Sander fanned eight batters, walked two and hit two in his game. His mound rival, Colton, yielded six hits and four runs.

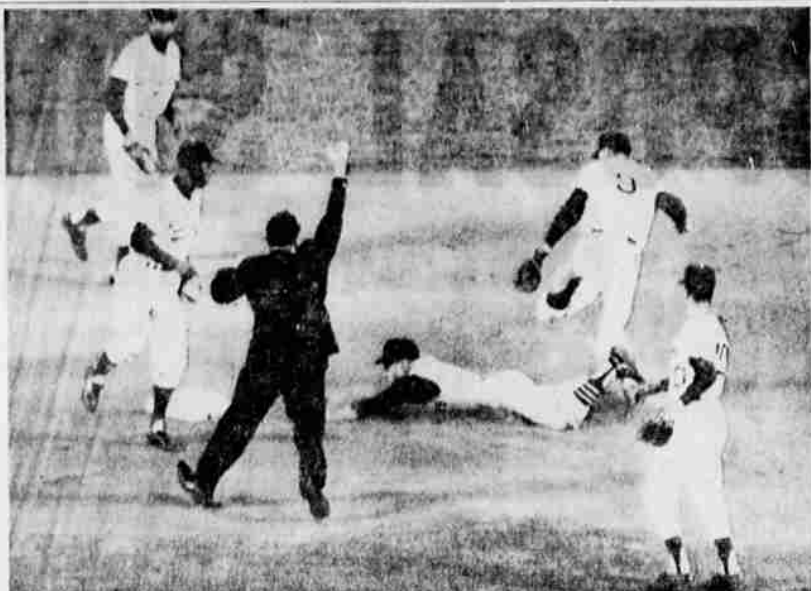

Giambra Cuts Up Fernandez

Miami Beach, Fla. —UPI—Joey Giambra, a slow starter but a smooth boxer, cut up Cuban Florentino Fernandez' face with a steady tattoo of rights and lefts Saturday night to win an eighth-round technical knockout in a middleweight bout at the Miami Beach auditorium.

The Cuban's face was a giant smear of red at the end of the seventh round and he snorted blood when he tried to breathe.

Referee Cy Gottfried stopped the bout after letting the bell ring for the start of the eighth round. Boxing commission physician Dr. Alexander Robbins looked at Fernandez twice, and advised Gottfried to stop it.

The Cuban, whose nose was broken in three places by Dick Tiger in his last fight, had a badly bleeding nose, a split right cheek, and another cut over his right eye after his seven bloody rounds with Giambra.

About 4,000 fans, including a group of drum-beating Cubans, were on their feet most of the fight. Giambra weighed 157 pounds to 160½ for Fernandez (151) and Leppert, Koufax (143) and Roseboro.

Dr. Robbins said at the end of the fight it did not appear that Fernandez' nose was broken again but he could not be sure before making a complete examination.

NYU Wins Mile Relay

Philadelphia —UPI—New York university, a modest violet in recent Penn relays, broke its victory drought Saturday by blazing to victory in the glamer mile relay by two yards over Morgan State after winning the sprint medley earlier in the day.

The Violets, who hadn't won a major Penn relays victory since 1955, won the sprint medley by 12 yards and then won their first mile relay title since 1949 when Cliff Berdon outran Lawton Smart of Morgan State to win in 3:12.9.

Heavily favored Abilene Christian, with Olympian Earl Young running a 46.7 anchor leg, finished third with Western Michigan fourth. St. John's fifth and Oklahoma State sixth.

It ended a seven-year reign in the mile for Villanova when the injury stricken Wildcats scratched although they were selected by the coaches' committee to run.

N.Y.U. brought the meet to a rousing finish before 35,435 sitting in 82 degree temperature with its thrilling win in the mile.

New York university thus joined Michigan and Villanova as double winners in the meet. The Wolverines were tops in the four mile and the two mile, while Villanova won the distance medley and the 800 yards.

George Chosen By Hermiston

Hermiston —UPI—Bob George, football and track coach at Mac-Hi in Milton-Freewater, was accepted a similar job at Hermiston High school, Hermiston principal Jack Jenkins announced Friday.

George will replace Mark Cotton, who resigned to take a job in the Portland school system before returning to Mac-Hi in 1957.

Billy Joe Patton Wins North & South Amateur Golf Meet

Pinehurst, N.C. —UPI—Billy Joe Patton celebrated his 40th birthday by winning the 40th annual North and South Men's Amateur Golf championship Saturday with a 7 and 6 victory over Robert Manley Jr. of Atlanta, Ga.

It was Patton's second victory in this tournament. The Morganston, N.C., swinger also won in 1954. The victory also avenged his 1-up loss to Manley in the 1951 final.

Patton shot a dazzling medal of 69 for a three-under-par on the first 18 holes of the scheduled 36-hole match to take a 5-up lead at the lunch break. Manley, who had put in trouble, staggered to a 74 on the first 18.

Washington Loses 11th Straight Tilt

Ralph Terry of the New York Yankees, backed up by a 13-hit attack that included home runs by Hector Lopez, Cletis Boyer, and Roger Maris, gained his fourth win and sent the Washington Senators down to their 11th consecutive defeat Saturday, 10-3.

Terry allowed only six hits, including a homer by Bob Johnson. Maris' homer was his third of the year — his second in two games since visiting President Kennedy yesterday.

The Yankees, gaining their third straight victory, spotted Terry to a 5-0 lead before he gave up Johnson's solo homer in the bottom of the fourth inning. Two throwing errors by Johnson in the sixth inning helped the Yankees boost the margin to 6-1.

Lopez, Boyer, and Maris all homered in the seventh inning off pitcher Fred Green. All three blasts going over 400 feet, as the Yankees put the game out of reach.

In other American league afternoon games, the Cleveland Indians edged the Minnesota Twins, 8-7; the Los Angeles Angels squeezed past the Detroit Tigers, 7-6, and the Chicago White Sox beat the Boston Red Sox, 7-6.

John Romano of the Indians doubled home the winning run in the seventh inning to beat Minnesota, despite two homers by Don Mincher of the Twins. Mincher's second homer came with the bases loaded in the seventh and tied the score at 7-7.

In the bottom of the inning, Tito Francona singled, advanced to third on a wild pitch and an infield out, and scored on Romano's double off Dick Stigman. Barry Latman was the winner in relief.

At Detroit, Ryne Duren of the Angels snuffed out a Detroit rally in the eighth; to save starter Ted Bowsfield's first victory of the season. Joe Koppe's sixth — inning homer with the bases empty proved to be the winning run. Leon Wagner also homered for Los Angeles, while Chico Fernandez and Dick Brown connected for Detroit.

Mike Hanby Sets Mark In Vault

Monmouth — Mike Hanby set a new Southern Oregon college record in the pole vault and Jerry Arndt upset Oregon college's distance star, Ralph Kilham, yesterday when the Red Raiders of Ashland finished first in a combined dual and three — way track meet here.

Southern Oregon overpowered OCE in the dual 112 to 10. In the triangular scoring the Raiders had 111½, Oregon college 43½ and Central Oregon college 6.

Hanby went 14 feet in the vault for a field record as well as a school mark. Arndt beat Kilham in the mile in 4:32 and in the three-mile in 15:24. Kilham has been considered the top small college two — mile in the state. The three-mile was run instead of the two mile in tune-up for NAIA competition.

Howard Hartman won the 100-yard dash and 120-yard hurdles for the Raiders. Doyle Branson switched from the 100 to the 440 and won that event. An upset among the Raiders saw Dave Graham, the regular 440 man, switch to the 880 and beat Howard Haugen, the usual runner in that event.

Rain fell during the meet and there were four inches of water in places on the track. The 120 hurdles were run on grass because of the water on the track.

Tornado Trackmen Defeat Roseburg

With sprinter and broad jumper Jim Hill tripling for the second successive week, the Medford high track aggregation thumped Roseburg 78 to 44 at Roseburg.

It was the first dual action of the season for the Black Tornado.

Medford collected first place points in nine of the 14 events and swept the broad jump, the javelin and the 100 yard dash.

Hill captured the 100 and 220-yard events and the broad jump. His jump of 22 feet 4½ inches is the top distance he's attained.

Ray Palm doubled in the hurdles for the Roseburg crew.

Medford firsts included Lloyd Hammons in the pole vault, Paul Bauer in the shot put, Tim Murray in the javelin, Steve Toews in the half-mile, Doug Brown in the high jump and the relay crew of Jim Henry, Scott Hampton, Scott Eaton and Hill.

Mike Crutcher won the mile for Roseburg. Other Indian victors were Grant in the quarter — mile and Counts in the discus.

The meet was conducted in spotty rain, a little hail and a lesser amount of sunshine. There was three to four inches of water over about four lanes on the turns of the track and part of the back stretch had two or three lanes under water.

Performances were generally good considering the distance. Medford runners did not push at the finishes of the half — mile and relay because of good leads. The mile won by Crutcher in 4:37.7 was characterized as a "good race." Medford's Dennis Brumback was second in 4:45 and the Tornado's Hi Martin third in 4:48.

The Medford team was in the charge of Glen Schiire.

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
