Duncan Defends Stand on Dunes; Criticizes Signs

Eugene — "The criticism of Charles Porter that my suggestion for a solution of the Dunes issue 'scuttles' the park plan has a hollow ring in view of his complete inability, both in and out of Congress, to make one single progressive step toward the accomplishment of a Seashore park in the Florence area," Robert B. Duncan, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Congress for the Fourth District, said in Eugene this week end.

"His words have done nothing but divide the people. Progress is made by a united people working together toward a common goal," Duncan said.

"Restricting the area to be included to the actual dunes west of the highway, and making it a seashore park under the park service, can be the basis of compromise to the end that the park can become a reality rather than continued controversy and opportunity for political head-lines," Duncan continued.

Duncan pointed out that Porter had in effect abandoned the park concept by adopting Edwin R. Durno's forest service plan for administration of the area.

In an earlier talk at Coos Bay, Duncan severely criticized the parties responsible for plastering signs, protesting resumption of nuclear testing, over downtown Medford.

"Until such time as President Kennedy and his military advisors conclude that testing of nuclear weapons is not necessary for our national defense, or until the Soviets agree to a disarmament program with satisfactory inspection safeguards, we have no choice in the matter. We must continue the test."

Duncan explained that the seriousness of the consequences of nuclear testing cannot be disputed, but that the possibilities, if the nation fails to exercise every possible precaution in the national defense, cannot be ignored.

"An atomic war is almost too horrible to contemplate, but those who advocate a unilateral cessation of nuclear tests, are, in effect, proposing at least partial capitulation. If we are to survive we dare not concede any battle on any front, or any degree of preparedness," Duncan concluded.
