

Hatfield Asks Report on Foreign Briefs Columbia Ferry Jam-ups

Salem—Gov. Mark Hatfield said Thursday he is concerned about jamming up on state ferries at the mouth of the Columbia river and added he is asking the Oregon Highway Commission to make a "full report" to him.

The statement came as a 25-member delegation from the Oregon coast protested the State Highway department's reluctance to buy a fourth ferry to relieve staggering loads of cars, trucks and passengers at Astoria and Megler, Wash.

Cautioned Delegation

The group met with Hatfield in his office for nearly an hour but he cautioned the delegation that the final decision on a new ferry rests "solely and only" with the three-man commission itself.

Hatfield told the group what he has told many others who go to him for action after a state agency drags its feet: Under the law, the governor cannot force an agency to respond to him.

Ten coastal cities were represented at Thursday's conference, requested by the Oregon Coast Association.

The party included State Reps. Harry C. Elliott (R-Tillamook) and William Holstrom (D-Gresham) plus city, county and chamber of commerce officials, and others.

Ferries Outmoded

Verne Ayers of Newport, manager of the coast association, restated the problem—the three state-owned ferries at Astoria are outmoded and tourists are having to wait up

Oregon Youth to Receive Young American Medal

Washington—(UPI)—A 12-year old Oregon boy who saved his two younger brothers from their burning house and a 15-year old Michigan youth who saved his friend from drowning will receive the Young American Medal for bravery.

The 1960 medals will go to Gerald Lee Davis of Ontario, Ore., and Gordon Bernard Kilmer of Reed City, Mich., Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said Wednesday.

Congress established the medals in 1950. The selections were made by a committee consisting of FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, Solicitor General Archibald Cox and Edwin O. Guthman, the attorney general's special assistant in charge of public information.

The Davis boy ran into his burning home Dec. 12, 1960, and rescued his 2-year-old brother Neil. He was hospitalized with serious burns.

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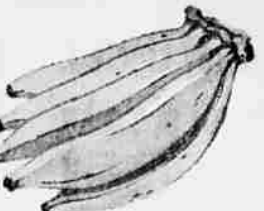
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
