Seven Feet
Cleared by
Cal Jumper

Gene Johnson of the University of California, C. K. Yang of UCLA and Gary Gubner of New York university turned in outstanding individual efforts in track and field meets around the nation Saturday while team honors went to Texas Southern, Villanova and the University of Oregon.

Johnson cleared an even seven feet in the high jump in a dual meet with UCLA to become only the fifth American in history to clear that barrier; Yang won four gold medals in the same meet; and Gubner, world indoor shot put record-holder, set a meet record of 62 feet, 2 inches in his specialty at the eighth annual Queens-Iona relays in New York.

Texas Southern, a small school noted for its powerful relay teams, won a record-breaking number of six relays during the 37th annual Kansas Relays; Villanova set three meet records to capture the team title in the Queens-Iona relays; and Oregon snapped the University of Southern California's streak of 104 dual track and field meets without a loss.

Big Ten Dominates
In another major meet Saturday, three Big Ten schools—Purdue, Indiana and Michigan—dominated the 34th annual Ohio Relays with eight first places among them.

The Villanova quartet of Charlie Hammock, Paul Drayton, Bob Ramore and Frank Budd established meet records of 41.4 in the 440 and 1:25 in the 880 while the Wildcat team of John Angevine, Owen Maguire, Gerry Hackett and Pay Traynor set a four-mile relay mark of 17:40.4.

Villanova, although minus several injured stars, piled up 50 points to easily outdistance runner-up Manhattan, which had 29½.

Johnson, a transfer student from Fresno (Calif.) City college, cleared seven feet on his second attempt at the height. However, the slim junior then missed two leaps at 7-1.

Despite Johnson's heroics, California lost the meet to UCLA 99-32, since the Bears had no one to match Yang, a decaathlon star from Nationalist China. Yang won the javelin, 120-yard high hurdles, 220-yard low hurdles and the pole vault.

Texas Southern stole the show at the Kansas Relays, one of the Midwest's oldest track classics. Never before had any team won more than four relays in one year, but the all-Negro Texas school won six of the seven relays it entered, setting three records en route.

Despite 80-degree temperature, Texas Southern established marks in the college spring medley (3:19.8), in the college mile relay preliminary (3:11.8) and broke its own record in the final of the college mile relay (3:11.0). Ray Faddler, who participated on all three record-breaking teams, was named the meet's outstanding performer.

Shatters Pole Vault Mark
In the university division, Fred Hanson of Rice shattered the pole vault mark with a jump of 15 feet, 6¼ inches; McMurry's Bill Miller leaped 25 feet, 6 inches to set a broad jump record; Phil Mulkey broke his own record for the decathlon by amassing 7,480 points and Houston's Pat Clohessy was the only double winner, taking the three mile in 14:14.8 and the Glen Cunningham mile in 4:10.6.

Oregon defeated Southern Cal, 75-56, to hand the Trojans their first dual meet loss since 1945. Oregon had three double event winners in Dyrrol Burleson, Harry Jerome and Jerry Tarr. Burleson won the mile in a slow 4:14.2.

Only one meet record was set and one other tied in the Ohio Relays. The Indiana sprint medley relay team was clocked in a record 3:29.9 and Hate Adams of Purdue tied the mark of 9.3 in the 100-yard dash.

3 Playoff At Houston
Houston—UPI—Three professional golfers whose careers are just beginning—Jack Nicklaus, Bobby Nichols and Dan Sikes—found themselves all alone today in an 18-hole playoff for top money at the Houston golf classic.

The trio finished Sunday's fourth round with identical 278 totals and were forced into the playoff.

Ducks Set Sights
On National Toga

Eugene—UPI—Coach Bill Bowerman and his Oregon "boys," proud conquerors of mighty Southern California, set their sights on the National Collegiate Athletic Association track and field championship today.

Oregon's great squad, with Jerry Tarr, Harry Jerome and Dyrrol Burleson scoring double victories, halted Southern California's dual meet unbeaten streak at 103 with a 75-56 victory at Los Angeles Saturday.

It was the first Trojan dual meet loss since 1945. "I can't tell you how proud I am..." Bowerman said. A large crowd stayed up until 1 a.m. Sunday to greet the Webfoots upon their return.

The victory put Oregon squarely in the limelight as the NCAA title favorite here June 15-16. "I hope we can be as ready for that one as we were for the Trojans," Bowerman said.

"Oregon has just about the best dual meet track team I've ever seen," said USC coach Jess Hill. A crowd of 12,393 watched.

Washington State is the next opponent, at Hayward Field Saturday.

Indians Widen Lead in Hockey
Buffalo, N.Y.—UPI—The Springfield Indians, backed by an outstanding job of goaltending by Mace Paille, own a commanding three-game lead over the Buffalo Bisons today in the final round of the American Hockey League playoffs.

The Indians, well on their way to unprecedented third straight Calder Cup championship, defeated the Bisons, 2-1, at Springfield Saturday night and then rallied for a 3-2 overtime decision at Buffalo Sunday night.

Springfield can clinch the Calder Cup by winning the fourth game of the best-of-seven series here on Wednesday.

Marilynn Smith Sunshine Victor
Miami—UPI—Marilynn Smith fired her third straight round of steady golf here Sunday to capture top money in the \$7,500 Sunshine Women's Open golf tournament with a 214.

Despite high winds, Miss Smith carded a 71 Sunday to go with previous rounds of 71 and 72, for a five-stroke victory worth \$1,200.

Oregon scored first in seven events, Mac in five and Ashland in two. John Tungate in the shot put and discus and Art Lee in the dashes were double first place winners for the Medford team.

Oregon State Trackmen Overpower WSU, Idaho

Corvallis—UPI—Oregon State's strong track and field club today made plans for the Mt. San Antonio Relays at Walnut, Calif., this coming Saturday after scoring easy victories over Washington State and Idaho at Pullman Saturday.

The California event is where Oregon State set a 1961 mile relay school record of 3:09.7.

Oregon State rolled up 97 2/3 points to 58½ for WSU and 26 for Idaho in the triangular meet.

The Beavers had 91-54 edge over the Cougars and a 114-30 margin over Idaho in dual meet competition.

Oregon State won a dozen first places with Frank Marsh taking the high hurdles and low hurdles and Bob Johnson winning the 440 and 220 yard dashes. Gary Stenlund of the Beavers got off his best javelin toss, 233 feet 1 inch.

Dale Story won the mile in 4:07.

Former Boxing Promoter Dies

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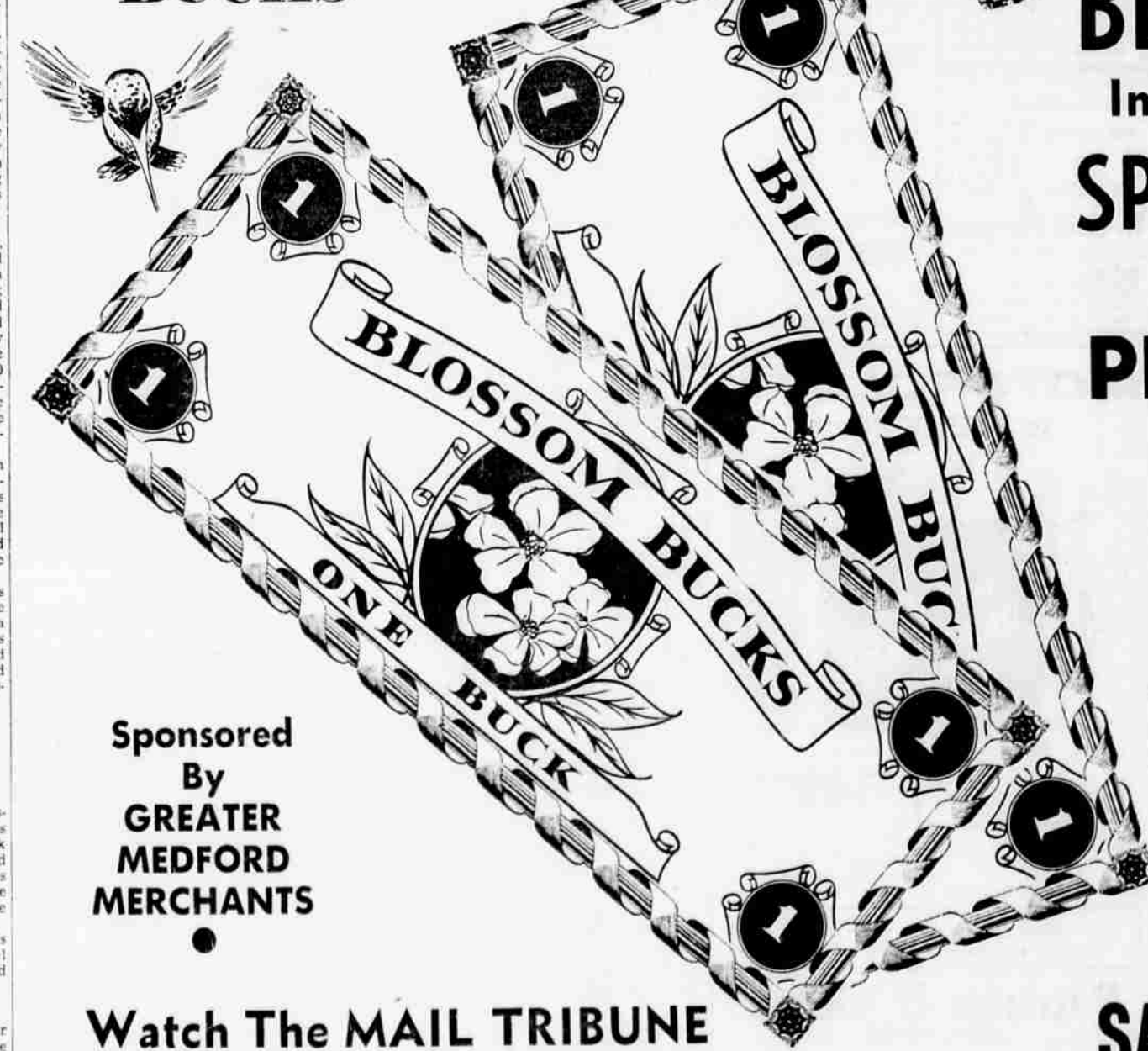
