

Possibility of Local College Discussed at Meet

Salem —(UPI)—An informal gathering of educators and lay citizens from Marion and Polk counties and northern Linn county has decided to set up a formal discussion group to probe the possibility of a community college.

Named as chairman of the group was Paul Wilmet, director of vocational and technical education for the Salem school district.

The discussion committee will be made up of an educator and lay citizen from each of the high school districts in the two counties, and northern Linn.

Wilmet estimated that a community college in the mid-

Willamette valley should have an enrollment of 3,250 by 1972. He estimated necessary buildings would cost about \$3.5 million.

Good Locale

There was no firm reaction as to where such a community college should be located, although Salem educators indicated Salem would be a good locale.

Wilmet said the \$3.5 million he quoted includes an amount approved last week by Salem voters for Salem's new technical and vocational school, still on the drawing boards.

James King, Lebanon schools superintendent, raised

questions about financing a community college. He wondered whether state funds for a college would divert basic school support funds to local schools.

Two weeks ago the Oregon education department established Marion, Polk and north Linn counties as a central Willamette valley area, for purposes of planning a community college by local officials.
