Butte Falls Park Improvements Set

Butte Falls — A step toward improvement of the city park here was taken by the Butte Falls city council Thursday night.

It voted to purchase timber from the forest service and then sell it to a logging firm in order to raise money to put tables, fireplaces and toilets in the city park.

The city may make as much as \$2,500 profit from the transaction, councilmen estimated. Last year some \$2,000 was raised through a similar transaction to finance construction of a city tennis court.

In other action, the city went along with a Lions club suggestion and agreed to pay electric bills for lights at the tennis court. The Lions club will pay the cost of installing the lights, including materials.

Councilmen voted to purchase a mouth-to-mask resuscitator to be kept at the city hall in case it is needed in emergency cases.

The council also discussed plans to black-top several city streets this summer. If this

summer's program is carried out as planned, there will be no more unpaved streets in the city.
