tablespoon shortening, 1 tablespoon light corn syrup, 1 tablespoon water.

Combine ingredients in saucepan. Place over low heat, stirring until smooth. Remove from heat. Chill until of spreading consistency.
