## Portland Beavers Divide with Bees

The Seattle Rainiers are crouching one-half game behind first-place Salt Lake in the Pacific Coast league standings today as they prepare for another round against Spokane after defeating the Indians 4-2 and 9-1 in a Sunday doubleheader.

Today's game was scheduled at Spokane to make up for Friday's contest, postponed due to rain. Portland will play at Salt Lake and San Diego will be at Tacoma in the only other games, both makeup, set for today.

The league's leading Salt Lake Bees split their doubleheader with Portland 9-2 and 13-2 Sunday and San Diego split with Tacoma, 2-6 and 3-2. In a single game at Vancouver Sunday, Hawaii toppled the Mounties, 5-2.

**Three Homers**

Seattle collected three home runs in their doubleheader at Spokane. Curt Jensen hit a 300-foot homer in the first game to break a 1-1 tie at the start of the eighth inning. Steve MacDonald scored on Paul Smith's single and a Spokane error allowed Dave Mann to come home to clinch the Rainier victory.

In the second game, Tom Umphlett and Billy Harrell hit solo homers for Seattle as Elmer Singleton pitched a seven-inning shutout. The Rainiers jumped to an early lead with five runs in the first inning.

At Salt Lake, Dale Willis of Portland allowed only two hits in the nightcap and struck out 10 Salt Lake batters. The Beavers got to Bee left-hander Ron Georger for eight hits with Jay Hawkins and Tony Frullo collecting two each to lead the way.

The Bees jumped on Portland pitching for four home runs, two by Jack Kubazyn and once each from Max Allen and Tony Washington, to take the first game.

**Tight Tenth**

The San Diego Padres pushed across two runs in the 10th inning to even the doubleheader record at Tacoma. Relief pitcher Zack Monroe singled in what proved to be the winning run.

Winning an unprecedented third straight Texas Open, Palmer had not led through three rounds. He played his usual role of staying in close and pouring on the pressure on the back nine of the last round.

His 67 gave him a 273 total, just enough to edge out Gene Littler, Rancho Bernardo, Calif., Joe Campbell, Pendleton, Ind., Doug Sanders, Ojai, Calif., and Mason Rudolph of Clarksville, Tenn., who tied for second at 274. Each of that group pocketed \$2,050 for the tournament.

Dave Marr, Sun City, Ariz., was alone at 276 for \$1,400 while Dave Hill, Denver, Colo., and Jackie Burke, Kiamesha Lake, N. Y., got \$1,250 with their 277 totals.
