Supervisor C. E. Brown reported the high bid totaled \$16,385, compared to the forest service appraised price \$14,170, an increase of 16 per cent.

Tours of the domiciliary have been arranged with VA personnel selected as guides.

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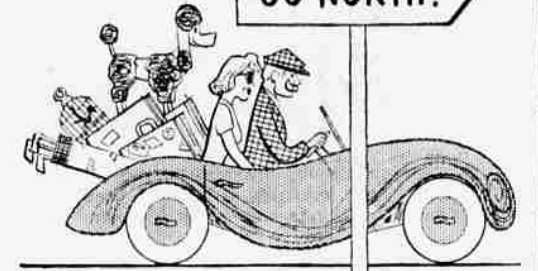
Plans for Polio Clinic Subject of Television Show

Plans for a mass polio immunization program in Jackson county, using the Sabin oral vaccine, will be described on "Adventures in Medicine" at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon, over Station KBES-TV.

The Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health association, which sponsors the program, pointed out that the show will be seen an hour earlier due to the network programming time changes.

The Jackson County Medical society and the health department have been working with the local chapter of the National Foundation to organize the all-out immunization program to assure a polio-free population in Jackson county.

The Jackson County Nurses association, Jackson County pharmacists, and many civic and service organizations also will assist in the county-wide polio immunization effort.

Recommend Oral Vaccine

Until recently, all three types of the Sabin oral vaccine were not available, and therefore all persons were urged to have the Salk shots for continued protection against polio. Now, however, medical authorities recommend the Sabin oral vaccine because of the quick, effective and permanent protection it affords.

The difference between the Salk vaccine and the Sabin oral vaccine will be explained, as well as other factors concerning the desirability of administering the oral vaccine at this time. Plans for the clinics will be discussed, including where and when they will be held.

Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health physician, Dr. William J. Miller, pediatrician, Gordon Hudson, registered pharmacist, and Eugene Garner, chairman of the local chapter of the National Foundation, will appear on the panel to answer questions pertaining to the immunization program.

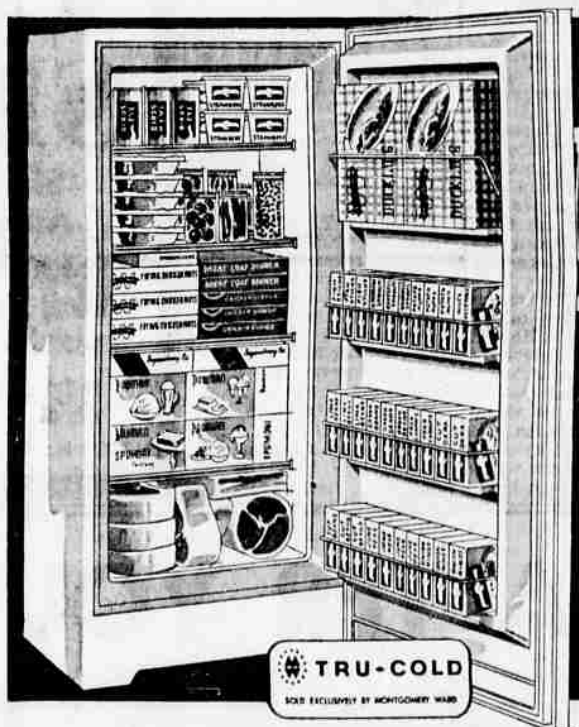

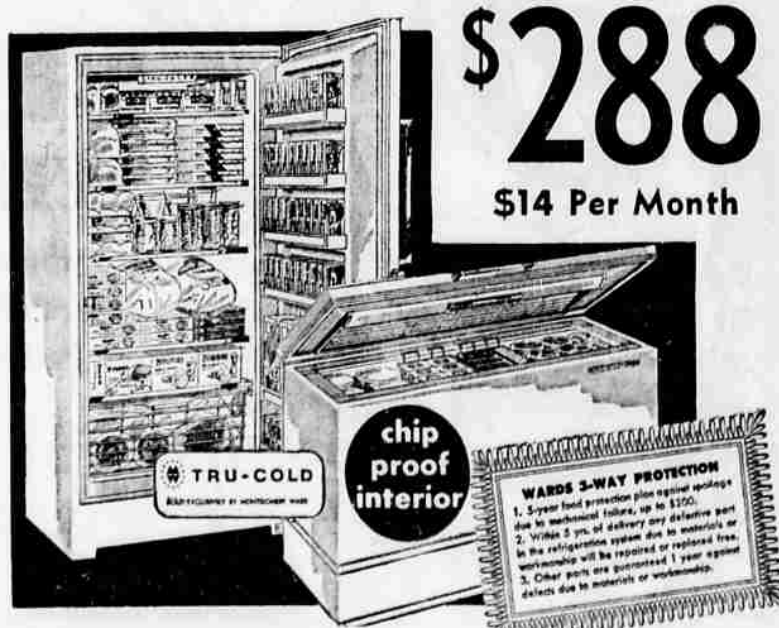
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
