

Russia, United States Exchange Charges of War Propaganda at Geneva Talks

Geneva—(UPI)—The Soviet Union accused the United States today of trying to sneak war propaganda into Communist countries.

The United States, in turn, charged that the Soviet Union is using the discussion here on the banning of war propaganda to make propaganda of its own.

The exchange of charges came as the 17-nation Disarmament Conference delegates met as a committee of the whole this afternoon to consider an article on propaganda to be included in a treaty draft that may be presented to the United Nations in New York by June 1.

Chief U.S. delegate Arthur H. Dean said any move to try to include in the U.S. Constitution any provision barring war propaganda as previously proposed by the Russians—

would violate basic American freedom of expression.

The answer to war propaganda is more information within and across international frontiers, more contact be-

tween citizens of different countries, increased understanding and larger areas of freedom for all," he said.

Zorin replied at length. He confined himself to the ques-

tion of war propaganda, and did not mention the resumption of American nuclear testing. His presence today and agreement to discuss new items when the conference reconvenes next week indicate the Russians plan to stay on here despite threats to walk out over the new American tests.

Zorin derided Dean's proposals for more exchanges of publications, and radio and television broadcasts.

"If the United States refuses to prohibit war propaganda," Zorin went on, "where is the guarantee that these foreign publications and broadcasts would not be filled with war propaganda? There is no such guarantee."

Washington—(UPI)—Russia has protested to the United States against what it called harassment of Soviet ships passing through the Panama Canal.

Un-American Hearings Near End

Los Angeles—(UPI)—A House subcommittee on un-American activities planned to conclude four days of hearings today while picketing groups hoped to enlarge their numbers to climax protest demonstrations.

In three days of closed sessions on the tightly guarded fifth floor of the Federal Building, the four-member subcommittee has heard testimony from 33 witnesses on alleged Communist activity in the Los Angeles area. More than 20 were scheduled to testify today.

All but a few of the witnesses were understood to have invoked the Fifth Amendment in refusing to answer questions.

Outside the federal building, peaceful picketing has been conducted by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee as well as two others—a "reception committee" drawn together by students and others opposed to the House group, and the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Free-

dom, cited by the House unit as a Communist front, and another target of the current inquiry.

The pickets totaled 600 on the opening day of hearings today.

Durno Criticizes Kennedy Judgment

Portland—(UPI)—Rep. Edwin Durno carried his U.S. Senate campaign to the Roseburg area today after accusing President Kennedy in a Portland speech of an "ill-considered snap judgment."

Durno, a candidate for the Republican Senate nomination, referred to Kennedy's action to prevent steel price increases.

In a speech rapping Kennedy for a "dangerous" drive for power, Durno also criticized presidential requests for tax and trade authority.

He said the government is being conducted by "second and third generation millionaires" who are spending federal money excessively.

Macmillan Favors Seeking Agreements

New York—(UPI)—British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan believes the West must not abandon efforts to reach agreements with the Soviets to replace the mutual fear which now maintains the peace.

Macmillan, speaking to newspaper executives here Thursday night, held out the hope that the desires of the Russian people for a better standard of living will eventually work to the advantage of the West in dealing with the Communists.

Cape Canaveral, Fla.—(UPI)—The Army today fired a Pershing missile on a planned short-range test flight across the Atlantic Ocean.

Madrid—(UPI)—Foreign Minister Jo Joaquin Calcedo Castilla of Colombia will call on Generalissimo Francisco Franco Saturday. Calcedo Castilla arrived for an official three-day visit Thursday.

JACKIE'S SISTER TO VACATION AT NICE
London—(UPI)—Princess Lee Radziwill, Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy's sister, today left by air for Nice with her two young children to spend "a few days" holiday in the sun.

FLAG REMOVED FROM BALAGUER'S HOUSE
Santo Domingo, D.R.—(UPI)—The Dominican flag was removed from a flagpole at the house of ex-President Joaquin Balaguer Thursday following a newspaper story that it was being raised and lowered daily by soldiers.

Under Dominican law, the national flag may fly only at public places such as schools or at the residences of high government officials.

MILITARY ADVISER CHIEF REPLACED
Vientiane, Laos—(UPI)—Maj. Gen. R. H. Tucker arrived here today to replace Brig. Gen. Andrew J. Boyle as chief of the U.S. military advisers who are helping the pro-Western army in its battle with the Reds. Boyle is being transferred to Hawaii.

BRITISH LONGSHORE STRIKE THREATENED
London—(UPI)—Union leaders threatened today to pull Britain's 70,000 longshoremen off the job May 13 unless their demands for higher pay and a shorter work week are met.

RED CHINA DENOUNCES NUCLEAR TESTS
Tokyo—(UPI)—Communist China today denounced the resumption of U.S. atmospheric nuclear tests as a "reckless provocation" and an "important step in Washington's preparation for a nuclear war."

Electronics, Steel Shares Recover Portion of Losses

New York—(UPI)—Electronics and some steels recovered slightly today.

Both of these groups were among the hardest hit in Thursday's heavy selloff which followed news of a grand jury indictment of four steel companies on charges of price-fixing.

U.S. Steel and Bethlehem, two of the companies named in the indictment, rose about 1 and 1/2 respectively. Republic and Jones & Laughlin also recovered part of their previous loss.

In the electronics, Beckman, Burroughs, Litton, Motorola, IBM and Texas Instruments rose a point or more. Autos were narrowly mixed and chemicals erratic.

Amerasia added roughly a point in a mixed oil section. Some finance shares, stores and metals rose modestly. Tobacco and foods eased.
