Washington—UPI—The Air Force today announced the selection of eight potential astronauts from a field of 55 highly-qualified test pilots who volunteered for space duty at Edwards Air Force Base in California.

A spokesman said those selected were even more qualified for space duty than were the seven Mercury astronauts when they began their training.

Tax Law Believed Unconstitutional

Salem—UPI—A law allowing a city to levy taxes on newly annexed territory at a rate temporarily lower than the full city rate probably is unconstitutional, Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton has stated.

In an opinion for Multnomah County Dist. Atty. Charles E. Raymond, Thornton said there is a "grave question" about the law's validity.

Raymond asked for the opinion in connection with the proposed annexation of two areas to the city of Portland.

The driver said he was unhurt, officers said. A Medford fire department truck stood by because diesel fuel spilled onto the highway.

Professor Gets Record NSF Grant—Eugene—UPI—A University of Oregon professor has received the largest grant ever awarded by the National Science Foundation.
