

Yankees Go In Front; Pirates Regain Lead

Maris Hits Home Run, Three Doubles; Giants, Bucs in Crucial Series

The Pittsburgh Pirates and New York Yankees rose to first place . . . Roger Maris went on the warpath and Early Wynn got back in the winning column . . . and the San Francisco Giants set up the first "crosshairs" series of the young National league season.

It all happened on a wild Sunday of big league action during which:

—The Pirates whipped the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-1 and 1-0, to regain the NL lead by 28 percentage points.

—The Yankees extended the Washington Senators' losing streak to 13 games and took the AL lead with 3-2 and 11-6 triumphs.

—Roger Maris had six hits in a doubleheader to raise his average to .262 and Early Wynn won his first game since last July 16 to advance with in seven victories of his coveted 300-lifetime goal.

The Giants blitzed the Chicago Cubs, 7-0 and 6-0, to run their winning streak to five games on the eve of a series with the front-running Pirates.

Friend Wins Fourth
Bob Friend pitched a four-hitter for his fourth win and Al McBean turned in a seven-hitter for his third straight victory for the Pirates before 51,574 at Los Angeles.

Howie Gosz's two-run homer and Bill Mazeroski's two-run double were the big blows of the first game and Dick Stuart's homer was the decisive blow of the nightcap.

Whitely Ford pitched a seven-hitter for his second victory in the opener and the Yankees romped in the nightcap with a 15-hit attack that included three doubles and a homer by Maris.

Ford's victory gave him a lifetime record of 160-43 for a .7174 percentage that is unmatched by any big league pitcher who ever won 100 or more games.

Wynn, ailing with a sore arm since mid-1961, pitched a three-hit 5-1 victory that enabled the White Sox to sweep a doubleheader after rookie Mike Hersberger's homer topped the Boston Red Sox, 2-1, in the opener. It was the 293rd victory of Wynn's big league career.

Match Three-Hitters
Jack Sanford and Billy Pierce each pitched a three-hitter for the Giants. Willie May's two-run homer was the big blow of the Giants' 13-hit first-game attack and Ed Bailey hit his sixth homer in the nightcap. The win increased Pierce's record to 3-0 and was his second straight route-going effort.

The Cincinnati Reds scored a 4-3 victory over being crushed, 16-3, by the St. Louis Cardinals, the Philadelphia Phillies blew the first game of their doubleheader, 8-0, but beat the New York Mets, 10-2, in the second game, and the Houston Astros defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2, in other NL games.

In the other AL games, the Minnesota Twins longballed the Cleveland Indians, 8-4 and 7-3, the Baltimore Orioles beat the Kansas City A's, 8-3, and the Detroit Tigers defeated the Los Angeles Angels, 13-6.

Eddie Kasko's ninth-inning homer gave Bob Purkey his fourth win for the Reds after Ken Boyer drove in five runs with two triples and a double and Larry Rhoton pitched a six-hitter in the Cards' opening-game rout. Stan Musial also homered in the first game.

Make Nine Miscues
Alvin Jackson's eight-hitter and homers by Frank Thomas and Jim Hickman gave the Mets their victory but the Phillies won the second game as Don Demeter, Tony Gonzalez and Wes Covington homered during a 14-hit offensive. The Phillies committed nine errors during the doubleheader.

Homers by Roman Mejias, Hal Smith and Jim Pendleton produced the Colts' three runs and gave Dick Farrell his first win. Don McMahon, who threw the tie-breaking home run ball to Mejias in the ninth, was the loser.

Key singles by Harmon Killebrew and Bill Tuttle helped produce a four-run eighth inning that won the opener for the Twins, who then hit six bases-empty homers to "laugh it up" in the second game. John Goryl led the homerun assault with two. Jim Gentile drove in four runs with two homers and a single for the Orioles, who got one-hit relief pitching over the last three innings from Billy Hoelt and Dick Hall. Gentile's second homer, a three-run shot, put the Orioles ahead, 5-3, in the seventh.

Jake Wood, Al Kaline, Bill

Bruton and Vic Brown hit homers to lead a 13-hit Detroit attack that brought Phil Regan his first triumph.

San Francisco — (UPI) — Bob Nieman, the much-travelled outfielder, was scheduled to bring his pinch-hitting talents to the San Francisco Giants today.

The club, which has a pinch hitting record of one for 19 this season, acquired the 35-year-old Nieman Sunday from the Cleveland Indians.

"Maybe he can help us in that department," manager Alvin Dark said.

The Giants gave Cleveland an undisclosed amount of cash and a minor league player to be named later for Nieman, who is in his 12th major league season. He has a lifetime batting average of .295. Last season he batted .354 for Cleveland, mainly in pinch-hit roles.
