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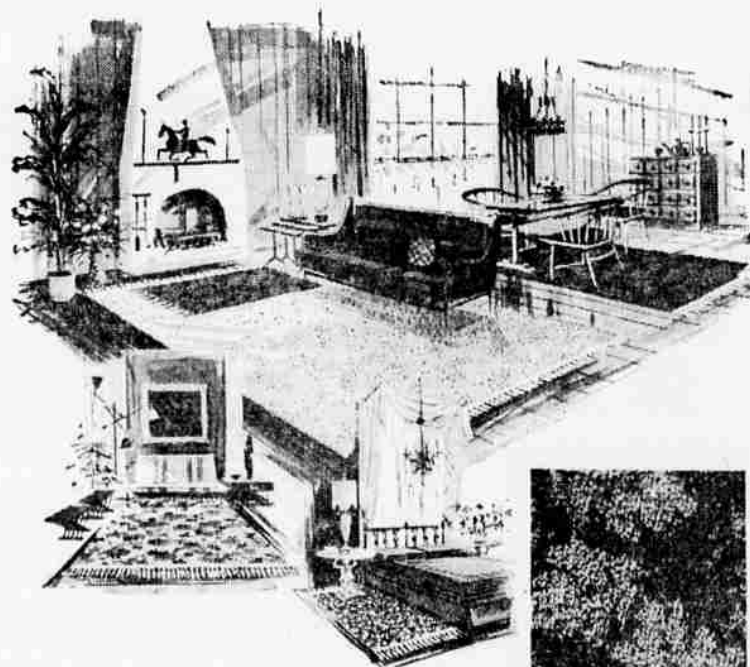
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UN Chapter To Elect Officers

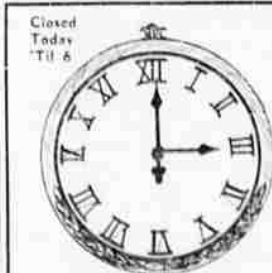
Mrs. F. D. Nelson, chairman of fine arts for First district, will speak on "Fine Arts in the Federation."
