While the couple is on furlough with their four sons, Mr. Anderson's mother is carrying on their ministry.

Unity Church Topic Announced

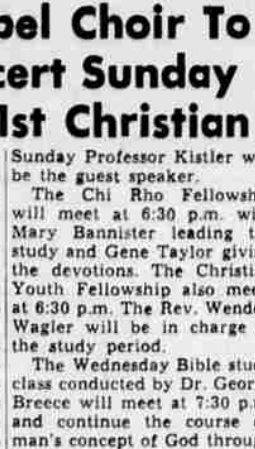
"Living the Life" will be the topic of sermon Sunday at the worship hour at Unity Church of Medford, Holly and Haven sts. The text will be John 13:17.
