

Reception Will Honor Teacher, Civic Leader

Eagle Point — Clarence Davies will be honored at a reception Sunday, May 6, in the Eagle Point Scout Community building from 1 to 5 o'clock. All of his students and former students, their parents, friends, relatives and associates are invited to honor Mr. Davies who will retire at the end of this school term following 37 years of teaching.

Under the leadership of the Eagle Point Lions club, the entire community is joining together to honor Mr. Davies not only as a retiring teacher but as a past city mayor, past Grange master and Lions chairman as well as an active civic leader.

At 17 Mr. Davies took a teachers' examination in 1913, having completed only the eighth grade with some additional study accomplished on his own. He taught for three years in rural ungraded schools in Wallawa county in Oregon, next taught for six months in Eden on the north side of the Grande Ronde river above Troy before moving on to Prairie creek in what was known as the Liberty school. He had 40 students with all eight grades represented for one school term.

Later Mr. Davies moved to Star, a similar school situated near the spot where the Enterprise-Lewis road drops into the Grande Ronde canyon, and taught there one year.

Deciding to return to school, he entered the Wallawa high school, working his way through school and playing football one season before becoming ineligible due to his age. He again returned to teaching in 1917-1918, this time at Troy for a year and at Lower Lost Prairie for 7 months. He farmed on Hurricane creek from 1918 to 1929, and while still farming, took up his teaching career in 1920 at Promise which lies south along the Grand Ronde. The next fall he entered the Joseph system to teach in the eighth grade and remained there for three years.

Home Study — After a considerable amount of home study Mr. Davies secured the required years of service and was granted a life certification for teaching based on an examination which entitled him to teach in high schools.

He taught in the high school at Joseph in 1924, resigned before the year was complete and finished the year in the Wallawa system.

In 1926, Mr. Davies accepted the superintendent's position at Eagle Point and remained there until 1940. The first class to graduate from Eagle Point high school in 1927 boasted five students. There were 23 in the high school and between 85 and 90 in the grade school. The graduates were Emily Jones, John Henshaw, now living in Butte Falls, Harriett Hannaford, Fern Jack and Merle Jack.

After a leave, Mr. Davies returned to Eagle Point in the fall of 1949 as a classroom teacher. He was not satisfied to continue teaching on his life certificate and took summer college extension and correspondence courses and obtained his bachelor's degree in 1956. He is now teaching in the English and communications field, including Latin and journalism. He has been advisor of the school newspaper since 1949 and four years later assumed the responsibilities for the school year book which he still has.

He was a charter member of the Eagle Point Classroom Teachers' association when it organized eight years ago and has retained his membership. He has been a member of the Oregon Education association since 1920 and a member of the National Education association since 1949.

"There are lots of disagreeable moments and much com-

pensations to teaching," Mr. Davies says. He remembers an amusing incident several years ago when he kept a few youngsters in after school for make-up work. "One little boy in about the fourth grade came up and tried to buy me off for 15 cents so he wouldn't have to stay in with the rest of the youngsters," he laughingly commented.

When Mr. Davies was superintendent at Eagle Point, he had close associations with superintendents throughout the Rogue valley and believes that he is the last of the early educators still active in education work.

Mayor Six Years

From about 1930 through 1936 Mr. Davies was mayor of Eagle Point. He was a charter member of Hurricane Creek Grange in 1923 and affiliated with the Eagle Point Grange in 1926. He was Pomona master of the Wallawa County Grange, master of a tri-county Grange and from 1928 to 1932 was steward of the Oregon State Grange.

He is a charter member of the Eagle Point Lions club, of which he is president. Whether working in his profession or for civil causes, the teacher has the reputation of working willingly and carrying his share of the work and responsibilities.

Mr. Davies was married to Julia Miller in 1926 and has one daughter, Mrs. William (Kathleen) Oyler of Hollywood. Mrs. Oyler is teaching in the Jewish Orthodox school in Hollywood while her husband is attending the University of Los Angeles. He is well known to valley residents as a former Shakespearean actor in the Ashland festival. They have a daughter.

Mr. and Mrs. Davies sold their ranch on the Alta Vista road just outside Eagle Point last year and purchased an acre with ocean frontage about one and one-half miles south of the California border. They have been spending the summer months, holidays and week ends in building a home there and plan to move immediately after school is out June 6.

As for Mr. Davies, when he is through teaching in June his only desire is to "just loaf until I feel the urge to do something." — D.H.

She began her talk by saying every person is born with creative ability, that art is a therapy which releases tensions and allows free expression.

Comparing exhibits, Mrs. Twedell said there was little of a finer quality than the work shown in the Rogue Valley and declared "we have some of the finest artists right here in our own midst."

Students Attend — Mrs. Twedell had four of her art students, June Phillips, Sadie Coghill, Marie Pfister and Edna Evans, show several of their paintings and explain them to the group. Each told how and why they happened to take up art.

Warren Wolf, art instructor of Medford Senior High school, also spoke. Mr. Wolf exhibited several paintings of the best works of his pupils. He said there is no right or wrong in the arts, just opinions.
