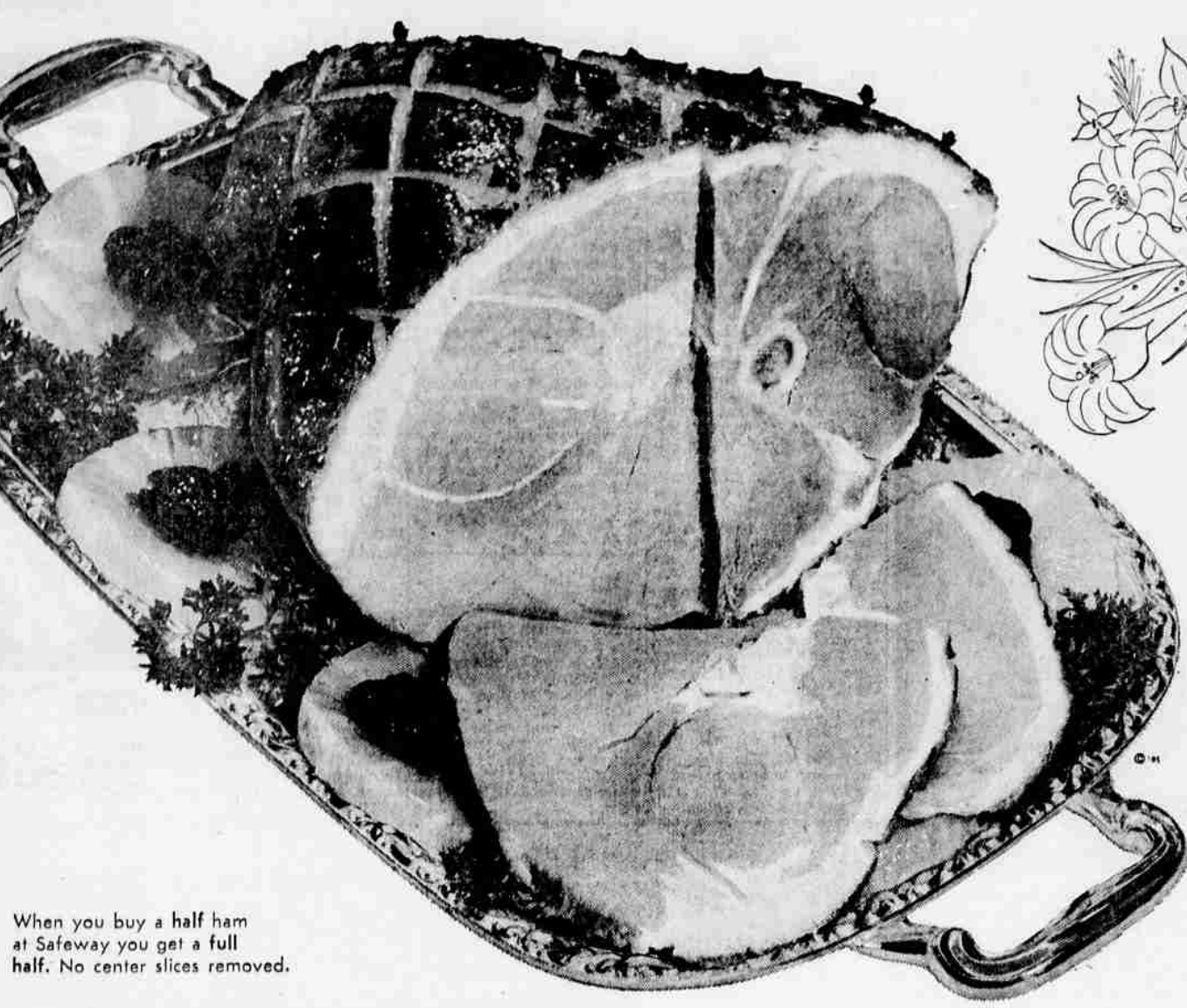

Washington - (AP) - Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) told the Senate Tuesday he would soon force a vote on his bill to ban the serving of liquor in any of the Senate's public rooms. Morse, affirming he has been a lifetime teetotaler, said he was renewing his fight because another "hard liquor" function had been scheduled.

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Congress Probing Auto Industry's Horsepower Pitch

Detroit - (AP) - Congress has quietly started another investigation of the auto industry's use of speed and horsepower to sell new cars, it has been learned.

Chairman Owen Harris of the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce committee began the inquiry with letters to the presidents of all the major auto companies.

The Arkansas congressman asked the auto executives to furnish his committee with copies of all recent advertisements which stress horsepower and speed.

Harris, a Democrat, said he understands the industry has abandoned a 1957 agreement not to advertise performance and instead to stress safety in today's cars.

Helps Sales
The five-year-old stand against racing was taken by the Automotive Manufacturers Association after Congress warned that carmakers were placing "excessive stress on horsepower and speed" and indicated federal controls might be necessary.

But the industry has found it difficult if not impossible to follow the spirit of the agreement. "People like to see cars like they own win races," one auto man said. "How the cars do can help or hurt sales."

So, despite the AMA ban, automakers are still sponsoring racing teams in one way or another, according to Studebaker President Sherwood Egbert. The horsepower race is still on, too.

Pontiac now offers a 423 horsepower engine, Plymouth, Ford and Chevrolet also are in the 400-plus class. One engine predicts 700 horsepower supercharged passenger car engines before too long.

Say Cars Safer
The industry points out, however, that despite the big powerplants, cars today are safer than ever. Carmakers spend millions yearly on new safety features. And they cite figures showing that in the last big year of the horse and buggy, the death rate was five times higher than now.

Spokesmen for the auto firms would not comment on the latest government move except to say "We are conforming with the request and setting together examples of our advertising."

Some of the ads bear out Harris' contention that the industry is again stressing horsepower and speed. A Chevrolet ad lists the horsepower of its big new V-8 engine at 409 and a Dodge ad proclaims that the "Dart 440 handles like a perfectly set-up race car."

Another ad says that world driving champion Phil Hill is "a Buick buff" and soon will be driving the firm's new "Wildcat" luxury sports car.

Job Opportunities
Said Some Better
Corvallis Job opportunities are slightly better than last year and good to excellent for 1962 college graduates in almost every field.

Oregon State university placement officers note.

Starting salaries, especially for engineers and scientists, are up about 2 to 4 per cent, continuing a trend of the past eight years.

Graduating students are taking more interviews with company recruiters than they did in previous years. State and federal civil service are having difficulty in attracting graduates because of the starting salary differential.

Companies with only eastern locations are experiencing a "reluctance" in attracting graduates, placement officials said.

OSU graduates will find salaries varying upward from \$4,500 in some teaching jobs to more than \$13,000 a month in physics and mathematics with a doctor's degree and experience.

Not all 1962 graduates go directly on the labor market. Many male graduates have military obligations and increasing numbers are going on for advanced degree work, officials noted.

Bandon Teacher to Get Sanity Hearing
San Francisco - (AP) - A sanity hearing will be held April 25 for Vivian E. Walker, Bandon, Ore., high school teacher charged with robbing a San Francisco grocery store.

He was arrested March 13 and was to have entered a plea Wednesday. Instead two physicians were appointed to examine him and report their finding at the hearing.

When arrested, Walker told authorities he was troubled by finances.
