Four Specialists to Speak at Seminar

Four specialists in specific fields of management will be in Medford Wednesday, April 25, during southern Oregon's second annual Management Seminar, sponsored by the Medford Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with University of Oregon school of business administration.

The conference is scheduled at the Rogue Valley Country club with registration beginning at 9:30 a.m. The registration fee includes a noon luncheon with Kiwanis.

Three subjects will be explored at the conference. The first is "Motivation" by Dr. Dwaine Richins, director of graduate studies and associate professor of business economics.

Executive Development

He is the author of "Economics Pressure Groups and Governmental Market Regulations." Dr. Richins is a specialist in executive development and a student in social philosophy of business, legal philosophy and government regulation.

The noon luncheon speaker will be Dr. Sioma Kagan, on "The Common Markets." Dr. Kagan is professor of International business and an authority on international finance and investment, international commerce and international business operations and policies. He is co-author of "Partners in Progress," "Eire's Industrial Potentials" and "Stanvac in Indonesia."

At 2 p.m., following the luncheon, the Seminar group will discuss with Dr. Fred Seubert "New Concepts in Leadership."

Dellenback Guest At Coffee Hours

John R. Dellenback, Republican candidate for the state House of Representatives, was guest at two coffees recently.

Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Smith have hosts at their home, 547 Haven st., to about a dozen persons, who discussed with Dellenback, incumbent member of the House, activities of the legislature last session, and the issues which will be coming up in the new session.

Dellenback pointed out that more and more decisions which affect each individual are being made at the governmental level, and because of this it is important that each citizen concern himself with the people sent to Salem to represent the 75,000 people in Jackson county.

Mr. and Mrs. Ward Lampkin were hosts at their home, 944 Alta st., for a coffee. Dellenback discussed the tax picture in Oregon, and said that economy in government and reduction of taxes does not begin with a discussion of what sort of tax rates will be set, and what type of taxes will be levied.

Rather, the amount of taxes are determined by the programs set up by government. The people demand and should have services from the government, but every advance in an old program or new programs must be paid for, and the means of paying for them is, of course, tax revenues, he noted.

As a rule, Dellenback said, the legislature estimates what the programs authorized will cost, and then it is determined how much the present tax rates will realize, and if this amount is insufficient, then rates are raised, or other adjustments must be made to meet the bill.

Dellenback commented on the fact that Oregon has up to now been on a sound fiscal policy, that of pay-as-you-go for new programs.

Development of Recreation Topic Of SOCTFA Group

Recreational development as a part of public land management was discussed at a recent meeting of the public relations committee, Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association.

The need for a more vigorous and aggressive policy aimed at faster development of suitable recreational facilities by all public agencies was outlined by Don Stathos, chairman of the committee.

The chairman pledged the support of the forest products industry group in pressing for increased expenditures in this area of land management by public agencies.

Not Devoting Enough

He noted that the federal government, even though it owned more than half of the timber acreage in Jackson and Josephine counties, was not devoting a proportionate share of the forest receipts from these lands to this phase of land management.

The committee commended the agencies for the job they were doing with available funds but urged them to step up demands for legislative apportionments in the develop-

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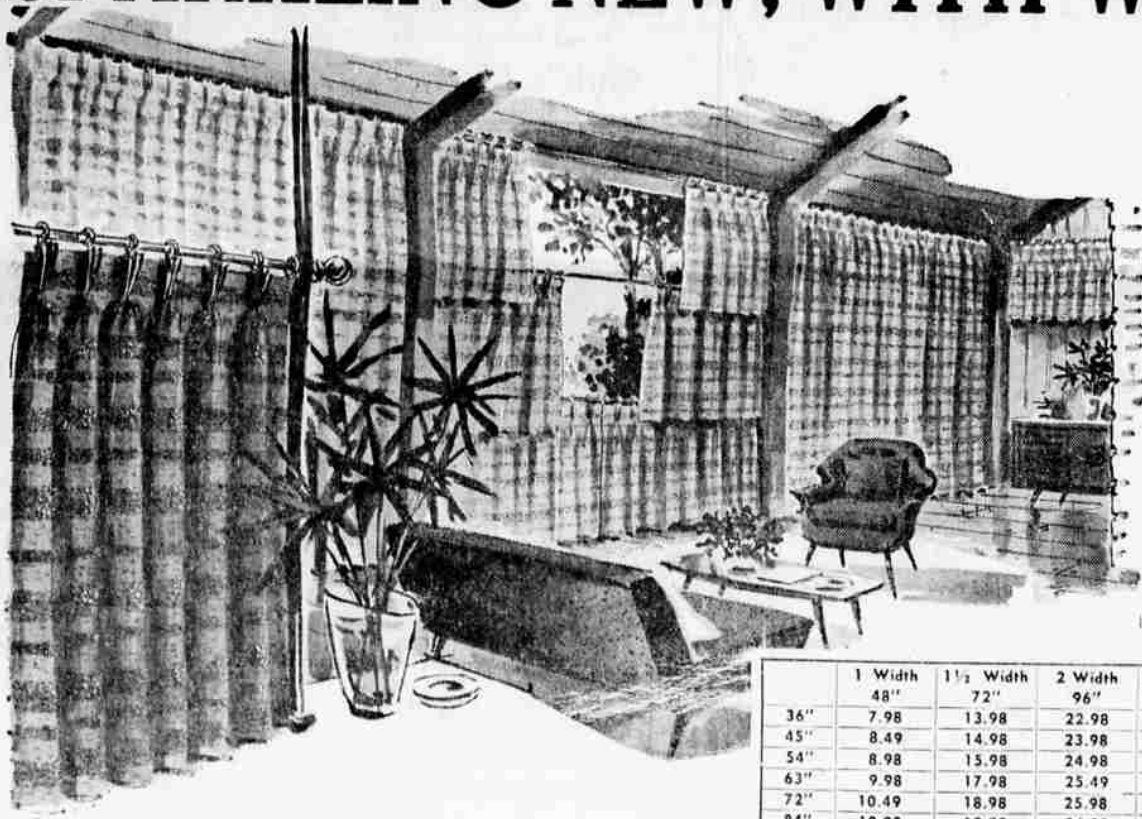
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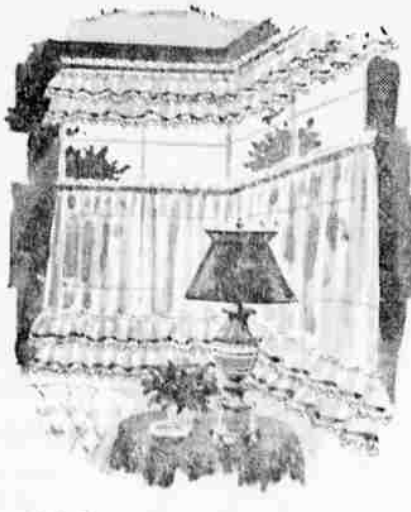
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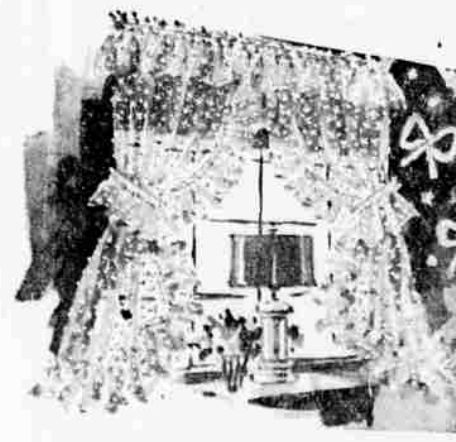
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
