Happy Camp Librarian Resigns as Library Moves To Larger Place

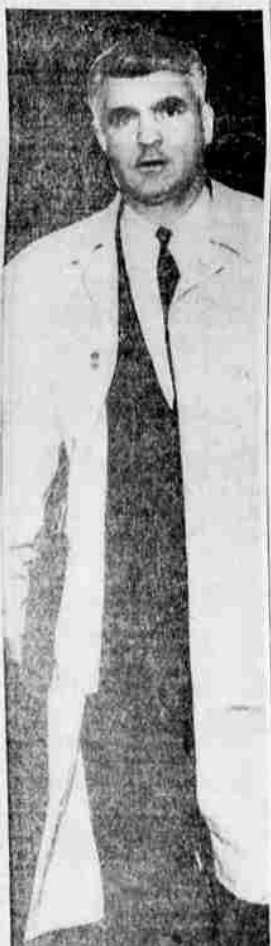
Happy Camp — After 22 years of public service to her community, Ruth Baker has resigned as librarian for the branch of the Siskiyou County Free Library here.

The library had been housed in the front room of the Baker home for the past 22 years, open most any time of the day or night to the readers of town. The library's being in a private home, however, brought about complications when expanded facilities were needed in a growing community. In favor of going along with progress, Miss Baker resigned as of April 1.

The interested people of the community for the past two years have worked hard trying to find a suitable place in which facilities could be expanded in a public building. After many meetings of planning, it was decided to temporarily house the library in the R & H Building.

Open house for the new branch library was held August 13, with a good turnout of interested persons. The official opening of the library took place Monday, April 16, with more than 60 books checked out the first hour.

Ashland police were fortunate enough to apprehend such an individual in the act the other day. He asked if the motel operators wouldn't be so kind as to loan him some money to buy a few meals and give him a room for the night, assuring them that he would arrive the next day and pay them back.

Then about 15 minutes later the man, posing as the son, arrived at the motel and asked if his father was there. The motel operators explained that his father had just phoned from Portland, and they gave him a room and some money. He then hurried out the door. The operators were suspicious enough to follow up on the character. Through an involved set of circumstances they happened to discover about an hour later that he had used the same story to wrangle some cash out of the Ashland YMCA. And then a little while later they spotted him in the act of pulling the same line a third time at the Mark Antony. Police were summoned and the man, Theodore Robert Terry, 38, of Los Angeles, was arrested. He pled guilty in Ashland Municipal Court Tuesday morning to a charge of defrauding an innkeeper, was fined \$25 and was given a sentence of 10 days in jail. The sentence was suspended upon the condition that he make \$19 restitution and leave town.

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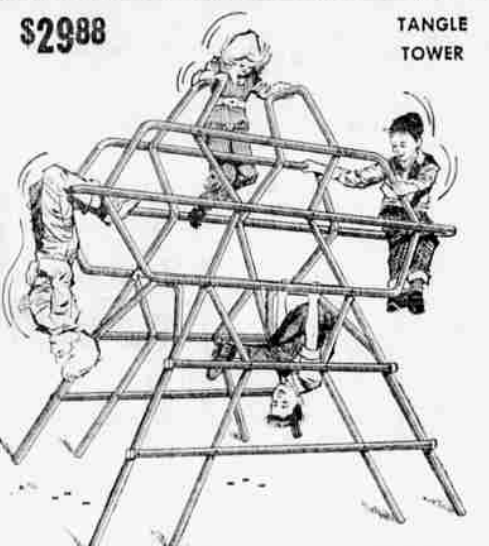
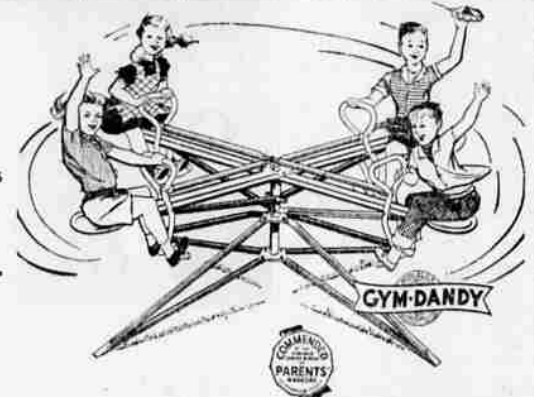
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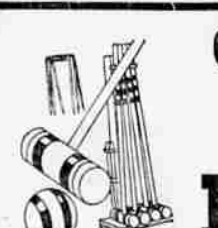
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
