Educational and legislative matters were considered by delegates as well as a proposal to merge the 34-year-old Oregon state fellowship into the association fellowship program.

The state association commended Dr. Anna L. Rose Hawkes, national president, for her commendation that members of the UN pay their special assessments or lose their voting privileges and the Oregon state board of higher education on its procedure in allowing the presidents of state institutions of higher education to determine who shall and shall not speak on their respective campuses.

A studying of financing in Oregon of education beyond high school, with particular reference to community colleges, was approved and a committee was authorized to

devise a plan for merging the Oregon state fellowship into the association fellowship program. The Oregon fellowship, the only one of its kind in the association, has been awarded to an Oregon woman triennially since 1928.

The state board meeting will be held in Portland July 13 and 14. The 1963 state convention is scheduled for Gear-

hart and Bend the following year. It was announced that \$6,236.45 had been contributed by AAUW branches for fellowships.

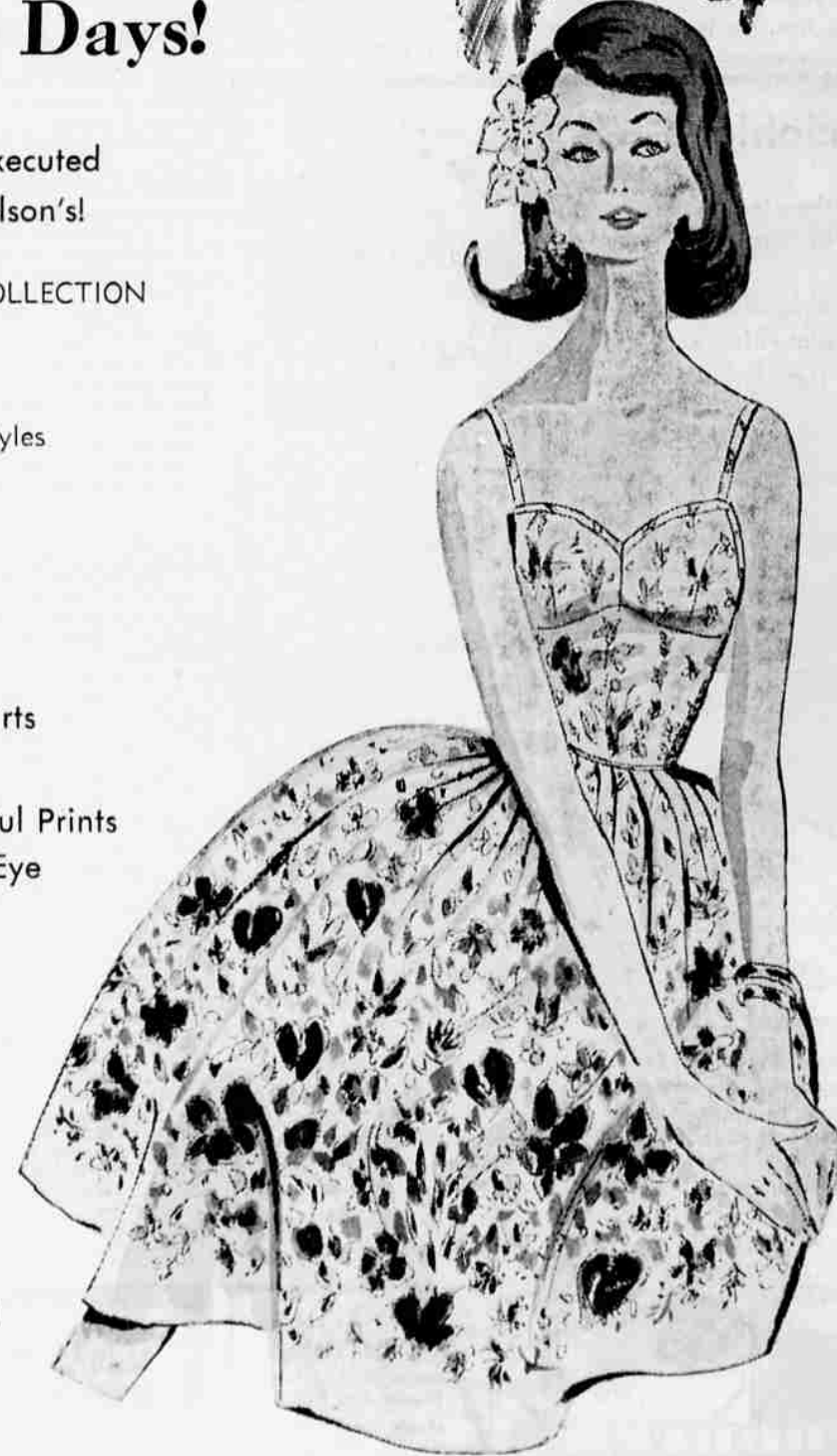

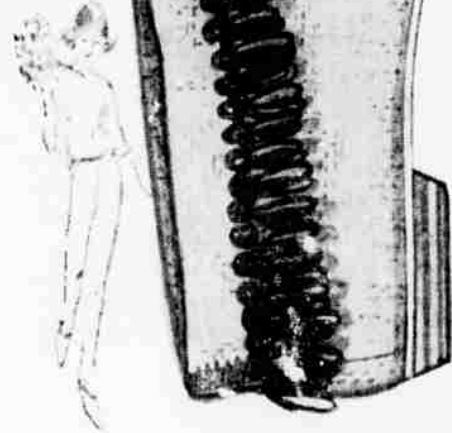
