If you like to fiddle around with the radio dial and pick up stations a fair distance away, the Rogue Valley is a pretty good place to be—after dark that is. With just an ordinary kitchen or car radio I've been able to listen in on stations from Seattle to Los Angeles and as far east as Denver and Butte, Montana. It makes an interesting evening just to sit by the dial and turn it a little every now and then.

Transplanted southern Californians can do a little reminiscing by listening to the Dodge night games on KFI Los Angeles, a powerful 50,000-watt station that can be heard over most of the western states. Los Angeles stations are easier to pick up after midnight, when there are fewer stations on the air to clutter up the dial. If you want a newscast at any hour of the night, there's an LA station called "Extra News," probably the only station in the world which broadcasts nothing but news (and commercials). It's always on, no matter what the hour.

Baseball fans should enjoy the radio at night, as addition to the Dodge games, one can also pick up the San Francisco Giants broadcasts on at least two stations that I've noticed. Perhaps there are more. I haven't tried picking up the LA Angel play by play as yet. It may be difficult to find, as the Angel station is less powerful than the one which carries the Dodge games.

Some of the distant stations come in here so clearly that they're louder than the few Rogue Valley stations which are still on the air after dark. A good example is KSL, that powerful Salt Lake City station which booms in here so loud sometimes you'd think its transmitter was next door.
