

Daughters Give Funds For Research

Portland — Representing more than 3,500 members of the International Order of Job's Daughters in Portland, Miss Donna Primmer, Queen of Bethel 3, recently presented a check for \$896.23 to Dr. E. E. Osgood, head of the experimental medicine division for leukemia research at the University of Oregon Medical school.

Mrs. William K. Sult, Medford, grand guardian of the order, and Cecil Brown, Portland, associate grand guardian, participated in the presentation.

During the past eight years, a total of \$6,681.37 has been donated to this fund from the annual October statewide candy sale to purchase equipment in the research laboratory, soon to be moved to the Medical Research building now under construction. Originally this Job's Daughters Fund was given in memory of Mr. Brown's daughter, Danielle, a victim of leukemia in 1954.

An equal amount of \$6,730 also has been donated from proceeds of the candy sale for other philanthropic projects, namely the support of two overseas youngsters through Save the Children Federation and scholarships to Oregon Bethel girls. Each member in Oregon takes part in the money making project and also in contribution to these worthwhile projects.

As Dr. Osgood was receiving the recent donation, Dr. Robert Higley, instructor in medicine, was conducting 14 other members of Portland Bethel through the research laboratory and explaining about tissue cultures and biochemistry work on blood cells.

All work also in oils, but none will be exhibited in this showing.



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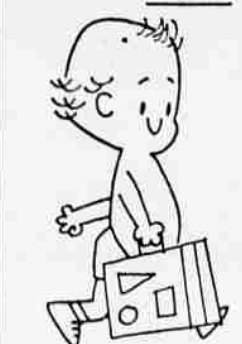
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
