Yes, indeed, it was a day for the gardener.

One thing was missing. The little bird which enchanted us with his plaintive song for the past few weeks must have moved on north. Last week we had several calls and conversations with those who recognized our description. Mrs. Tom Williams called to say the bird was probably a golden-crowned sparrow, and Mrs. E. H. Loveness, who stopped for a sidewalk conversation, agreed with Mrs. Williams. Mrs. Loveness said the little song always sounded to her as if the sparrow was saying, disconsolately, "Oh, dear me."

Delia Whisenant also called, and said the white-crowned sparrows have a distinctive song. Peterson's book describes the song of the golden-crowned sparrow as "three high-whistled notes of plaintive minor quality, coming down the scale" and the white-crowned as "several plaintive whistled notes followed by a husky trilled whistle." Peterson adds here that "As in other other subspecies, the birds sing a bit differently in different localities" and gives rather complete description and transcriptions as set down by various trained observers.

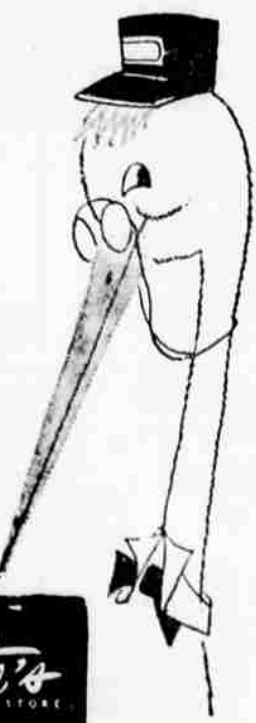

He stated that the receipts for this year were up \$50,000 to \$60,000 from last year, mainly because of the California students at the construction site west of Cave Junction, attending county schools.

The expenses budgeted for the coming year are considerably higher due to the requirements for two additional principals, transportation, teachers and two classes for mentally retarded children. "A lot of grownups want the youngsters in adult clothes," she said. "I don't believe in this... In little girls being cartoon copies of their mothers. I notice the Kennedys are dressing Caroline like a child..."

Too Old Look
To Mill Twohig, the "too old" look shows in copying not only silhouettes from the adult field, but colors as well. "Olive green shirts are fine for dad and muted plaids for mom, but children love clear, bright colors," she said.

Ann Twohig, a blue-eyed brunette of 28, is chief designer and pattern maker for Carter's, manufacturers of children's wear. Her customers, boys and girls, are aged six months to six years.

"You ask what a single woman is doing designing for children," she said, "well, I know more about them than their mothers."

Actually, she said, a whole passel of small cousins in her native New England acts as test customers. But she believes that being single gives her an objective approach to children's wear design because she has no set notions about styles.

Miss Twohig, a native of Brockton, Mass., designed for a maternity wear company and a bridal house before she joined her present firm, in 1958.

She said a child's fashion preference was one factor in designing children's wear. Another is what mother looks for—and inevitably, except for gala occasions, mother looks for clothes which care for easily—dunk 'em in washer and dryer and back into the bureau drawer—and clothes that last through mud pies and hop Scotch.

The designer is not opposed to frills. As a matter of fact, she said, small girls love tussy clothes—once in a while.

What does bother the designer is a reverse trend—adult fashions aping those of the children.

"I call it the 'Liz jazz,'" she said. After Liz Taylor, actress. "Ruffles at the throat, ruffles at cuff, ruffles at the hemline."

"At five, fine. At 52, terrible!"

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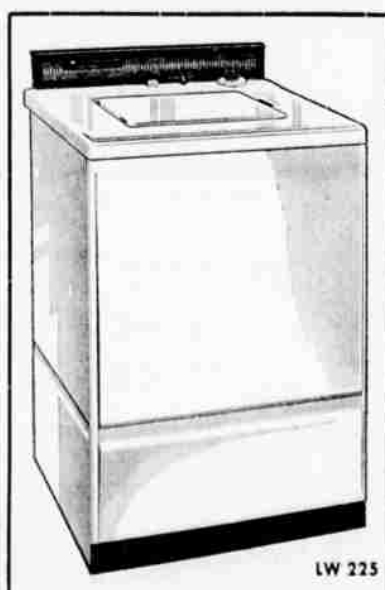
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
