

Two Referees for Tonight's Mat Card

A second referee will be in the ring at Medford armory tonight in an effort to keep some semblance of order when the northwest tag team wrestling championship comes up for grabs.

The title affair is a rematch of one of the wildest and bloodiest clashes ever seen in a local wrestling ring. Rocky Columbo and Billy Whitewolf, who won the championship trophy here two weeks ago, demanded the second referee in an effort to control the waterfront brawling tactics of Fritz Von Poppenheim and Kurt Von Goering.

Von Goering, described as one of the roughest matmen in the business when he made his debut here two weeks ago, lived up to his reputation when he slammed Columbo's head into a steel ring post, sending him to a hospital where he spent the night and had some stitches put in his head. Columbo maintains

he has a score to settle with the former SS paratrooper and plans to waste no time in evening accounts.

Von Goering and Von Poppenheim said, when they signed for the rematch, that they don't care how many referees there are in the ring, they want the championship trophy back in their possession "where it rightfully belongs" and they plan to let nothing stand in their way.

The match is billed for an hour or the best two out of three falls.

Wild Bill Savage, whose antics have made him the target of boos by local fans, will team Danno McDonald in the 45-minute semi-windup. Savage has renewed his offer of \$100 to anyone over 21 years of age who can stay 10 minutes with him.

Von Poppenheim and Whitewolf tangle in the one-fall opener, starting at 8:30 p.m. Doors open at 7:30.

Yanks Give Robin Roberts Unconditional Release

New York — (UPI) — Robin Roberts, once the National League's premier pitcher, faced the realization today that there may be little left to his active baseball future.

Given his unconditional release by the New York Yankees Wednesday, the veteran 35-year-old right-hander immediately headed for his Meadowbrook, Pa., home and indicated he would accept any major league offer that came along.

Despite their desperate need for pitchers, the New York Mets were the first club to report they couldn't use him.

"I have spoken to manager Casey Stengel and he definitely is not interested in Roberts," said Mets' President George Weiss in Cincinnati.

Before leaving the Yankees, who purchased him from the Philadelphia Phillies for \$500,000 last Oct. 16, Roberts said he felt he could still pitch and would welcome the chance to do so anywhere in the big leagues.

"I hated to leave the Yankees," he admitted. "I wanted to be with a club like that all my life. My arm feels good and I still think I can pitch, but I'm going home for a few days and take it easy."

Roberts, who was operating under a \$32,000 contract, won 234 games during a 14-year span with the Phillies. He won 20 games or more six straight seasons, enjoying his biggest year in 1952 when he won 28 games and lost only seven.

Southern Oregon's golfers are scheduled to take on Oregon College in a dual match over the Rogue Valley Country Club course in Medford at 1:30 Friday afternoon.

Saturday the Raider track and field crew will try to regain its winning ways when the Raider thrifolds travel to Monmouth for a dual meet with Oregon college. The meet is slated to start at 1 o'clock.

Dr. Ted Schopf's baseball club enters the week end series with PSC with a 4-1 Conference record while the Vikings are on top of the loop standings with a perfect 3-0 mark. Friday's nine-inning affair is set for 3 p.m. while on Saturday morning the two teams tangle in a double-header starting at 10 a.m.

The Red Raider golfers, winners by a lop-sided 13-2 margin over Oregon Tech in their only dual match this season, will be up against a strong OCE Wolfpack squad that has already seen action in six matches this spring.

Last week end the SOC team entered the three-day Northern California Intercollegiate championships at Santa Cruz, but final results and standings are not available at this time.

Dentists To Fabricate Mouthpiece for Grid Players of This Area

Southern Oregon District Dental society members have taken upon themselves the task of making some 700 latex mouthpieces.

This undertaking stems from the rule of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations which, starting next fall, will require all prep football players to wear the protective mouthpieces.

The project is being launched this week with dentists calling at the schools of the area to explain the program. Dentists will make impressions of the teeth of the young athletes during the next several weeks. They plan to get together, probably just about the time school is out, at one location to fabricate the mouthpieces.

Boys from eighth grade

through junior year in high school, who plan to play football next fall, are being instructed to go to their own regular dentists, to have the impressions made. Others, who have no regular dentists, are asked to go to one of their choice.

Southern Oregon District Dental society is taking on this work free of charge as a public service. The society is paying for the latex material as well as making the mouthpieces, according to Dr. Jack Lust, project chairman.

In addition to performing a service, the dentists, by doing the work now are aiming at prevention of a last minute rush next fall.

Each dentist will retain the impression, or models, after his resignation becomes effective in June.

Fred Herrmann, ex-Crater high and ex-Linfield college baseball pitcher, is now with Tulsa, Okla., of the Texas league. He was farmed there by the St. Louis Cardinals of the National League. Herrmann signed to a pro contract after finishing his college eligibility last spring. He was with the Portland Beavers last season as a St. Louis Cardinal farm hand. The Cards do not have a Portland tie this year.

Herrmann reportedly plans to complete his schooling at Linfield with the aim of getting practice teaching work in the off season while remaining in pro ball as long as he can.

SMITH AT OMAHA

Another professional baseballer being followed with local interest is Dick Smith, ex-Glide high athlete and now an outfielder (center field) for Omaha, Neb., of the American Association. Dick's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Smith, are now Medford residents (1408 Siskiyou Blvd.) and his father is employed by Rogue Valley Manor.

Dick is in his fifth season of pro ball. He was up with the Los Angeles Dodgers for spring training and was sent to Omaha for another year of experience. He batted .286 for Greenville, S. C., of the Sally league last year, socking 19 homers and driving in 92 runs. Smith started his career with Thomasville, Ga., of the Georgia-Florida league. He was with Odessa, Tex., of the Sophomore league in 1959 and with Green Bay of the Three I league in 1960.

Smith worked for Harry and David in the off season up to Christmas last year.

ON FROTH TEAM
Bob Quinney and Jim Barry, ex-Medford high athletes at Brigham Young university are reportedly playing freshman baseball for the Cougars this spring as outfielders. Herb Wheeler, also ex-Medford, is a pitcher on the Oregon State Rook baseball roster.

PROGRESS MADE
Coach Dean Benson says the motto of the Medford High school track team this season with its many young competitors is (a la General Electric): "Progress is our most important product."

But, it's a bit hard to take when progress is made but rivals improve, too. Such was the case against Grants Pass in the Rotary meet last Saturday. Said Benson, "We improved but it did not do much good."

A NUMBER OF BESTS
The Rotary meet provided bests in a number of events for Medfordites.

Benson termed the 1:58.7 half mile by Steve Towas "real great." The 2:02.3 by Jim Snodgrass for third was his best this year. In the mile Dennis Brumback recorded a 4:35.6 for the best of his career as he took third and Hi Martin had a season's top effort of 4:37.1 in gaining fourth.

Jim Hill's 9.9 century and 22.2 furlong and his 21-9/16 broad jump were his bests. Tim Murray's 130-4 in the discus was the best this year for the Tornado weight man.

The Medford relay time of 1:33.5 was faster by a second than a Tornado quartet has registered this spring. And top speedster, Jim Hill, did not run a leg of it. The relayers were Scott Hampton, Walter Verstrate, Scott Eaton and Jim Henry.

Benson questioned the high hurdle times, feeling that Eaton should have been awarded third place ahead of GP's Gil Smith.

GREEN MACHINE

Dick Bank, noted track authority, had this to say in an article written for last Sunday's Eugene Register-Guard: "A big green machine swept relentlessly through this historic Olympic stadium Saturday afternoon and in its wake a great team (University of Southern California) and a great record lay in ruin."

"Some are calling this Oregon team the greatest collegiate dual track team ever assembled. It might very well be. One thing is certain: There is no track and field coach the equal of Bill Bowerman in these United States."

MIGHT PULL OUT

Wonder what the Hayward relays will be like next year. The Portland Interscholastic league and Metropolitan loop have talked of pulling out. Unless they do, and possibly even if they don't we predict there will be other schools which will not go back next year.

Withdrawal of the PIL and Metro teams could improve the meet by reducing the field. One coach has said that the main problem with the Haywards now is that they are "overcrowded."

Never having been on hand for a Hayward meet as much as he'd like to see one, this writer can't give any first hand impressions. Main squawk apparently, this year, was the long day, which saw the Oregon - Stanford meet sandwiched in between the field events and races of the prep encounter. Of course, that is something that does not happen every year, although effort should be made to see that such a situation is avoided.

There was feeling, too, that the meet offered field event men too limited an opportunity to show their wares.

Assault Planned On 4-Minute Mile

University of Oregon, Eugene—An assault on the four minute mile by a quartet of Oregon distance stars will highlight the Webfoots' dual track and field meet with Washington State university at Hayward field Saturday.

The mile, the opening running event, is set to get underway at 2 p.m. with two-time NCAA champion Dyrrol Burison, Archie San Romani, Vic Reeve, and Keith Forman primed for an all-out effort which might produce a sub four-minute clocking.

Coach Bill Bowerman has received permission from WSU Coach Jack Moeberry to enter four performers, one more than normally allowed in any event in a dual meet, and the result could well be the finest mile race ever staged in a collegiate meet.

Nifty Times

Burison has been under the four minute mark on three occasions during his career and is the holder of the American mile record with a 3:57.6 effort. His best this season has been 4:03.6.

The other three Webfoot entrants have also posted nifty times this spring. San Romani has been timed in 4:05.8, Reeve boasts a best of 4:05.5, and Forman lists a 4:07.3 as his top effort of the spring. Forman has done better, however, owning a 4:05.1 clocking last year.

Sophomore Les Tipton, Oregon's newly found javelin star, grabbed the lead in his specialty and Duck stars Harry Jerome and Jerry Close broke away from previous deadlocks to account for the

Close dissolved a tie with Washington State's Dave Kerrone with his leap and Jerome's outstanding effort relegated Oregon State's Lynn Eves to second place in the 220.

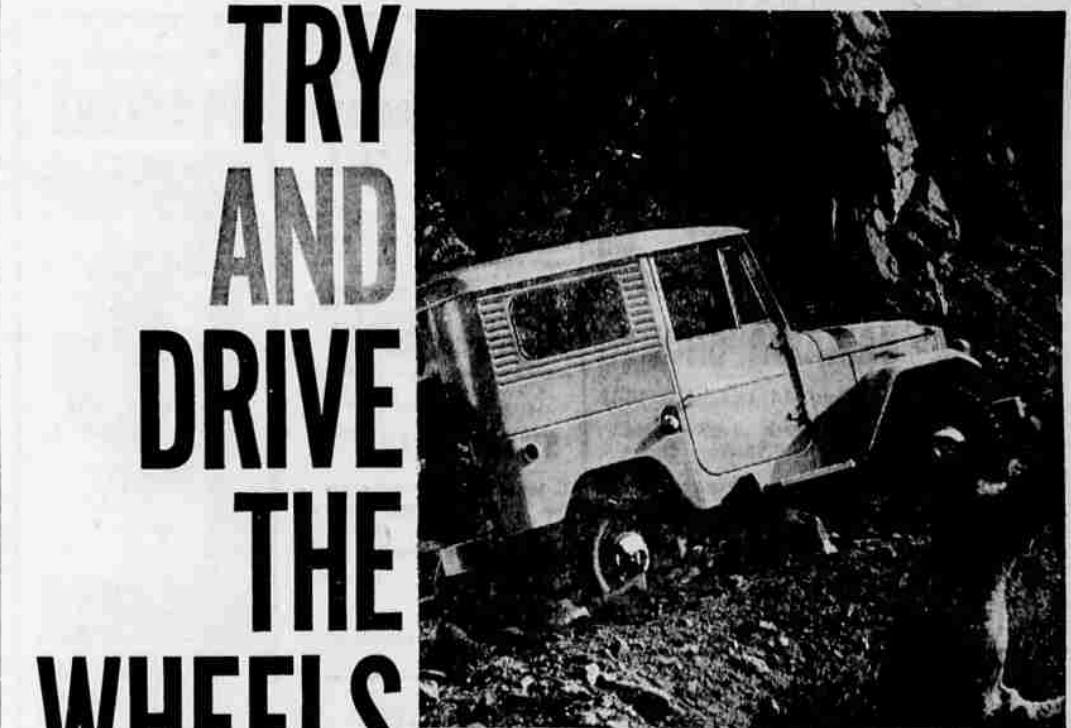
