Actress Pads Paychek With Demonstrating Job

New York - (UPI) - She can tell you first hand all about ivory poaching in Tanganyika, teach you to distinguish the bouquet of a really fine whisky or give you a rundown on investment opportunities in the boating field.

Her name is Margaret Andrews and, no, she isn't information clerk at the public library.

Currently, she is hostess at Schenely's scent-a-rama exhibit in New York's Grand Central station, where in two weeks she has greeted 100,000 travelers, commuters and plain passersby, introducing them to the mysteries of aging whisky.

Intrigued by glimpses of Miss Andrews' honey blonde head surrounded by would-be "sniffers" as we made our usual commuter dash through the terminal, we decided to find out just what kind of young woman presides at such an exhibit.

New Corps
Miss Andrews, it turns out, is one of a growing corps of personable young careerists—mostly models and aspiring dancers and actresses—who fill in the time between assignments and pad the paycheck by demonstrating, hostessing, or just being on hand to brighten the scene at business and industrial shows and public exhibitions such as the flower and boat shows.

Approached during working hours—she puts in a regular eight-hour day—Miss Andrews was commendably loyal

to her employer and this interviewer now possesses a store of whisky miscellanea. Did you know, for instance, that evaporation and soakage claim up to 20 gallons of every 50-gallon barrel of whisky over a 10-year aging period?

During a coffee break, however, we got to know more about a most remarkable young woman who, it seems, has not had an idle moment since, as a high school freshman in Hartford, Conn., she obtained her first professional job, working with Allen Ludden on "Mind Your Manners," one of the first network radio panel shows.

She admits readily her first love is the theater—and you just know you'll be hearing more of Margaret Andrews in her chosen field.

In Africa
She spent last fall in East Africa working in an adventure movie concerning ivory poaching in Tanganyika. Tentatively titled "Lust For Ivory," the color film is scheduled for release this summer.

In between her travels, Margaret has combined summer stock, an off-Broadway appearance as the lead in "The Egoists," an adaptation of a French play by Francois Mauriac, a stint in television soap opera, with more than 50 trade show jobs for as many different companies. She says she enjoys her hostess chores. "First of all, I like people. And it's a good way to maintain confidence in your ability to perform. Where would you find a larger, more diverse audience?"

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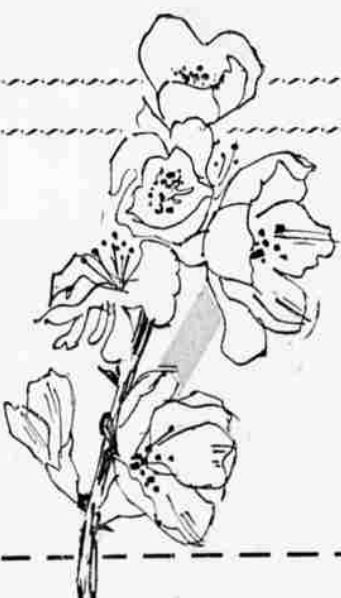
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
