

Rogue River Flower Show Set on Saturday

Rogue River - The Rogue River Garden club's 15th annual flower show, in the theme "Easter Glories," will open Saturday, April 21 at 1 p.m., in the Live Oak Grange hall on Arbor street in Rogue River. The show will remain open until 7 p.m. No entry fees or admissions will be charged.

All entries must be in place by 10 a.m. Saturday, April 21. Entries will be taken Friday, April 20 from 2 to 4 p.m., and Saturday, April 21 from 8 to 10 a.m. Any amateur grower is invited to exhibit in the show. Late entries will be shown but not judged. No entries are to be removed before 7 p.m., Saturday but must be removed by 9 p.m.

All entries of horticulture classes must have been grown by the exhibitor and correctly labeled as to name and variety whenever possible. Containers will be supplied for specimen exhibits and only one entry in each class or subdivision. Entries should be taken to the front door.

All juniors, ages 6 to 16 years, are asked to follow the adult schedule for horticulture specimens but will be placed in junior section. All specimens exhibited must be grown by the exhibitor. In the junior arrangements, exhibitors are asked to put age on entry card, 4 to 7 years, 8 to 12 years, 12 to 14 years.

A silver tea and plant sale will be held in connection with the flower show and a snack bar will be in operation. Prizes will be given.
