Domiciliary Director Is Convention Speaker

"What Is a Domiciliary" was the topic for Henry Herzog when he addressed a banquet meeting of delegates and others attending the 14th annual convention of the Oregon department, American Gold Star Mothers, last evening. The banquet was held at Jackson House, convention headquarters, with more than 100 Mothers and guests attending.

Mr. Herzog, director of the Veterans Administration domiciliary at White City, said the domiciliary endeavors to provide food, shelter and medical care for veterans unable to care for themselves, and for those capable of rehabilitation, to prepare them to return to community life.

Attempting to describe the domiciliary at White City to the convention members who had never seen it, Mr. Herzog said it was large and added "space is sometimes an embarrassment." There are 57 buildings on 150 acres of ground and he said that through the efforts of many individuals and groups, "the desert has been turned into an oasis." There are 1,025 beds, and a 50-bed infirmary; the average membership is 935 men.

Mr. Herzog said food at the domiciliary is good and that the medical clinic accomplishes a great deal in the way of improving the health and general well-being of the veterans. He praised the medical experts and social workers on the staff.

Increasing Concern
The director said rehabilitation is "an increasing concern" and mentioned that the men have a wide variety of disabilities. He spoke of the therapy program, including manual arts.

Mr. Herzog said women such as those belonging to the Gold Star Mothers can help the men living at the domiciliary by coming as visitors, by attending parties, serving as partners for games. "The men are lonesome and in need of companionship," he declared.

He praised the Gold Star Mothers of the area for the program carried on at White City and said it includes parties, bus trips, coffee hours and participation in many events planned by the domiciliary.
