

Lobbyists Report On Expenditures To Influence Congress

By Congressional Quarterly Washington - Washington lobbyists reported that they spent \$3,770,108 in 1961 to influence Congressional behavior. For what it's worth, that is about 1/250,000th of the total amount Congress appropriated in its 1961 session.

The reported lobby spending may be insignificant compared with the intangible influence of lobbyists upon national legislation, but the amount of money lobbies say they spent does not necessarily represent the true picture. This is because the vagaries of the 1946 Federal Regulation of Lobbying Act make it unclear just who has to report what.

The Congressional Quarterly survey for 1961, for example, showed that 312 lobby organizations reported their expenditures to influence legislation during the year. There are many others who maintain that they do not have to report under the law, although their activities are similar to those who reported. Since the law was passed, nearly 600 pressure groups have filed reports with the clerk of the House.

Doesn't Apply

In 1954, the Supreme Court ruled that the lobby law was limited to "direct communication with members of Congress." Many groups maintain that the law therefore no longer applies to them because they do not engage in direct communication with members and their function is not to influence legislation but to "inform" or "educate" members of their organizations and the public.

The National Association of Manufacturers, for example, has not filed a spending report since 1950. Other prominent national groups which did not file spending reports in 1961 were American Bankers Association, Americans for Constitutional Action, Americans for Democratic Action and the

Hypnosis

In the last few years, hypnosis has again become fashionable and, as a result, many people ask me to find for them a well-trained and trustworthy hypnotist. Such persons are going to try hypnosis as a cure for a backache, or over-weight, or chain-smoking.

According to Drs. Harold Rosen and Leo H. Bartemeier, hypnosis can be useful in medicine, but it is likely to be helpful rather than curative and I would add, the cure is not likely to come from one session. For a while, hypnotic suggestion can help the person to overcome some anxiety, apprehension, or itching.

Several persons have come to ask if I would find a hypnotist to cure their psychosis. I talked about this to good friends of mine who are psychiatrists, and they said that they sometimes use hypnosis as an aid in treating people, but they feel that it should be used only as a part of the treatment. They did not think it wise for a patient to put himself in the hands of some unknown hypnotist who was neither a physician nor a psychiatrist. Harm has been done to some persons by poorly-trained hypnotists.

'Shingles' in the Aged

Hundreds of old people write to ask, "Isn't there some way in which I can get cured of this miserable pain left by a spell of shingles?" As I have said here several times, "shingles" are little blisters which come, often on the chest wall, following the path of a nerve that has been infected with a virus.

In young people, the blisters soon dry up, leaving little scars - and that is the end of them. But in old people, for causes unknown, severe pain may remain for months or a year or more. I have read many articles on this disease - articles by men who have under-cut the skin, or have anesthetized it, or have even cut or destroyed the nerve supplying the skin

chance that the bill will never see the light of day.

Under these circumstances, I think the patient ought to be given sedatives, especially at night.

Oregon Professor Receives \$224,700 Grant From NSF

Eugene - A University of Oregon professor has received the largest grant ever awarded by the National Science Foundation, the NSF announced this week.

The \$224,700 grant to Dr. Homer G. Barnett, professor of anthropology, is also the largest single grant ever received by the university for research by an individual faculty member.

The National Science Foundation is a government agency created by Act of Congress in 1950 to promote the progress of all branches of science.

Dr. Barnett's project, entitled "A Comparative Study of Cultural Change and Stability in Displaced Communities," will involve the study of ten groups of Pacific Islanders who have been uprooted from their traditional homelands.

The study will begin officially May 15 and will extend for approximately five years.

Purpose of the study is to find the changes, or lack of changes, which have occurred in the social, economic, technological, and ideological lives of people who have had to face "the crisis of removal from home," Dr. Barnett explained.

The communities to be studied are scattered on small islands across the South Pacific in the Solomon, Fiji, Marshall, Phoenix, Tonga, and New Hebrides island groups and on the island of New Guinea.

These islands are owned or held in trust by various governments, including the U.S., the United Kingdom, Australia, and France. Dr. Barnett, on a trip to the Pacific last summer, made preliminary arrangements for the study.

Two Injured in Highway 99 Mishap

Two people suffered minor injuries in one of two accidents on county highways Wednesday, according to state police.

Walter Robert Lewis, 17, and his passenger, John Thomas Brough, 18, of Glendale, Calif., were treated for cuts and bruises at Ashland General Hospital and released, state police said.

The Lewis car was traveling north on Highway 99 near the summit of the Siskiyou mountains when it failed to make a turn, struck a bank and went over a four foot ditch. The car then rolled out of the ditch, spun around and threw both the driver and passenger onto the pavement, state police said.

A rear-end collision occurred on the east Evans Creek rd., about a half mile east of Wimer Wednesday morning. A car driven by Henry Howard Baker, 46, of Rogue River, stopped on the road, and a truck driven by Arthur Earl Moorman, 44, of 102 Kings Way, Central Point, ran into the rear of it.

Insanity Ruled In Murder Trial

Portland - (UPI) - Henry E. Beck, 54, Portland, was found innocent of second degree murder by reason of insanity in Circuit Court Thursday. He was charged in the fatal shooting of his divorced wife in June of 1955.
