Rusk, Russian Discuss Berlin

Washington — (UPI) — Soviet Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin met with Secretary of State Dean Rusk Monday in what officials said was another round of talks on Berlin.

The meeting was sought by the Soviet ambassador.

State Department spokesman Lincoln White said Dobrynin set up the appointment to continue the Berlin talks with Rusk that started a week ago today.

The two men met then for 65 minutes in Rusk's office, discussing mainly procedural questions about how and when the next round of U.S.-Soviet Berlin discussions should take place.

As in last week's meeting with Rusk, the ambassador came alone, with no aides and no interpreter. He speaks fluent English.

mountain were rescued Monday by a searcher who took time out for a rest.

The amateur spelunkers were discovered huddled together on a ledge they cut for themselves just inches above the water level at the base of the 60-foot mud precipice.

A searcher stumbled upon the cliff at the edge of a giant underground lake when he stopped to rest after hours of combing the labyrinth of passages leading from the cavern, known as Case's cave.

In Good Shape
"They were found by a lucky break," Dade County Sheriff Allison Blevis, director of the 100-man search party, said.

An hour later, weak from hunger but otherwise unharmed, the students were reunited with their anxious parents and friends who waited out the rescue operations at the mouth of the cave.

"They were in good shape," Blevis said. "They were wet, hungry and weak, but otherwise pretty good. Some of the searchers looked worse off."

The students—James Mason, 21, and Bill Bartee, 21 both of Atlanta, and Martin Huddleston, 19, of Ormond Beach, Fla.—were checked by a doctor and pronounced fit.

"We weren't worried about getting out," Mason told his mother as she hugged him. "We just kept getting cold."

Mrs. Mason gave the alarm late Saturday night when she called the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity house at Emory university, Atlanta, where Mason and Huddleston are students.

Bartee is a student at Presbyterian college in Clinton, S. C.

The three youths had set out to explore the cave Friday night. They entered the deep cavern below Lookout mountain in the northwestern tip of Georgia and lowered themselves down the 60-foot cliff into the water waist deep.

After several hours of exploring they tried to ascend the cliff, but were defeated by its steep face and slippery surface.

Unable to move, they waited to be rescued.

JAPANESE VESSELS TIED UP BY STRIKE
Tokyo—(UPI)—A strike by Japan Seamen's Union for a 48-hour work week has tied up more than 300 vessels in about 50 of the nation's major ports.

SOVIET SUBMARINES TO VISIT SWEDEN
Stockholm, Sweden—(UPI)—Soviet submarines will pay an official visit to Sweden for the first time in June, the government announced today.

EMPEROR HAILE SELASSIE'S SON DIES
Addis Ababa, Ethiopia—(UPI)—The Palace today announced the death of Prince Sahle Selassie, 31, youngest son of Emperor Haile Selassie.

The announcement did not indicate when the British-educated prince died or give the cause of death.

FORMER BONN MINISTER TO VISIT WASHINGTON
Bonn—(UPI)—Former Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano will go to Washington April 29 for talks with President Kennedy and other American leaders, it was announced today.

WEST BENGAL RIOT KILLS MANY
Dacca, East Pakistan—(UPI)—Over 100 Moslem men, women and children were killed in a communal riot in Malda, West Bengal last week, local newspapers said today.

The reports said about 2,000 Indian Moslem refugees already have crossed the border into East Pakistan, and that another 5,000 who attempted to cross were intercepted and dispersed by Indian troops.

DUTCH MARINES SAID KILLED IN CLASH
Jakarta, Indonesia—(UPI)—An Indonesian military spokesman today said eight Dutch Marines were killed and four others wounded in a clash with "West Irian" guerrilla forces in Dutch-held New Guinea on April 8.

Un-American Activities Committee Meets in L. A.; Demonstrations Planned

Los Angeles — (UPI) — A House subcommittee on un-American activities opens four days of hearings here today against a background of planned anticommunist demonstrations by students and others on the scene and across the nation.

Local police and U.S. marshals guarded against the possibility of disturbances outside or inside the Federal Building during closed sessions of a subcommittee headed by Rep. Clyde Doyle (D-Calif.). Doyle has said the inquiry involves "subversive activities in Los Angeles county."

Precautions were being taken to prevent crowd scenes from erupting into violence like that which occurred when another such subcommittee held hearings in San Francisco in May, 1960. That episode, highlighted by police use of fire hoses on demonstrating students, was the topic of the committee's controversial movie, "Operation Abolition."

According to the announcements by spokesmen for the organizations involved, the current hearings will involve about 60 witnesses from the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedom, the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, Steelworkers Union Local 2058, and a college student group.

Representatives of these groups have kept in close contact recently coordinating plans for legal defense and discussing arrangements for picketing which they hoped would bring out at least between 1,000 and 2,000 marchers.

Plans also developed for rallies Wednesday in New York, San Francisco and elsewhere by groups opposed to the House committee.

A spokesman for the Federal Police Research Association of Los Angeles, an independent group speaking for several hundred employees of both departments, charged Monday that "the Communist apparatus is trying to promote a mob scene at the Federal Building . . . by starting a phony mass demand for admission to the hearings."

The hearings are closed to the public. Those in San Francisco two years ago were open.
